Sustainability & Innovations Corner

- A²ZERO Turns 3 with Celebrations and Focus on Climate Action Successes. Ann Arbor's aggressive climate and sustainability plan and framework, called A²ZERO, just turned 3 after a weeklong series of events during A²ZERO Week. In addition, the Ann Arbor Office of Sustainability and Innovations released a second-year report highlighting major activities and accomplishments achieved during year two of the plan with the help of dozens of community collaborators.
- A²ZERO Solarize Program Reaches New Milestone for Residential Solar. The City of Ann Arbor Solarize program is celebrating a major milestone, surpassing 3 megawatts (MW) of new solar in the local community. Approximately 430 area homes have adopted solar energy through the two-year-old program; and participation has saved residents \$1.3 million in the upfront cost of solar installation. Overall, residents are collectively expected to save nearly \$12 million over the 25-year warrantied lifetime of the systems. Solarize Ann Arbor is open to anyone in Washtenaw County. - Sustainable Energy Utility Overview The Office of Sustainability and Innovation has kicked off public engagement to understand the public's interest in a potential Sustainable Energy Utility. Second Public Meeting Scheduled for Hazard Mitigation Plan Update. The City of Ann Arbor is asking for public input to help update the city's Hazard Mitigation Plan. A virtual public meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 22 from 5-6:30 p.m. This will be the second public planning meeting of the plan development process. The purpose of the meeting will include:

- Status of the overall plan update
- Risk assessment findings
- Hazard risk reduction project ideas

By completing this plan, the city not only increases its resilience to hazards, but also maintains eligibility for state and federal hazard mitigation funding. This plan is required to be updated every five years.

Updated Recycle Cart Stickers Being Distributed for Single-family Homes in Ann Arbor. Recycling continues to evolve, and the City of Ann Arbor, historically a leader in the field, is responding by issuing updated cart stickers to reflect new recycling standards. This, along with the opening of the new Materials Recovery Facility in December 2021, will help keep Ann Arbor recycling operating efficiently. The new stickers focus on recycling changes to scrap metal, plastic and shredded paper. Specifically, scrap metal and shredded paper are NO longer accepted in curbside cart recycling but may be recycled at the Drop-Off-Station. The only plastics now accepted curbside are rinsed and dry plastic bottles, tubs and containers, specifically #1, #2 and #5 plastics.

In order to have this updated information reflected on curbside recycling carts, the city has hired LeadPoint to put new stickers on single-family recycling carts. This re-stickering will take place June 27—July 1, 2022. Residents should place carts out during this week, even if service isn't required, so that the new stickers can be placed on carts. Staff will be wearing high-visibility vests.

Ann Arbor Shares List of Road, Sidewalk, Utility & Resurfacing Projects Planned for 2022. City of Ann Arbor released its list of road and sidewalk projects scheduled for construction in 2022. This year's resurfacing/reconstruction projects will involve 3.6 miles of major roads and 7.5 miles of local streets. This year's capital preventive maintenance program will involve 16.5 miles of major roads and 8.6 miles of local streets. All projects are listed online at www.a2gov.org/roadconstruction. Projects and schedules are subject to change. Construction may result in road and/or lane closures, so travelers are advised to sign up for email or text alerts at www.a2gov.org/roads.

Natural Area Preservation Workdays and Events in July. City of Ann Arbor Natural Area Preservation (NAP) works to protect and restore Ann Arbor's natural areas and to foster an environmental ethic among its community. This involves conducting plant and animal inventories, ecological monitoring, and stewardship projects in Ann Arbor's parks. These tasks are performed by both staff and volunteers. NAP is sharing events planned for July 2022.

To attend a workday, participants are encouraged to preregister using VolunteerHub at http://vhub.at/NAP; links to each event in VolunteerHub are also provided with each description.

NAP is continuing to closely monitor recommendations from city and other health officials. As a result, the events planned are subject to change in order keep volunteers and the public safe. Should it be prudent to make changes to the event schedule, NAP will update its website and
