Ann Arbor Affordability Themes

Here's a summary how the key plan value of affordability intersects with important topics, based on feedback from the Ann Arbor community.

Housing

- **Housing cost relative to income:** housing costs, whether for rent or mortgage, should not exceed a certain percentage of income, typically around 30%.
- **Diverse housing options:** types and price points to accommodate different income levels, including affordable single-family homes, apartments, and co-ops.
- **Property taxes:** a barrier to affordability, with many calling for lower taxes to make living in Ann Arbor more sustainable.
- **Workforce housing:** people who work in Ann Arbor, including service workers, teachers, and public safety personnel, can afford to live in the city.
- Sustainable development and zoning: allow for higher density and mixed-use.
- Other themes: Varied housing types for intergenerational and non-traditional households, density increases in and around downtown and campuses, tax burden and landlord regulation.

Economy + Education

- Affordable goods and services: cost of living extends beyond housing to include groceries, utilities, and other daily necessities.
- **Impact of the University of Michigan:** The influence of the University of Michigan on housing demand and prices, with some suggesting the university should contribute more to local taxes or housing solutions.
- Other themes: Affordable rents for small businesses / start ups, and pre-K

Transportation

- Public transportation and car-free living: The importance of reliable and affordable
 public transportation options to reduce the need for car ownership, which can be a
 significant expense.
- Other themes: affordable transportation and food, insurance

Green Space + Public Places

 Themes to consider or from additional outreach: Affordable access to parks and open space amenities, affordable community centers

Infrastructure + Systems

 Themes to consider or from additional outreach: Affordable utility services, Public support of infrastructure to help reduce development costs

Housing

- Affordable housing: Many respondents emphasized the need for affordable housing options to ensure that people of all income levels can live in Ann Arbor.
- **Mixed-income neighborhoods:** Promoting the development of neighborhoods that include a mix of income levels to reduce economic segregation.
- Other themes to consider or from additional outreach: diversity of housing location, balanced homeownership and rental options

- Access to services and amenities: Ensuring that all residents have equitable access
 to essential services such as healthcare, education, public transportation, and
 recreational facilities.
- Other themes to consider: Safe routes, affordability of public transportation, access to amenities such as parks and basic necessities regardless of transportation mode


- **Quality of life:** Ensuring that all residents can enjoy a high quality of life, including safe neighborhoods, good schools, and recreational opportunities.

- Fair treatment and non-discrimination: Ensuring that all individuals are treated fairly and without discrimination based on race, gender, income, or other factors.
- **Community engagement and representation:** Ensuring that all voices are heard and considered in decision-making processes.

- **Environmental protection and climate action:** The need to reduce carbon emissions, transition to renewable energy sources, and protect resources.
- Other themes to consider: recreation-friendly rivers and waterways; Increased green infrastructure and protection of natural features; biodiversity in public spaces

- **Energy efficiency and renewable energy:** Supporting the use of solar, wind, and other renewable energy sources, and improving energy efficiency in buildings.
- **Waste reduction and recycling:** Promoting robust recycling and composting programs and reducing overall waste.
- **Public power and energy independence:** Advocating for municipal control over energy sources to ensure reliability and sustainability.
- **Environmental protection and climate action:** Emphasizing the need to reduce emissions, transition to renewable energy sources, and protect resources.
