
Ask a Question or Share a Comment


For discussion






Speed Management Draft Process



Safe Systems Review





What is Safe Systems?

An approach to transportation planning and design that anticipates human error in the design and operations of the street.

What does that mean functionally?

- Street designs are 'forgiving'
- Focus is on highest need areas
- Safe designs are routine and not special projects
