- The City of Ann Arbor Office of Sustainability and Innovations, in collaboration with the Ann Arbor 2030 District, is pleased to announce the launch of a new program to help commercial properties in the city and throughout Washtenaw County access the benefits of clean, renewable energy. The A2 Area Commercial Solar Program will provide one-on-one assistance to screen properties for solar potential, help with designing and releasing Request for Proposals to qualified installers, support in reviewing proposal responses and financial benefits, and help reviewing post-installation energy bills. - The Office of Sustainability and Innovations is continually working toward understanding and improving our community-wide greenhouse gas emissions in order to strive towards our goal of carbon neutrality. Ann Arbor's 2030 District has created a [transportation survey](#) that's being distributed throughout their partner network, which will help the City understand how changing work patterns have affected our greenhouse gas emissions. The survey will take approximately 10 minutes to complete, and three \$50 Zingerman's gift cards will be randomly distributed to those who complete the survey.
- The A²ZERO Sustainability Series is HYBRID this year! Join OSI either online or in person at the Ann Arbor District Library Downtown Branch. The next meeting is Feb. 22, 6–8pm. Presenting: "Housing and Transportation — What's the Climate Connection?" A special forum brought to you in collaboration with the Ann Arbor Citizens' Climate Lobby. Housing and transportation, together, account for 42% of our emissions. To achieve carbon neutrality by 2030, we need to dramatically reduce vehicle miles traveled and make our buildings more efficient. What impact do transportation and housing choices have on carbon emissions, affordability and livability? Ann Arbor Citizens' Climate Lobby has assembled a panel to discuss considerations for designing low carbon, highly livable cities.
