Hi Chuck,

I defer to local advocates in your community about the balance, but that seems right to me. Although the question about kids during an ICE action is a really important one, I think having AAPD participate in ICE actions is worse in terms of the message to immigrants in the community and public safety climate overall.

Regarding the exceptions in your ordinance about when asking about immigration status is appropriate, I don't think it's ever appropriate for city law enforcement to ask about immigration status. A simple prohibition on asking about immigration status is easy to implement, and sends a clear message again discrimination. If there is a criminal investigation, then that will proceed regardless of immigration status, and bringing immigration status into it only confuses the issue. Moreover, whenever a person is arrested, their fingerprints are checked against federal immigration databases, and ICE is notified if the person is a noncitizen. This is actually problematic for a variety of reasons, including incentivizing pretextual arrests, but the fingerprint sharing is beyond the control of the city council anyway. So in the context of your local ordinance, it is another reason that there's simply no need for police to ask about immigration status.

Hi Chuck:

I don't have deep background on these issues but I actually think that the exception you cite in (a) with respect to civil creates a huge loophole and I would discourage that reference to "civil" at the very least. I don't know enough about the origin of the language to explain what it's trying to do, but that line in particular would present a lot of challenges in a number of scenarios where you'd want to argue there was a policy violation.

I think your second question is a very good one. I've never considered it, but although it seems like there potentially could be a meaningful helping role, I think that unfortunately the pitfalls for destroying police/community trust where the presence would be so likely to be misunderstood or mistrusted. I'd be interested in other thoughts.

Dear City Council Members:

Thank you for postponing the first reading of Chapter 120: (Solicitation of Immigrant Status) in order to improve the language. I believe this is a step toward more just immigration policies in Ann Arbor.

However, there are still two provisions included in the ordinance that I urge you to improve. They are bulleted below, followed by my objections to them:

EXCEPTIONS (a) Solicitation of information concerning immigration status from the subject of an investigation only when relevant to the investigation or prosecution of a criminal offense, or when processing an arrested person; or...

Objection: A person could be taken into custody, whether or not they are eventually charged, and be asked their immigration status, possibly leading to deportation. This exception also increases the likelihood of racial profiling.

f) Nothing in this Chapter shall be construed to prohibit, or in any way restrict, any public servant from sending to, or receiving from, the Immigration and Naturalization Service information regarding the citizenship or immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of any individual as required by 8 U.S.C. Sec. 1373...

Objection: Instead of reassuring the Trump Administration that we are staying within the bounds of the law, we should be resisting and fighting any attempt to penalize our city for standing by our undocumented residents in court.

Again, I'm asking you to improve the language of this ordinance in order to ensure the safety of all members of our community. Please postpone the reading of this ordinance at tonight's meeting (Monday March 6th).
