

I support DS-1. The Lower Town-Pontiac Trail corridor is already overburdened with traffic, while pedestrians and bicyclists are increasingly at risk. (There have been multiple non-fatal auto-bike collisions on Pontiac Trail, and one fatal pedestrian accident.) Together, North Sky, Cornwell Farms and 1140 Broadway (all three now under construction); Bristol Ridge (proposed); and Cottages at Barton Green (under litigation) will add 1,119 new housing units and roughly twice as many parking spaces to the corridor, adding to the substantial existing congestion and the risk, including for students walking or biking to Northside School. A comprehensive mobility study, incorporating community input, is appropriate and cost-effective, since it should result in a comprehensive and proactive solution to the transportation crisis on the city's north side. The alternative is a hodgepodge of fixes that will cost the city more in the long run.



In June City Council instructed the Developer to work WITH the neighborhood to substantially modify their proposal. ONE meeting was called by the developer on Sept 4, the first day of school for AAPS, during the work day. The developer presented proposed modifications which do not address the key issues. There was no request for joint problem-solving. The "single family homes" suggested in the modification plan actually contain 5 individually locking bedroom & bathroom combinations with a kitchen and common area. These are not single family units at all. The development is not appropriate for the community in which it is to be built. Further, the traffic safety ratings for the intersections impacted by this development fall to level D and E. This rating allows the city to deny development until such time as this is addressed. This development is NOT a by-right development until this problem is solved. For these reasons city council should deny this request.

My main concern is safety for citizens and vehicles, which remains to be addressed. In today's Strong Towns article, Charles Marohn details Austin's issues related to Austin's growth, similar to our city's. He writes:

"Another structural problem was starting to creep up on Austin: stifling traffic congestion. When you grow the area served while simultaneously collecting everyone to a single choke point, your road network ceases to work. Austin finds itself forced to undertake some massive road expansion projects, just to pretend to do something about congestion."

I respectfully urge you to reject this proposed development until a traffic plan is developed that will address both congestion and safety issues, is scheduled for construction and funded.

A few observations: As now proposed, the developer is eliminating all six 6-bedroom units, but is increasing the number of five-bedroom units from 55 to 67. This includes the 11 E2 units (up from 3), which Trinitas now calls "single family homes." With 5 bedrooms, 5 bathrooms, at maybe \$4,000 a month rent, I don't think so. Also, there will be 109 more parking spaces (including 26 deferred spaces) than required by ordinance. Why? Because these are really 682 individual by-the-bedroom rental units, not 211. With a driver in every bedroom, they need the extra parking, yet still will come up short. All told, this site plan is a blatant gaming of R4A zoning. Our neighborhood has proposed 22 (authentic) single family homes, with no unit bigger than four bedrooms, as Trinitas did in Oxford, Ohio, and floor plans modified to allow marketing to non-students. Inclusivity, housing diversity, sustainability and affordability are our ideals--this project embodies the exact opposite. Thank you!



A driver must be able to see far enough ahead to avoid collisions. AASHTO standards exist for new driveways, so approaching drivers have time to react to exiting vehicles. The minimum sight distance required is a function of driving speed. Northbound drivers on Pontiac Trail must crest a steep hill before spotting the Cottages entrance. They then have 368 feet to avoid hitting drivers turning left there. The developer's traffic impact study concludes that's enough space, but barely--the minimum sight distance is 335 feet. However, the study assumes that vehicles are at the 30mph speed limit. 2015 SEMCOG speed data for that stretch of Pontiac Trail show the average vehicle moving at 45mph, not 30. Since kinetic energy is proportional to the square of speed, that difference brings the minimum sight distance for the driveway to 500 feet, much more than the 368 feet available to drivers to stop there in time. Therefore the current Cottages entrance will be the site of many future crashes.

I strongly oppose this development on the grounds that it does not meet the master plan developed by the city in cooperation with citizens of this community. The planning commission conceded that the developer is utilizing a loophole in existing zoning laws to push through a development that the zoning was never intended to support. Placing a community of over 700 18-22 year old college students within shouting distance of an established neighborhood will be cause for multiple nuisance calls to city officials. My own home, built within 20 feet of the property line, will end up being within 50 feet of one of these cottages. The neighborhood requested meetings with the developers on multiple occasions and were ignored until the planning commission voted no. Then the developers came through with far too little concessions, far too late in the cycle. Another concern I personally have is the drainage - routing the entire development into the small drainage ditch at the end of Skydale Dr.



We were also told that the city reports surge in residential use during summer months, and therefore has set cost structure & usage tiers based on this summer peak residential demand. If both of these statements are true, the city should have the ability to increase charges for service based not broadly on property type (Residential vs. Multi-family) but at a much finer grain, based only on address. Why should residential meter addresses who do not have sprinkler systems, for example, and therefore do not drive up demand in summer, be placed in the same punitive category as those addresses that do use H2O in excess? 
