Current Situation


- · A mature walnut tree can produce up to 5000 walnuts per year
- The drip line of the tree covers a majority of our back yard and our outdoor cooking and eating areas
- The squirrels take the walnuts back up into the tree and shell them, dropping particles of nutmeat and sharp pieces of the hard shell throughout the drip line of the tree

Hazard

- Exposure to the hard shell and nut meat is a hazard due to a Black Walnut / Tree Nut allergy with history of anaphylaxis
- · Exposure via a wound can provoke a faster and more severe reaction than via ingestion
- · The relevant primary methods of exposure are
 - · Exposure through a cut from the sharp pieces of the shell or an existing open wound.
 - Exposure by particles being transferred via hands or clothing
 - Exposure via particles dropping into food while cooking or eating outside

Mitigation

Removing the tree will reduce the allergen present in our yard dramatically by eliminating a
source of thousands of walnuts directly on our property and also by removing the ability for the
squirrels to shell the walnuts from the tree branches which spreads the allergens throughout
the majority of our back yard.
