To establish a solid foundation prior to an external launch, an internal City team has been researching and gaining a deeper understanding of: practices in other communities, existing City practices; and local and regional conditions related to equity. The project publicly launched in May with a call for steering committee This call went out through variety of channels, including a press release, social media, a broad distribution of flyers that included Meals on Wheels clients, an email announcement, the June community newsletter, a letter from the Ann Arbor Public Schools Superintendent to student families, direct outreach, and a public service announcement on CTN: https://youtu.be/m4 S3VtpyZM. In return we received almost 80 applications. Members of the project team reviewed the applications and used a systematic scoring process to select 30 applicants to serve on the steering committee. The project team found that the impressive and diverse pool of applicants made steering committee selection challenging. The project team notified all applicants of their selection status at the start of July and will host the first steering committee meeting on August 3 at 5pm. **Consent Agenda (19).** There are 19 items on the consent agenda.

**Public Hearings (1).** There is one (1) public hearing which is listed under second readings.

Ordinances - Second Readings (1)

• A public hearing and an Ordinance to Amend Section 8.530 of Chapter 105 (Housing: Entry to Show Premises and Time for Rental Agreements) of Title VII (Building Regulations) of the Ann Arbor City Code. This proposed amendment requires landlords to communicate the terms of a subsequent lease no later than 180 days and gives tenants a right to renew leases for residential premises within 210 days, unless just cause exists to not renew a lease. The ordinance defines the reasons and exceptions for just cause and prohibits a landlord from entering the premises to show them to prospective tenants until 210 days has passed.

### Ordinances - First Readings (4)

- An Ordinance to Amend Sections 5.25, 5.33, 5.37.2.B, 5.37.2.C, 5.37.2.F, 5.37.2.G, 5.37.2.I, 5.37.2.L, 5.37.2.P, and 5.37.2.S Of Chapter 55 (Unified Development Code) Of Title V of The Code of The City of Ann Arbor (Outdoor Lighting). The proposed amendments would expand the regulation of outdoor lighting in the following ways:
  - The regulations apply to any outdoor lighting in the City.
  - Temporary light installations on private property are allowed for 90 days in the exemptions. This could include holiday lights, art installations, special event lighting, etc. (Note, when such temporary displays occur on Non-Residentially zoned property, then they must comply with other provisions of the proposed code that prohibit movement, flashing, and other such characteristics).
  - Light trespass is limited to certain levels at the property line. Properties abutting residential zones have the strictest limits; D1 and D2 districts allow higher levels of light.
  - New light fixtures are to be fully or partially shielded, depending on the type of installation.
  - Decorative building and landscaping illumination is largely prohibited between midnight and 6 am, except for businesses open during those hours.
  - Parking lot lighting is limited to 6 Foot-candles and must be extinguished beyond business hours for non-residential uses. (Currently, the UDC requires less than

- one Foot-candle of lighting minimum, but it must remain on all night. No maximum is specified.)
- Nonconforming lighting may be maintained, however any replacement of outdoor luminaires must be compliant (i.e. use of compliant fixtures), and site plan would require full compliance.
- An Ordinance to Amend Section 5.16.6 of Chapter 55 (Unified Development Code) of Title
  V of The Code of the City of Ann Arbor (Home Occupations). The City has applied regulations
  and limitations to Home Occupations in the City Code. Over history, the regulations have
  sought to provide the opportunity for Home Occupation, however, to limit and regulate such
  uses to ensure that they do not have adverse impacts on neighboring properties,
  infrastructure, and safety.

Over the past year, there have been shifts in commerce, work patterns and methods, and for some, a blurring between residence and workplace. These changes have resulted in a handful of circumstances in which work was shifted to a home occupation nature, and perhaps not in full compliance with the City's current codes and standards.

Additionally, providing greater opportunity for more utilization of homes for Home Occupations could have the impact of reducing vehicle miles traveled in the City, helping to contribute to meeting the City's carbon neutrality goals.

In response, staff presented proposed amendments to the City's current Home Occupation regulations in April of 2021. The initial regulations presented were intended to improve the understanding and clarity of performance regulations, and to establish a more comprehensive and detailed list of permissible and prohibited home occupations. After community feedback, the Planning Commission reconsidered the action. As part of this reconsideration, modifications were drafted, and ultimately recommended for approval by the Planning Commission on May 18, 2021.

- An Ordinance to Add Chapter 123 (Prohibition of Conversion Therapy on Minors) to Title IX
   of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor. This ordinance prohibits the practice of sexual
   orientation and gender change efforts by licensed health care providers.
- An Ordinance to Amend Sections 7:360, 7:361 and 7:362 and to Amend by Adding New Sections Which Sections Shall Be Designated as 7:363, 7:364 and 7:365 of Chapter 91 (Endangered Species) of Title VII (Businesses and Trades) of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor. This ordinance renames Chapter 91 from "Endangered Species" to "Sale of Animal Products" and adds a provision that bans the sale of fur products in the City of Ann Arbor.

### Other

**City Launches New Online Short-term Rental Licensing System.** The City of Ann Arbor is continuing its efforts to launch additional components of the new online portal STREAM with the debut of short-term rental license registrations beginning Saturday, July 31.

"At your convenience from a computer, tablet or mobile device you can complete the application process and submit for review," said Building and Rental Services Manager Lisha Turner-Tolbert. Additionally, you can upload documents, submit payments and print issued licenses from your dashboard. An added convenience will be the automated renewal reminder customers will receive via the dashboard, and email notification, 60 days prior to expiration.

### Process details include:

- Apply through STREAM under the license tab, https://stream.a2gov.org/EnerGov Prod/selfservice/AnnArborMIProd#/home.
- Select short term rental license for the appropriate property structure.
- Licenses will be issued by the corresponding unit within the City of Ann Arbor. Please note the review process could take up to 21 business days.
- Properties with several units for rent will need a separate license for each unit. The fee for each license is \$500 to be paid at the time of application submission.
- The application fee includes police, fire treasury and rental review, administration cost for processing and the certificate to post onsite.
- Each license will be renewed on an annual basis (one year from the date of issuance). Short Term rentals that fail to register and retain a license will be subject to enforcement.
