- Resolution to Approve The Glen Mixed Use Development Modified PUD Site Plan, 201, 213, 215, 217 Glen Avenue and 1025 East Ann Street (CPC Recommendation: Approval 7 Yeas and 0 Nays) (Postponed from the September 16, 2019 Regular Session). Approval of this resolution will allow for the construction of a 9—story mixed-use hotel/residential/retail building.
- Resolution to Approve Weber PUD Site Plan and Development Agreement, 2857 Packard Road (CPC Recommendation: Approval - 7 Yeas and 1 Nays). Approval of this resolution will allow for 51 total dwelling units with 26 two-story townhouse units proposed in four buildings located inside the proposed ring road.

Ordinances - Second Readings.

A public hearing and an An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 55 (Zoning), Rezoning of 0.54 Acre from PUD (Planned Unit Development District) to PUD (Planned Unit Development District), The Glen Mixed Use Development PUD Zoning and Supplemental Regulations, 201, 213, 215, 217 Glen Avenue and 1025 East Ann Street (CPC Recommendation: Approval - 7 Yeas and 0 Nays) (Ordinance No. ORD-19-29). Approval of this ordinance will zone this property PUD to allow construction of a 9-story mixed-use hotel/residential/retail building.

- A public hearing and An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 55 (Zoning), Rezoning of 7.7 Acres from R1E (Single-Family Dwelling District) With Conditions to PUD (Planned Unit Development District), Weber Rezoning, 2857 Packard Road (CPC Recommendation: Approval 7 Yeas and 1 Nays). Approval of this resolution will rezone this 7/7 acre parcel from R1E to PUD to allow fifty-one total units, with 26 of these units located in four, two-story townhouse style units located on one parcel.
- A public hearing and An Ordinance to Amend Sections 5.15, 5.16.3, 5.19.2, and 5.37.2 of Chapter 55 (Unified Development Code) of Title V of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor (Marijuana Retailers, Marijuana Microbusinesses, Designated Marijuana Consumption Facilities) (Ordinance No. ORD-19-32). Approval of this ordinance are proposed to the Unified Development Code to regulate marijuana-related uses allowed by the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marijuana Act (MRTMA) and integrate these new use regulations within the existing marijuana-related regulations.
- A public hearing and An Ordinance to Amend the Title of all Sections of and to Add a New Section 7:613 to Chapter 96 (Medical Marijuana Facilities) of Title VII of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor (Ordinance No. ORD-19-31). Approval of this ordinance would amend Chapter 96, which currently requires City permits for medical marijuana facilities, by adding a requirement for a City permit for marijuana facilities.

Ordinances - First Reading.

- An Ordinance to Amend Sections 7:400, 7:401, 7:402, 7:403, 7:404, 7:405, and 7:406 of Chapter 93 (Alarm Systems) of Title VII of The Code Of The City Of Ann Arbor. The current alarm billing process and ordinance has not been updated in over ten years. Staff conducted an internal review and proposed improvements. Proposed changes allow each department to handle alarm billing autonomously. The Fire department will eliminate the use of a thirdparty vendor, which will reduce costs.
- An Ordinance to Amend Sections 5.13.9, 5.17.4, 5.18.6, 5.28.1, 5.28.6, 5.29.10, 5.30.1 and 5.37.2 of Chapter 55 (Unified Development Code) of Title V of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor (Premium Options, Affordable Housing Dwelling Units, Reimbursements). Amendments proposed to the Unified Development Code to allow change to the premium options by eliminating the residential use premium and affordable housing premium and offering an affordable residential premium option.
- An Ordinance to Amend Section 1:239 of Chapter 8 of the Code of the City Of Ann Arbor to Add a Public Art Commission Liaison to the Design Review Board. Approval of this ordinance amendment will authorize the Ann Arbor Public Art Commission to appoint a nonvoting liaison to the Design Review Board to provide comments to petitioners regarding the potential for incorporating private artwork into projects under review by the Design Review Board.
- An Ordinance to Amend the Code of the City of Ann Arbor by Adding a New Chapter, Which New Chapter Shall be Designated as Chapter 70 - Adult-Use Marihuana Establishments Of

Title VII of Said Code. Approval of this ordinance would create a new chapter that will temporarily opt out of the City allowing adult-use marihuana establishments, as allowed by the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act.

New Business (staff).

• Resolution Authorizing Summary Publication of Ordinance No. 19-31 - An Ordinance to Amend Sections 5.15, 5.16, 5.19 and 5.37 of Chapter 55 (Unified Development Code) of Title V of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor to specify regulations of uses established by the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act. This resolution authorizes the summary publication of Ordinance No. 19-31, which was approved by City Council on October 7, 2019.

Two – Cycle Power Equipment Ordinance. On April 1, City Council approved an <u>ordinance</u> prohibiting the use of outdoor power equipment with a two-cycle engine, that is not solely powered by electricity, in the DDA District. The ordinance went into effect on July 1, 2019. The DDA communicated the information directly to the four downtown neighborhood associations and other downtown properties and property managers. The information was also communication in three editions of the DDA newsletter, which goes directly to business and associations. Education and enforcement efforts are underway.

City Seeks Input to Shape Short-term Rental Property Policy. Whether for sports, entertainment, the vibrant downtown or lush parks, Ann Arbor is a destination for many. Some visitors stay at short-term rental properties, booked through companies such as AirBnB and VRBO.

The City of Ann Arbor is considering policies to regulate short-term rental properties. In order to create policies appropriate for Ann Arbor, the city is holding three <u>public meetings</u> (PDF) at Ann Arbor District Library (AADL) locations to gather input from residents. The meeting agenda will include examples from other communities and options for Ann Arbor. Light refreshments will be available. Children are welcome.
