High-intensity Activated crossWalK

- Mid-block crossing
- Protected pedestrian crossing
- When not in use will go dark




The Ann Arbor HAWK

- First signal/beacon of this type on state trunkline
- Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) pilot
- High pedestrian/ bicyclist use


