## **City Council**

City Council will meet in caucus the Sunday prior to each regular session at 3:30 p.m. in Council Chambers.

#### CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Taylor called the meeting of the Ann Arbor City Council to order at 7:02 p.m. in the Guy C. Larcom, Jr. Building, 2nd Floor Council Chambers, 301 E. Huron Street.

#### MOMENT OF SILENCE

Council stood for a moment of silence.

#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Taylor led Council in the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### **ROLL CALL OF COUNCIL**

#### Councilmember Warpehoski arrived at 7:07 p.m.

#### APPROVAL OF AGENDA

A motion was made by Councilmember Briere, seconded by Councilmember Smith, that the Agenda be approved as presented. On a voice vote, the Mayor declared the motion carried.

#### AC COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR

*City Administrator Howard S. Lazarus presented his Agenda Response Memorandum for information of Council and also reported on the following:* 

*Mr.* Lazarus thanked Council for the opportunity to provide input on behalf of City Staff. *Mr.* Lazarus stated he typically likes to start these types of reports with both a safety message and at least one success story. On the safety side:

• This past year, the city experienced the lowest number of recordable injuries (56) since 2006. Reducing the number of recordable injuries has a positive impact on City expenditures. Improvements like these are reflective of the safety culture in an organization, he stated and he said he wanted to recognize the entire City staff for creating a safer workplace.

• Successful completion of a lead-remediation / re-painting project on our 150' Manchester Tank Water Tower that completed operations in late May. This project involved lead remediation and re-painting of the tower using an outside contractor. Successful collaboration with the neighborhood, the contractor, Public Works, the Safety Unit, and the Water Treatment Service Unit achieved a 100% safety record during the project and resulted in limited citizen complaints and minimal environmental impacts. The Safety Unit completed lead testing throughout the project with results below regulatory requirements.

*Mr.* Lazarus also presented the following success story regarding the Material Recovery Facility. Since cancellation of the operator's contract, 100% of the recyclables picked up within the City of Ann Arbor have been routed to recycling facilities or stored for routing to recycling facilities for processing. Staff has done a remarkable job in finding processing capacity and arranging transportation for our recyclables, and kept faith with the City's core sustainability values. At the August 4th City Council meeting, staff will be providing resolutions for City Council's consideration confirming the emergency purchase orders with Waste Management, Royal Oak Recycling, and Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority for the changes in the MRF operations and materials handling. Chicago Bridge & Iron (CB&I) is working with the City to develop a new contract that is fair and reasonable and which provides proper incentives for all parties. They are also providing a tip floor throughput analysis because staff strongly believe the former operator was exceeding plant capacity and thus was the root of some of the operational issues. This change is within contract contingency and no Council Action is required.

*Mr.* Lazarus also provided some feedback on concerns expressed by the Human Rights Commission. *Mr.* Lazarus stated he had discussions with both Police Chief Baird and Fire Chief Collins on four of the basic tenets of our path forward. First, both Police and Fire are pursuing accreditation from the appropriate agencies. Accreditation ensures an outside party looks at your processes to ensure your departments are following best practices. Second, Mr. Lazarus stated he has asked both Chiefs to include in their budget requests sufficient funds to support diversity in recruiting initiatives. Third, staff is initiating the process to develop a Request for Proposals to secure an Auditor as was requested in the HRC report. Mr. Lazarus stated he anticipates having robust stakeholder engagement in the development of the criteria for the Auditor. Finally, and in concert with the output of the Auditor, we are looking forward to Council's development of a Public Safety Advisory Commission. Mr. Lazarus stated he will formalize these steps in a memorandum back to Council over the next week so that they can provide oversight and accountability of and for these actions.

Finally, Mr. Lazarus stated he looks forward to experiencing his first Art Fair with his fellow Ann Arborites. He stated that Chief Baird, Chief Collins, and the AAPD and AAFD have taken all prudent measures to ensure a safe and enjoyable atmosphere, and please stop and say thank you to our finest and bravest if you have the opportunity.

#### 1. Michael Miller - Tobacco Regulation Ordinance (C-1)

Michael Miller, representing St. Joseph Mercy Health System, spoke in support of C-1, the Tobacco 21 Ordinance, and urged Ann Arbor to be a leader in the Tobacco 21 movement.

2. Mary lvers - Lease Agreement between the City of Ann Arbor and The Regents of the University of Michigan The Community Dental Center (CA-16)

Mary Ivers, 920 E. Ann Street, spoke in support of CA-16, stating the Community Dental Center is an asset for the City, and serves patients who may not otherwise have dental care or access to dental treatment.

# 3. Wayne Colquitt - Lease Agreement between the City of Ann Arbor and The Regents of the University of Michigan The Community Dental Center (CA-16)

Wayne Colquitt, 1908 Austin Ave., stated he is a former dentist. He spoke in support of the lease for the UM Community Dental Center and spoke of its benefits for the entire community.

#### 4. Blaine Coleman - Boycott Israel

Blaine Coleman, City resident, urged Council to boycott Israel and to approve the Human Rights Commission recommendations regarding Police oversight.

#### 5. Mozghan Savabiessahani - Boycott Israel

Mozghan Savabiessahani, City resident, urged Council to boycott Israel.

#### 6. Lorraine Shapiro - FOIA Redaction

Lorraine Shapiro, 1484 Green Road, spoke about her recent FOIA request and the City's decision to redact many of the documents related to her request. She urged the City to be more transparent.

#### 7. Cathy Shafer - Organization FAAWN

Cathy Shafer, 455 Sumark Way, representing FAAWN, spoke about the City's deer management plan and urged the City to include FAAWN in its planning process. She also questioned if there are really enough deer in Ann Arbor to warrant a management plan.

#### 8. Lynn Borset - Library Lot Petitions

Lynn Borset, 322 Virginia Avenue, speaking on behalf of Ann Arbor Committee for the Community Commons, stated the signatures fell short of the requirements, but noted this was due to technical disqualifications. She stated more than enough voters have signed the petitions. She urged Council to place the issue on the ballot themselves.

#### 9. Murphy Austin - Ann Arbor Human Rights Commission Community Police Recommendations

Murphy Austin, 817 Berkshire Road, Ward Two, spoke in support of the Human Rights Commission's recommendations regarding a Civilian Police Oversight Review Board and an audit of the Ann Arbor Police Department. He urged Council to proceed.

#### CC COMMUNICATIONS FROM COUNCIL

#### COUNCILMEMBER KRAPOHL

Councilmember Krapohl spoke about the Human Rights Commission's recommendations regarding a civilian oversight board for Police. He stated the City does want some oversight.

#### COUNCILMEMBER KAILASAPATHY

Councilmember Kailasapathy also spoke about the Human Rights Commission and a civilian oversight board for Police. She stated the auditor will not make that determination.

#### COUNCILMEMBER WARPEHOSKI

Councilmember Warpehoski thanked staff for the improvements in the condition of the sewer smell in the Arborview neighborhood. He stated longer term solutions need to be explored.

As proposed:

"This rule does not apply to attendance at educational events hosted by nonprofit or governmental entities to which Councilmembers are invited or attend. Nor does it apply to reimbursement for, or fee waiver for, travel, food, and lodging expenses to an educational event related to municipal issues provided by a nonprofit or governmental entity. If a Councilmember attends such an event, the Councilmember shall provide to the City Clerk for posting as a Council Communication: a list of expenses reimbursed and provided and the nature of the educational event. When a reimbursement is offered by an entity whose governing body is composed of members appointed or approved by the Mayor or Council, that entity will communicate the availability of the reimbursement

opportunity to the full Council and Council shall determine which Council member(s) will accept the offer of reimbursement."

#### Substitute:

When a fee waiver or reimbursement for travel, food, and lodging expenses is offered by an entity whose governing body is composed of members appointed or approved by the Mayor or Council, this rule shall be applied as follows: A Councilmember shall not accept any reimbursement from that entity, unless the entity has communicated the availability of the reimbursement opportunity to the full Council and Council has determined by a vote at an open meeting which Councilmember(s) can accept the offer of reimbursement, and the Councilmember is among those voted to accept the offer of reimbursement.

Otherwise, this rule does not apply to fee waiver or reimbursement for travel, food, and lodging expenses for an educational event related to municipal issues provided by a nonprofit or governmental entity. However, if a Councilmember attends such an event, the Councilmember shall provide to the City Clerk for posting as a Council communication at the first Council meeting after the expenses have been reimbursed: a list of all expenses reimbursed and the nature of the educational event.
