The following questions/concerns were discussed at the July 11 meeting:

- Cut-through Traffic discussion about the ability to measure this consistently and equitably for all project areas interested in Traffic Calming. Discussion about opportunity to consider this in a future major streets traffic calming Program.
- Quality of life potential program objective? How to tie this to a qualification criteria?
- Signage/turn restrictions request that this be added as a toolbox device. Staff provided an
 example where this was considered for a Traffic Calming project area, as a separate but related
 effort.
- Budget What budget would staff request to effectively manage and implement the Traffic Calming Program?
- Bicycle boulevards discussion about the appropriate means to achieve this. Transportation
 Plan Update provides a more suitable time to evaluate this type of corridor improvement rather than through the Traffic Calming Program.
- Safe Routes to School how to improve communications about school safety improvements that take place outside of the Traffic Calming Program
- Property Value is it impacted by traffic calming device installation?
- Public engagement process suggestion that alternatives developed by staff be presented to a neighborhood.
