#### **Executive Committee meets February 22**

SEMCOG's Executive Committee will meet at 1 p.m. on Friday, February 22, 2008, in SEMCOG's downtown Detroit office. Action items to be considered by the committee are as follows:

- approving SEMCOG's FY 2008-2009 Annual Operating Budget and Work Program Summary for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008;
- approving a Membership Drive incentive to be held in conjunction with SEMCOG's 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The incentive will provide a 50 percent initial year discount for members joining during calendar year 2008;
- approving the 2035 Forecast (of population, households, and employment for communities and small areas of the region from 2005 to 2035); and
- approving the adoption of the amendment of 16 projects to the 2030 Regional Transportation Plan for Southeast Michigan (RTP).

The Michigan Department of Transportation will provide an update on the status of the Detroit River International Crossing Project (DRIC). The presentation will review the two alternatives still under consideration, summarize the potential impacts of each, and identify the next steps in the process. ### International Joint Commission to address local governments on Great Lakes Study

The International Joint Commission (IJC) will present an overview of the International Upper Great Lakes Study (IUGLS) to representatives of local governments and non-governmental organizations on Wednesday, February 20, 2008, beginning at 1 p.m. in SEMCOG's Ambassador Room.

The study was ordered by the IJC, a Canadian-U.S environmental treaty organization. Its purpose is to identify any potential physical changes in the St. Clair River that have contributed to lower water levels in Lakes Michigan and Huron. More broadly, the study seeks to determine whether Lake Superior outflows should be altered to take into consideration a changing climate and changing interests of residents of the Great Lakes basin.

Representatives from the IJC and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers are scheduled to speak.
