RE: Long Response Time to Home Invasion

Ms. Merlis,

My name is Ed Dreslinski and I am the Sergeant in charge of the communications section for the Ann Arbor Police. I have been forwarded your e-mail and your concern with the response of the Ann Arbor Police Department to your daughter's Home Invasion that occurred on October 26, 2010.

I have listened to the audio recording of when your daughter called in and spoke with the dispatcher. In the recording your daughter can be heard indicating she was already in the house and was going through the house to determine what, if anything was taken. She indicated that the time of occurrence was between 0500 and 1713 hours (when she called). This dispatcher tells her very clearly not to touch anything or clean up and that they would send someone out. When she calls back less than 30 minutes later, at 1741 hours, she inquires how long it will be and the dispatcher confirms her location. The dispatcher tells her that the next available officer will be sent and that the call is in the pending calls to alleviate her concern that she has been forgotten about.

During this time frame of the day there were only 8 officers assigned to the whole city of which only 2 were assigned to that area of the city. At 1713 hours (when your daughter called) there were only 2 units available in the city and one was in the area, the other was on the other side of the city. We need to keep officers available at almost all times to respond to emergency calls for the other approximately 150,000 residents and students in the remainder of the city. The situation was fluid over the next 1 ½ hours but no more than 2 officers were available from that time until Officer Lee was dispatched when he came on duty at 1844 hours. Officer Lee arrived at 1859 hours and took 20 minutes to take the report.

I spoke with Officer Lee and he indicated that with his decade and a half of experience he did not see any surfaces that would be conducive to taking fingerprints. He related this fact to your daughter. Ann Arbor gets an inordinate amount of Home Invasions per capita due to the transient nature and lack of security mindedness of the students. Surprising to most is that our closure rate on these property crimes is above average. Ann Arbor officers have been leading the State of Michigan for years in crime rate closures for cities of comparable size and one instances of a non-emergent situation should not taint the good work done on a consistent basis.

While being a victim of a Home Invasion gives your daughter a sense of being violated, which I understand as I have been a victim of a Home Invasion as well, the priority of a Home Invasion that occurred sometime in the past 12 hours in which the homeowner has already been through the residence is not very high. As soon as an Officer was available to handle the complaint he was dispatched and arrived in 15 minutes from the far south of the city. During the time from when your daughter called until Officer Lee was dispatched there were 44 911 calls made into our center ranging from Home Invasions believed to have just occurred to CPR in progress on a male.

I do believe that this could have been handled better. After one hour your daughter should have received a phone call indicating that officers were tied up and inquired if the status has changed. I will speak to the dispatcher to ensure that phone call occurs in the future. I cannot take away the sense of being victimized nor am I trying to minimize that feeling. I can't expect you to agree but I do want you to understand that every effort was made to take the report from your daughter in a time frame consistent with the non-priority nature of this call.

Please feel free to contact me in the future if you or your daughter have any further concerns.


