Historical Comments of Fireworks at the Ann Arbor Airport

- It's a distant memory, but at one time there was a beautiful fireworks display shot from Ann Arbor's Buhr Park every Fourth of July. When the crowds became too large, it was moved to the Ann Arbor Airport with local businesses picking up the cost. And then, it was gone. Officials cited costs, crowd control, and clean-up, but other much smaller Washtenaw County communities with far less resources continue to host magnificent displays.
- A Fourth of July airshow and fireworks were held at the airport until around 1990, when the rising cost of insurance forced the city to end the event.
- For years, Ann Arbor had fireworks. First at Buhr Park, then at the airport. They were a
 great community tradition. I think they were sponsored by the Jaycees with much of the
 money coming from a local businessman. I'm curious how communities much smaller than
 Ann Arbor can afford fireworks, but we can't.
- Ann Arbor City Council agenda, May 1994 Charles Gelman, Gelman Sciences Inc. Board Chairman, 600 S. Wagner Rd., stated that his company would like to sponsor a Fourth of July fireworks display, which has the support of volunteers from many community groups, businesses and government agencies. Mr. Gelman asked the City for all the support it can give for the event. (Not specifically at the airport, but anywhere in AA)
- The annual fireworks show that originated at Buhr Park off Packard Road was organized by N.B. Kelsay, a long-time Ann Arbor grocer. In 1968, he posted this ad in the June 28, 1968, Ann Arbor News (page 17). The following year, the Ann Arbor Jaycees stepped forward to take over the fundraising for this event which later moved to the Ann Arbor Airport.
