



Continuing in Partnership with the City of Ann Arbor

The proposed Office of Community & Economic Development will continue to:

- Administer the City's General Funds invested in local human services;
- Advance the City's interests in the development of, and policies surrounding, affordable housing;
- Market and qualify buyers for the City's affordable housing covenant units;
- Administer the City's Affordable Housing Trust Fund;
- Administer the City's allocation of Federal HOME and Community Development Block Grant funds through the Washtenaw Urban County;
- Staff the Housing and Human Services Advisory Board;
- Maintain a reporting relationship to the Community Services Area Administrator and City Administrator;
- Work actively with City staff, citizens, and Council to ensure that City policies maximize the quality of life for all residents, especially those who are economically challenged.
