Ordinances - First Readings (1).

An Ordinance to Add Chapter 104 (Energy and Water Benchmarking) to Title VIII of the
Code of the City of Ann Arbor. In November 2019, Ann Arbor's City Council unanimously
adopted a Climate Emergency Declaration committing to charting a path for how the
entire Ann Arbor community could achieve carbon neutrality by the year 2030. In June
2020, City Council unanimously adopted the A²ZERO Carbon Neutrality Plan, a document
created with input from thousands of Ann Arborites to lay out seven strategies for our
community to achieve carbon neutrality.

The A²ZERO Plan seeks to ensure that buildings in Ann Arbor - which account for 65% of total community-wide greenhouse gas emissions - are as energy and water efficient as possible, and benchmarking is one of the actions identified in the A²ZERO Plan.

Benchmarking is measuring and reporting the energy and water usage of a building which allows for the evaluation of a building's usage over time and for comparison to similar buildings which enables better decision-making around building energy and water use thereby helping occupants and owners save money and energy while improving comfort and health.

Benchmarking allows owners and occupants (whether existing or prospective) to understand the relative energy and water usage and efficiency of benchmarked buildings

as well as relative to others similar buildings. This information helps with strategic decisions that will help save money and energy while improving comfort and health. With energy and water costs accounting for an average of 26.8% of office building operating costs nationally, and data showing that 30% of energy consumed in buildings is used inefficiently or unnecessarily, efficiency improvements can help building owners and tenants significantly reduce utility bills. These savings can be put toward other needs such as the purchase of goods and services, which drive local economic activity. Making buildings and properties in Ann Arbor, including City-owned buildings, more energy efficient also helps creates jobs at all skill levels, and frees up money to flow back into the local economy.

Commercial and multifamily benchmarking and transparency is an easy way to get data and information on how buildings are performing into the hands of their owners and managers. Owners will be able to look across their portfolio to identify opportunities for energy and financial savings, and they can understand how their buildings are performing relative to others of similar characteristics. The benchmarking program will provide consistent and relevant information to the market, so that tenants, renters, and occupants can make informed decisions (similar to MPG ratings on cars).

The proposed ordinance and benchmarking program will encourage energy efficiency in large buildings across Ann Arbor - on average, buildings that benchmark consistently save 7% of energy consumption, resulting in financial savings as well. Improving the energy efficiency of Ann Arbor buildings will provide economic and health benefits to the Ann Arbor community.

Secrest Nature Preserve, in the Superior Greenway, is Open to the Public. The 80-acre preserve, owned by Southeast Michigan Land Conservancy (SMLC), is a late 2019 addition to the Superior Greenway, a 2,700+-acre wildlife and public recreation corridor, located in Superior Township. The acquisition was made possible with significant support from the county, who holds the

Swift Run Dog Park to Undergo Year-long Maintenance Project. Beginning Monday, Oct. 4, Swift Run Dog Park, located at 4000 Platt Road, will close half of the large-dog area for extensive maintenance. The year-long project will include new fencing, replacing turf and allowing the turf to establish over the winter and spring. Fence replacement will take place on the southwest corner of the park and includes 370 feet of new fencing. Intermittent closures of the large-dog area may occur while temporary fencing is installed in October.

When the turf is ready next spring, the project will change to the other side of the large-dog area with a similar six-month timeline for new turf establishment. Throughout the project, one side of the large-dog area will always remain open. The small-dog area will not be impacted by this project and will remain open throughout the year.

Argo Livery to Temporarily Close During Construction. The Argo Livery will be closed due to construction, which started the week of Sept. 20, 2021, and is expected to be complete early spring 2022. Improvements to the livery, 1055 Longshore Drive in Ann Arbor, are focused on improving accessibility with a goal of universal access for all users. Elements include new and improved accessible parking lot, walks, fishing dock, site furnishings and EZ launch kayak docks. The restrooms will also be renovated as part of the project. In order to improve site drainage, a raingarden is being installed to capture stormwater runoff.

During construction, the entire livery site will be closed to visitors. Signs and barricades will be installed to safely direct users away from the construction zone. The city asks that users of the adjacent trail follow the posted detour as they ride, walk, rollerblade and commute along this path. We thank you for your patience as we make these improvements to this important and popular part of the Ann Arbor park system.

Water Meter Replacements Nearly Complete – Residents Encouraged to Schedule their Appointments. The City of Ann Arbor has reached a milestone in its water meter replacement project, completing nearly three-quarters of the installations, a total of 19,146 meters, as of Aug. 12, 2021. The project, which began last year, has continued despite the COVID pandemic. Residents who had previously requested a delay in the work, due to health and safety concerns, and are now feeling comfortable to have the work performed, are encouraged to make

The City of Ann Arbor has been replacing water meters in Ann Arbor as they have come to the end of their useful life. In addition, technicians with Utility Metering Solutions (UMS), Ann Arbor's contractor performing the upgrades, have been performing inspections on water lines for compliance with the State of Michigan's new Lead and Copper Rules. The entire process takes 30-60 minutes with water service interruptions lasting no more than 15-20 minutes.

UMS staff take precautions to ensure the health and safety of residents and themselves. These include physical distancing, use of gloves and face coverings when interacting with customers. Installers also go through daily temperature checks, screening questions and routinely clean/disinfect their tools and tablets. Customers will be offered face coverings and asked if anyone in the household/ business has experienced symptoms or has been in close contact with someone who has.

City Seeks Artists for Water Treatment Plant Mural. The City of Ann Arbor is seeking an artist(s) to create and complete a painted mural in the stairwell of the Ann Arbor Water Treatment Plant Administration Building. The plant, originally constructed in 1938, with a rated capacity of 50 million gallons of water per day, seeks to enhance the educational experience provided by staff to the public. The stairwell is approximately 8'W x 18'L x 21'H. The award will provide \$17,000 for the work, which shall be completed by November 2022 or earlier. The first application deadline is Oct. 31, 2021. **Applications** can be obtained at www.a2gov.org/watermural.

As a way of educating the public about how the city collects and treats its drinking water, the city conducts extensive public outreach. This includes a water plant open house each May and frequent tours to schools throughout southeast Michigan. Over the course of a year, more than 2,000 people visit the city's water treatment plant. The tours highlight the history of the plant, its raw water sources, its treatment processes and they city's commitment to delivering safe drinking water exceeding all regulatory requirements. Additionally, the mural shall become part of the city's public art program through the Ann Arbor Public Art Commission, giving the mural wider visibility.
