# 3. PUBLIC COMMENT

Ms. Todoro-Hargreaves asked for the board's support of the State Street capital improvements project. She spoke of the time and effort that DDA and City staff, the businesses in the State Street District, and some outside of the district have put in over the years to develop a design that "...will take the

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neighborhood to the next level." The curbless design will allow more flexible use of the space for events and businesses. The project also includes the addition of more planter beds, irrigation upgrades, and much needed roadway improvements.

#### 4. REPORTS FROM CITY BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Mr. Watson read the Downtown Area Citizens Advisory Council May 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting report on behalf of Peter Honeyman. The CAC supports the pedestrian safety and multi-modal connectivity improvements planned for the State Street project. The group invited Jeff Watson to attend the meeting to discuss with the members ways in which the CAC may engage more with the DDA and the City leadership on key issues, long-term visions, and goals.

#### 6. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

Mr. Watson stated that as required by PA 57, the DDA will hold the first of its two informational meetings this calendar year on June 1<sup>st</sup>, ahead of the regular June board meeting.

The First and Ashley two-way restoration and bikeway project was awarded Wade Trim's Project of the Year. Wade Trim was the consultant on the project. The project was selected from submittals from Wade Trim's 18 offices across the country. Community benefits of sustainability, innovation, and business support during the construction were among the reasons the project was selected for this award. Mr. Watson said we should feel proud of the DDA's continued work and collaboration on projects in downtown.

City Council will consider/take action on the FY23 budget, including the DDA budget, at the May 16<sup>th</sup> Council meeting.

Bikeapalooza will be held on Sunday, May 22 from 12-2 pm in the old Y Lot, celebrating the progress being made on the protected bikeway network in downtown. There will be activities and events at the lot and along the bikeway. Public Works will have a snow plow used on the bikeway on display. Partners on this event include the Library, the Washtenaw Bicycle and Walking Coalition, City Transportation Department, and the Office of Sustainability.

#### 8A. SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS – CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE

Ms. Dieck moved and Mr. McKinnon seconded the following resolution:

#### RESOLUTION TO APPROVE A STATE STREET CONSTRUCTION COST SHARING AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY

Whereas, The DDA's Development Plan highlighted identity, infrastructure, transportation, business encouragement, and sustainability principles, and included transformative and strategic street projects as important tools to achieve DDA goals;

Whereas, In partnership with the City, the DDA led the design phase shaped by adopted Board values, community engagement, and analysis;

Whereas, The City of Ann Arbor led the construction RFP process and received response on March 24, 2022 and Fonson Company Inc. of Brighton, MI, was the recommended contractor;

Whereas, The City of Ann Arbor will oversee the primary construction portion of the project with a total budget of \$8,275,211, including contingency, inspection, and material testing, with approximately \$4.2M of the cost attributable to the DDA's work;

Whereas, to begin construction, the City and DDA have drafted the attached cost-sharing agreement;

Whereas, the DDA Capital Improvements Committee reviewed the cost-sharing agreement and recommends approval;

Resolved, The DDA Board authorizes the Executive Director to sign the cost-sharing agreement with the city.

Ms. Dieck said the Miller/Catherine Project RFP will be released in May. As with the State Street project, Staff have evaluated the project for capacity in the DDA budget.

The Committee received an update on the sidewalk repair project underway to replace the bricks, where there are no vaults, with concrete. The DDA, City Transportation, and Public Works are working on design adjustments and maintenance vehicle changes to alleviate the ongoing issues of regular and service vehicles illegally parking in the bikeways.

The next Capital Improvements Committee meeting is scheduled for June 8 at 11 am.

#### 8B. SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS – FINANCE COMMITTEE

Mr. Bartelme moved and Ms. Dieck seconded the following resolution:

#### RESOLUTION TO PUT FORWARD AN AMENDMENT TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2022 BUDGET

Whereas, PA 57 of 2018 requires that the Director of the Authority will prepare and submit for the approval of the DDA Board a budget for the operation of the Authority for the ensuing fiscal year;

Whereas, Before the budget may be adopted by the board, the statute requires that it be approved by the governing body of the municipality before final adoption by the DDA Board;

Whereas, The DDA did complete the budget creation process for FY22 and did adopt the FY22 budget in June of 2021 for its five funds, including the Parking Fund;

Whereas, The DDA does monitor its activities compared to budget on an on-going basis and at March 31 it became apparent that a deviation at June 30 could be anticipated in the Parking Fund due to an increase in parking activity/revenues and a resulting increase in certain expenditures which are directly related to revenue streams;

Whereas, The Michigan Uniform Budget Manual requires that a legislative body amend the budget as soon as a deviation is apparent and prior to the close of the budget year;

Whereas, The DDA's Finance Committee has reviewed the budget to analysis and proposed budget amendment and recommends that the DDA Board approve putting forward this FY22 amendment to City Council;

Whereas, Once City Council has approved the amendment, the amendment will be bought back to the DDA Board for final appropriation into the FY22 Budget in the same manner as the process for the adoption of the original budget;

RESOLVED, The DDA Board accepts the recommendation of its Finance Committee and authorizes DDA staff to put forward the following amendment for the FY22 Budget to the Ann Arbor City Council for their approval:

Mr. Bartelme said the Committee reviewed the third quarter financial statements and received and approved the January, February, and March expense registers.

The City received notification from Yeo & Yeo that it would not extend its auditing service contract with the City. The City released an RFP for audit services, which includes the DDA's audit, and invited Ms. McCallum to participate in the review and evaluation of the RFP submittals.

The Committee discussed releasing the 2016 restriction on \$2.5M of parking funds for new construction, and there was interest expressed in reviewing a resolution at the May meeting.

The next Finance Committee meeting is scheduled for Thursday, May 26 at 9 am.

Mr. Kinley said the Committee reviewed the agenda for today's board meeting. Ms. Letaw and Ms. Kim opened the dialogue on a performance review process for the DDA Executive Director, sharing an initial outline. The proposed process includes 6, 10 and 12 month progress check-ins. The proposed initial sixmonth performance expectations were taken from the list of priorities developed by staff and shared with the Board and Mr. Watson. Board input and buy-in needed. Ms. Letaw reached out to the AADL and AAHC for input on their Executive Director review process. Questions were asked and answered. The Committee agreed to bring the outline to the Board for further discussion.

At the Board meeting, Ms. Letaw and Ms. Kim shared the outline with the Board members. They requested input from the Board, Mr. Watson, and staff on the process, content, and format. The full board needs to define the expectations and metrics for measuring performance. Ms. Kim stated the importance of staff input in the review process. Ms. Letaw acknowledged this is a new/different process for managing the Executive Director performance review, and emphasized that Board buy-in, and a review of the performance review document by DDA legal needs to happen expeditiously, as Mr. Watson's six-month review will take place mid-July. It was requested that staff resend the list of priorities to the Board. Questions were asked and answered. There will be further discussion at the next Executive Committee and Board meeting.

# AFFORDABLE HOUSING/ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES Wednesday, May 11, 2022

<u>AAHC:</u> Ms. Hall provided a status of each of the City-owned properties being considered for affordable housing development. Avalon Housing is the development contractor for the 121 E. Catherine project. The design calls for a mix of affordable housing and art industry units. The first floor to include resident services and either cultural art space or small business development. There was discussion regarding parking for the site. Ms. Hall thanked the DDA for its support of the infrastructure upgrades for this project.

The PUD (Planned Unit Development) and supplemental requirements were approved in March for the 350 S. Fifth (old Y-Lot) site. Ms. Hall said the hope is to have the RFQ released in June. The AAHC is the petitioner-of-record for the 415 W. Washington lot project though it is not an AAHC development. The proposed site plan calls for a structure elevated above the floodplain. The floodway area on the site is not buildable and would be utilized as a green trail. Soil borings show contamination. The City is working with brownfield and environmental authorities. There is no viable use for the buildings on the site and demolition would be required.

The AAHC plans to include the 353 S. Main site with the 350 S. Fifth Avenue site RFP. It scores high for low-income housing tax-credits. The 406 S. Ashley site is pending, waiting for confirmation of the status of the UM Dental Clinic's lease, due to expire in July 2024. Soil borings show contamination at the 200 S. Industrial site. The proposed plan is to develop AAHC office space and explore adding City office and maintenance space on the site. The 1510 Stadium site (Fire Station #2) has significant contamination and poor building infrastructure, requiring demolition of the buildings. The City will explore selling outright. The 721 N. Main site is still being explored for development options. The Platt site has not been prioritized for development as yet. Questions were asked and answered.

<u>AAATA:</u> Mr. Carpenter expressed appreciation for the collaborative and accommodating partnership with the AAHC, City, and DDA on the 350 S. Fifth Ave., project. The AAATA, like other businesses, is experiencing labor shortages; specifically in hiring drivers. The D2A2 service is growing. The millage proposal for 2.38 mills will be on the August primary ballot. This millage replaces the current .7 mill. The millage will allow for the addition of an express Ypsilanti to A2

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service, an overnight service, and expanded weekend runs. It would also allow for the addition of customer service staff at the Ypsilanti station and capital funding for future projects outlined in the AAATA's long-range plan. Mr. Carpenter to provide a one-pager on the millage for inclusion in the next DDA board packet. Questions were asked and answered.

<u>WCC:</u> Ms. Marilyn Kapp, Director of College Partnerships and Success Initiatives at Washtenaw Community College joined the meeting. She will be attending future AH/ED Committee meetings with partners.

<u>Planning Commission:</u> Ms. Gibbs-Randall said DTE has moved out of the Ashley Mews site on Main Street. Potential projects include a hotel/Airbnb and housing options. The Planning Commission wants the first floor active. The eight condominium project on Miller was approved. The TC1 (Transit Corridor) district ordinance is being refined with a goal of a 'one size fits all.' The minimum lot size for the R2 (Residential, Low Density) district has been reduced from 8,500 sq ft. to 5,000 sq. ft. The Planning Commission received a presentation by the Department of Sustainability and Innovation on the SEU (Sustainable Energy Utility) initiative.

<u>City Council:</u> Ms. Song said Council will consider the allocations of the \$24M ARP (American Rescue Plan) funds the City has been awarded at its Monday, May 16<sup>th</sup> meeting. The City Administrator, Milton Dohoney, made his recommendations at a previous Council meeting. The Council members will discuss and present amendments on Monday. Ms. Song noted two of the proposed amendments include establishing HSA accounts and \$500/month for six-months for eligible residents.

<u>DDA:</u> Mr. Watson said the DDA has selected a new parking operator, PCI Municipalities. Staff is working with PCI to ensure a smooth transition. PCI will take over operations effective July 1<sup>st</sup>. The DDA will release an RFP for a parking rate study this next fiscal year. The State Street project will begin in the next few weeks. The curbless design will allow more flexibility for businesses and events. The project will be undertaken over two construction seasons. The Bikeapalooza will take place on Sunday, May 22<sup>nd</sup> from 12-2 at the 350 S. Fifth Ave. lot. The curb management study is scheduled to begin soon.

<u>Parking System Financials:</u> The April parking revenue reports were shared with the Committee. Ms. McCallum said the Board approved budget amendment goes before City Council on June 6. The Board and City Council were informed during the budget process that if the DDA were to bring a budget amendment forward, this would be good news because revenues are higher than budgeted for FY22. Questions were asked and answered.

The Committee was informed that the Finance Committee will be considering a resolution to remove the 2016 restriction on a portion of the parking system fund balance for construction of additions to the public parking system or alternative transportation infrastructure at its next meeting. Questions were asked and answered.

<u>AAATA/GetDowntown:</u> Ms. Lilliane Webb, the new AAATA Business Services Manager and getDowntown Director joined today's meeting.

Republic Parking Contract Year 2021-2022: Ms. Hahlbrock presented her recommendation for authorizing the payment of the full \$50k performance-based incentive fee to RPS based on the performance of the local RPS staff. Staff consulted the DDA attorney regarding withholding the fee until the transition to the new operator is complete. The DDA attorney recommended paying the fee in a timely manner to meet the current contract obligation. It was agreed that the metrics in the current contract are not adequate. There was discussion about the amount of the fee and timing of release of the payment. The Committee directed staff to add language to the resolution, authorizing payment of the full \$50k incentive fee, to Republic Parking for contract year 2021-2022, contingent on Ms. Hahlbrock's satisfaction with their performance.

Ms. Hahlbrock shared the new metrics included in the contract with the new parking operator.

<u>EVCS</u>: The 80 ChargePoint electric vehicle charging stations (50 new, 30 replacements) have been installed and are active. Staff worked with the Office of Sustainability and Innovation on the rate setting and enforcement process. Patrons will use the ChargePoint app and will

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be charged a kilowatt per hour rate. There will be a grace period from the time of notification that the vehicle is fully charged and the time the vehicle needs to be moved. After the grace period, patrons who do not move will be charged an additional fee. The length of the grace period may be adjusted in the back-end system.

<u>Curb Management Study:</u> The study is underway. The consultant is gathering available data as a baseline. The Board will receive a presentation at its July meeting of the overall plan for conducting the study.

<u>FY23 Structure Restoration:</u> Ms. Hahlbrock provided an overview of the planned FY23 structure restoration, highlighting the \$1.4M in projects in the CIP that have been deferred. The RFP was released and the pre-meeting held. The resolution recommending the selection of a contractor will be brought to the June 22<sup>nd</sup> Committee meeting. Ms. Hahlbrock shared sample photos of the maintenance and repair work to be undertaken.

<u>Elevator Maintenance:</u> Ms. Hahlbrock is working with VDE, a specialist in vertical transportation, reviewing existing elevator maintenance contracts, and developing a timeline for re-bid of these contracts.

<u>CIP:</u> The draft parking CIP will be shared with the Committee in June.
