### **City Council**

#### CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Hieftje called the meeting to order at 7:09 p.m. in the Guy C. Larcom, Jr. Building, 2nd Floor Council Chambers, 301 E. Huron St.

#### MOMENT OF SILENCE

Council stood for a moment of silence.

#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Hieftje led Council in the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### ROLL CALL OF COUNCIL

#### APPROVAL OF AGENDA

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR

#### ARREST MADE IN HOMICIDE

City Administrator Steve Powers thanked the Ann Arbor Police Detectives and the University of Michigan Department of Public Safety for their excellent work in the arrests made earlier in the day in the Paul DeWolf homicide case. Three suspects are currently under arrest, said Mr. Powers.

#### MAIN STREET LIGHT POLES

Administrator Powers updated Council on the Main Street light poles. He said that the inspection of the poles was completed by staff and he would be bringing forth a recommendation regarding future action for Council's consideration at the November 18, 2013 Regular Session.

#### 1. Timothy W. Green - Ordinance regarding Permit Requirement for Group Activities in Parks (Treatment of homeless) (C-1)

Timothy W. Green, representing Camp Take Notice and Camp Misfit, spoke about homelessness in Ann Arbor and the need for action. He urged Council to assist in getting the homeless off the streets and into warm beds.

#### 2. Ingrid Ault -Resolution Accepting the Park Advisory Commission Downtown Parks Subcommittee Report on Downtown Parks (DC-2)

Ingrid Ault, 2531 Mead Ct., Chair of the Downtown Park Subcommittee, spoke in support of the proposed Resolution Accepting the Park Advisory Commission Downtown Parks Subcommittee Report on Downtown Parks. She encouraged Council to support the resolution.

## 3. Ray Gholston - Ordinance regarding Permit Requirement for Group Activities in Parks (C-1)

Ray Gholston, member of the homeless community, addressed Council regarding the proposed ordinance amendments to Chapter 39 Parks, regarding Permit Requirements for Group Activities in the Parks. He said one of the biggest challenges for the homeless is finding warm shelter.

#### 4. Dina Kurz - Resolution to Authorize the City Administrator to Negotiate a Sales Agreement for the City-Owned Property at 350 S. Fifth Avenue (DC-5)

Dina Kurz, 2731 Provincetown Ct., addressed Council regarding the Resolution to Authorize the City Administrator to Negotiate a Sales Agreement for the City-Owned Property at 350 S. Fifth Avenue. She said that Council has a unique opportunity with the sale of 350 S. Fifth Ave. The property is one of the few in the City that can have an impact on the City's own sustainability goals.

# 5. Stephan Pate - Ordinance regarding Permit Requirement for Group Activities in Parks (C-1)

Stephan Pate, member of the homeless community, spoke about homelessness in the City. He expressed concern about the aggressive approach taken by the Ann Arbor Police in removing homeless camps from the parks. He urged Council to allow the homeless to live in peace and at least allow them adequate time to gather their belongings when asked to relocate.

## 6. Kathy Griswold - Resolution to Appoint a Pedestrian Safety and Access Task Force (DC-4)

Kathy Griswold, 3565 Foxhunt Dr., addressed Council regarding the proposed Resolution to Appoint a Pedestrian Safety and Access Task Force. She thanked Councilmembers Briere and Warpehoski for giving attention to pedestrian safety. She offered a suggestion stating that the most effective strategy for improving pedestrian safety would be to expand and empower the existing Transportation Safety Committee. Ms. Griswold said that she sent an email outlining some of the accomplishments of the committee as well as information on the Ann Arbor Public School website and on the City website about this committee.

#### 7. Andrew Mutschler - Ordinance regarding Permit Requirement for Group Activities in Parks (C-1)

Andrew Mutschler, member of the homeless community, said he is a part of Camp Misfit. He expressed concern about the Ann Arbor Police tossing his belongings. He urged compassion for the homeless and to allow them to have some stability.

#### 8. Tom Wall - Resolution to Appoint a Pedestrian Safety and Access Task Force (DC-4)

Tom Wall, 1031 Woodbridge, addressed Council regarding the Resolution to Appoint a Pedestrian Safety and Access Task Force. He offered the Council the assistance of his All Star Driver Education company in spreading the message to young people regarding pedestrian safety.

# 9. Raytheon Jones - Ordinance regarding Permit Requirement for Group Activities in Parks (C-1)

Raytheon Jones, 312 W. Huron, addressed Council regarding homelessness. He said that homelessness is a serious problem and urged Council to offer more support to the community.

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM COUNCIL

#### COUNCILMEMBER BRIERE

Councilmember Briere updated Council and the public on a public meeting scheduled to discuss the parking situation at Argo Livery and Longshore Park. The meeting will be held on November 21, 2013 at 7p.m. at the Traverwood District Library. Councilmember Briere noted that Longshore Park was used as a temporary solution for the parking overflow at Argo, due in part to the increased popularity of the Argo Cascades. The neighbors in the area were not happy with the use of Longshore Park for parking and the increased traffic congestion that it brought. This meeting will be an opportunity for all involved to discuss solutions for the future.

#### COUNCILMEMBER PETERSEN

Councilmember Petersen responded to some of the comments regarding homelessness in the City. She noted that there is also a rotating shelter program that is run through a network of churches. She suggested perhaps an earlier start to the program if there is demand and suggested the City Administrator look into this option.

Mayor Hieftje replied that the religious community has been operating the rotating shelters for a very long time. He noted that in recent years, many churches have been struggling to maintain the program because of a decline in volunteer support; however, several years ago, additional churches were brought into the program to assist. Mayor Hieftje replied that the program is managed by the Shelter Association and he encouraged Mr. Powers to contact them with any suggestions for change.

Mayor Hieftje said that the Shelter's warming center would be opening on November 18, which would greatly expand the amount of people serviced in the community. He noted that these programs are not run by the City Administrator, but rather a network of non-profits, including the Shelter Association, the Housing Alliance and others.

#### COUNCILMEMBER LUMM

Councilmember Lumm recognized four Ann Arbor Police Department officers who were honored as Officers of the Year by the Washtenaw 100 Club. The Club was formed in 1971 and their mission is to recognize in Washtenaw County, the outstanding police officers and firefighters each year. They also provide financial support to the families of law enforcement officers serving Washtenaw County who died in the line of duty and award college scholarships to the children of active duty law enforcement officers and firefighters. Officers David Ried, Jeff Shafer, Roman Morrow and Pete Tsangaris were honored and recognized this year as Officers of the Year for their efforts to save a woman's life on January 13, 2013. The officers entered a burning building to rescue her.

#### COUNCILMEMBER WARPEHOSKI

Councilmember Warpehoski clarified that the rotating shelter program included synagogues and other places of worship, not just churches. He inquired with City Administrator Powers regarding the reasons for breaking up a camp in the parks and evicting the homeless. Administrator Powers replied that under City Ordinance, camping is forbidden in City parks. He did note that currently the evictions are largely complaint-driven. He stated when the AAPD receives a complaint, a 48-hour notice is posted in the camp alerting the campers that they are required to vacate. The evictions only take place following that notice. Mr. Powers also stated he has personally met with the residents of Camp Misfit and he is working with the Chief of Police on solutions. He stated he would provide Council with an update soon.

Councilmember Warpehoski encouraged the AAPD to enforce the City's Ordinance with a respect and compassion for the humanity of the homeless and with regard to protection of their personal possessions.

#### COUNCILMEMER ANGLIN

Councilmember Anglin updated the community regarding safety and traffic calming on S. Seventh St. He stated a community meeting is planned for the neighborhood to discuss traffic calming options.

COUNCILMEMBER TEALL

Councilmember Teall recognized that it was Councilmember Higgins' last meeting.

#### MC COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR

Mayor Hieftje also spoke about the homeless issue in Ann Arbor and the community's efforts to respond with humanitarian support. Mayor Hieftje noted that Ann Arbor is one of the few cities in Michigan to use General Fund dollars to support human services. He also noted that the City is currently looking for options for the Ann Arbor Police to log and hold personal property that is displaced during an eviction in the parks so it can be returned to the owner.

THE members shall be appointed by and terms of office shall be as provided in Act 197[.], WITH THE FOLLOWING EXCEPTIONS, WHICH SHALL BE EFFECTIVVE FOLLOWING THE NOVEMBER 2014 REGULAR ELECTION:

(1) EXCEPT FOR THE MAYOR AS PROVIDED ABOVE OR BY MUTUAL WRITTEN AGREEMENT OF THE TAXING JURISDICTIONS LEVYING TAXES THAT ARE SUBJECT TO CAPTURE BY THE AUTHORITY, NO PUBLIC OFFICIAL OF ANY TAXING JURISDICTION LEVYING TAXES THAT ARE SUBJECT TO CAPTURE BY THE AUTHORITY SHALL BE ELIGIBLE FOR APPOINTMENT, WHETHER IN HIS OR HER OFFICIAL CAPACITY OR AS AN INDIVIDUAL; AND

(2) NO MEMBER MAY SERVE MORE THAN 2 CONSECUTIVE FULL TERMS.

All members shall hold office until the member's successor is appointed. ...
