Optional Materials

You may be interested in reviewing NACTO's <u>Blueprint for Autonomous Urbanism</u> shared by Commissioner Cyrus Naheedy. This resource outlines how NACTO recommends guiding vehicle technology policy within streets/public right-of-way; some related thoughts from Commissioner Naheedy:

• In brief, it recommends how streets/public space could be re-conceived around them so that they help to achieve goals that many cities (including Ann Arbor) espouse, such as sustainability and place-making. It contrasts with how auto-oriented transportation policy evolved to prioritize the mobility of single-



occupancy vehicles, and the possibility that - without strategic guidance such as provided within the NACTO document - a similar evolution could play out with new vehicle technology.
