CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Hieftje called the meeting to order at 7:07 p.m. in the Guy C. Larcom, Jr. Building, 2nd Floor Council Chambers, 301 E. Huron St.

1. Tom Partridge - The MLK freedom March must continue. Give priority to providing access to public participation to all city government meetings, affordable housing and public transportation. Write in Tom Partridge for Fifth Ward Council Representative.

Tom Partridge, Ann Arbor resident, addressed Council regarding the need to continue the MLK Freedom March, giving priority to providing access to public participation to all City government meetings, affordable housing and public transportation. He also announced himself as a write-in candidate for the Fifth Ward Council Representative.

2. Jim Mogensen - Downtown Development Authority Ordinance (B-1)

Jim Mogensen expressed concern with the proposed Downtown Development Authority Ordinance. He said that the basic idea is to make sure that the City can function well and there should be a way to make that happen. He also spoke about his concerns with the budget.

3. Roger Rayle - Resolution regarding Cleanup Criteria for the 1,4 Dioxane Plume, Based on EPA Standards (DC-2)

Roger Rayle, 3141 N. Wagner Rd., spoke in support of the proposed resolution requesting the MDEQ to set cleanup criteria for the 1,4 Dioxane Plume. He said that he was pleased to see that Council is taking action on this issue. He stated he is very concerned about how the plume will affect the water supply in the future.

4. Jeff Hayner - Environmental Issues (DB-2, DB-3, DC-2)

Jeff Hayner, 1807 Pontiac Trail, spoke in support of the resolution encouraging Community Solar Development in Ann Arbor. Mr. Hayner also supported the resolution from the Energy Commission asking the City of Ann Arbor Employees' Retirement System to divest from the top 200 publicly-traded fossil fuel companies. Finally, Mr. Hayner spoke in support of the resolution urging the MDEQ to set responsible cleanup criteria for the Pall Gelman 1,4 Dioxane Plume based on current EPA standards.

5. Mike Shriberg - Divestment Resolution (DB-2)

Mike Shriberg, 1473 Pine Valley Blvd., stated he was speaking on behalf of the Energy Commission in support of the resolution encouraging Community Solar Development and the resolution urging the Employees' Retirement System to divest from the top 200 publicly traded fossil fuel companies.

6. Monica Patel - Divestment Resolution (DB-2)

Monica Patel, 1519 Arborview Blvd., spoke on behalf of the Ecology Center in support of the Resolution urging the City of Ann Arbor Employees' Retirement System to divest from the top 200 publicly-traded fossil fuel companies, and the Resolution Encouraging Community Solar Development in Ann Arbor. Ms. Patel said that she collected signatures from Ann Arbor residents who are in support and she submitted them into the record.

7. Mark Koroi - Resolution Approving 2013 Council Rules (DC-1)

Mark Koroi addressed Council regarding the proposed changes to Council Rules.

8. Henry Herskovitz - Weekly Vigils at Beth Israel

Henry Herskovitz, addressed Council regarding the weekly vigils held outside the Beth Israel congregation. He reminded Council of the First Amendment rights of the protestors.

COUNCILMEMBER BRIERE

Councilmember Briere stated the report from the North Main Huron River Task Force was placed on the table for Council to review. She stated she was planning to have a presentation of the report at the next meeting of Council. Councilmember Briere stated the review by Planning Commission of the D1 zoning may be delayed until October.

COUNCILMEMBER PETERSEN

Councilmember Petersen invited Council to Liberty Plaza on Sunday, September 15 at 1:00 p.m. for the sensory garden dedication.

COUNCILMEMBER KAILASAPATHY

Councilmember Kailasapathy spoke about the City's crosswalk ordinance. She stated she has received many comments and complaints from residents. Councilmember Kailasapathy stated she would like a recommendation from a traffic engineer regarding the safety of the City's crosswalks as written in this ordinance.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR

City Administrator Steve Powers reported on the following:

WASTEWATER OVERFLOW

Mr. Powers informed Council and the public that the City experienced a wastewater overflow in the Nichols Arboretum, which reached the Huron River. City crews quickly reacted to the report and cleared the blockage in the sanitary line that was causing the overflow. Because the sewage reached the Huron River, the City of Arbor took the immediate precaution of closing canoe livery trips in the vicinity, from Argo to Gallup, on Thursday and through Friday. Any body contact is not recommended for at least 24 hours after a known release of raw sewage to waterways. *Mr.* Powers stated that the news reports were quite accurate on the incident.

PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS

Mr. Powers responded to Councilmember Kailasapathy's concerns regarding the City's Crosswalk Ordinance. He stated the City's engineering staff are reviewing the ordinance and a status report will be provided to Council.

FIRE ON LINCOLN STREET

Mr. Powers acknowledged and thanked the staff of the Ann Arbor Fire Department for a job well done responding to a reported structure fire earlier today on Lincoln Street. Mr. Powers stated the owner of the home contacted him to say thanks to the AAFD for their quick response and professional service.

Andy Wakeland, PE, of Giffels Webster Engineers, spoke on behalf of the petitioner. He addressed some of the concerns that had been raised regarding the sidewalks and pedestrian access. Mr. Wakeland was available to answer any questions of Council.

Jeff Ryntz, of Victor Saroki & Associates Architects PC, architect for the project, stated all of the concerns have been addressed and he urged Council to approve this amendment so that the project could move forward again.

Councilmember Briere offered the following amendment to the resolution, which was considered friendly by Councilmember Warpehoski:

WHEREAS, THOUSANDS OF RESIDENTS OF THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR AND NEIGHBORING MUNICIPALITIES INCLUDING SCIO TOWNSHIP, ANN ARBOR TOWNSHIP, HAVE BEEN WORKING FOR OVER 20 YEARS FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE SURFACE AND GROUND WATERS OF THE STATE FROM THE CONTINUING THREAT AND ACTUAL CONTAMINATION FROM 1, 4-DIOXANE CONTAMINATION ORIGINATING AT THE PALL/GELMAN SCIENCES, INC. ("PGSI") WAGNER ROAD FACILITY, AND FOR EFFECTIVE CONTAINMENT AND PROPER TREATMENT OF WATERS ALREADY IMPACTED BY THE CONTAMINATION;

Whereas, The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) establishes generic cleanup criteria for hazardous substances under the authority of Part 201 of the Michigan Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, that are intended to be protective of human health and the environment from a variety of exposure pathways;

Whereas, These criteria are used by MDEQ in enforcement actions against polluters and other liable parties;

Whereas, The current MDEQ 1,4-dioxane generic residential drinking water cleanup criterion was set a number of years ago at 85 parts per billion (ppb) to result in a one-in-a-hundred-thousand (1 in 100,000) residual cancer risk;

Whereas, In 2010, US EPA published a toxicological review of 1,4-dioxane recommending a steeper cancer slope factor, effectively lowering the drinking water residual cancer risk levels to 35 ppb for 1 in 10,000 and 3.5 ppb for 1 in 100,000;

Whereas, The US EPA has categorized 1,4-dioxane as a non-threshold carcinogen;

Whereas, California and Illinois lowered their drinking water guidance levels to 1 ppb, while Massachusetts set its guidance at 0.3 ppb;

Whereas, The MDEQ missed its self-imposed deadline of December 2012 to set new standards or cleanup criteria for 1,4-dioxane, which were to be based on the EPA toxicological review;

Whereas, The MDEQ's deadline for revising the cleanup criteria administrative rules was extended until December 31, 2013; however it appears to be unlikely that the MDEQ will meet that deadline;

Whereas, The Pall-Gelman plume has been of ongoing concern to Ann Arbor and surrounding communities given the risks to public, human health and the environment;

Whereas, The footprint of the Pall-Gelman 1,4-dioxane plume continues to expand, although the extent of that expansion is not clearly defined;

Whereas, Additional data and modeling, are needed to help define and predict

the areas, direction and rate of expansion of its1,4-dioxane plume;

Whereas, Ann Arbor has been unsuccessful in its efforts to be considered by the Circuit Court for Washtenaw County as an interested party in the lawsuit brought by the Michigan Attorney General on behalf of the MDEQ against Pall-Gelman regarding the Pall-Gelman 1,4-dioxane plume and its cleanup;

Whereas, Pall-Gelman has not been required by the MDEQ and the Circuit Court for Washtenaw County to predict with sufficient accuracy the areas, direction and rate of expansion of its 1,4-dioxane plume; and

RESOLVED, That the City of Ann Arbor City Council urges the MDEQ to [act responsibly and] protect the public health and environment of Michigan under the authority delegated to the State under the Clean Water Act;

RESOLVED, That the City of Ann Arbor City Council urges the MDEQ to use the best science now available from EPA, including but not limited to the classification of 1,4-dioxane as a non-threshold carcinogen, to set cleanup criteria that are protective of public health and the environment for 1,4-dioxane and other chemicals;

RESOLVED, That the City of Ann Arbor City Council directs the city administrator and city staff to explore other actions available to the city, including but not limited to meeting with the MDEQ to aid in setting appropriate cleanup criteria for 1,4-dioxane in Michigan, including the Pall-Gelman plume and without site specific criteria for the Pall-Gelman plume;

RESOLVED, That the City of Ann Arbor City Council directs the city administrator and city staff to explore other actions available to the city, including but not limited to meeting with and petitioning the EPA to aid in setting appropriate cleanup criteria for 1,4-dioxane in Michigan, including the Pall-Gelman plume and without site specific criteria for the Pall-Gelman plume, and to cooperate with other local units of government to ensure protection of public health and the environment; and

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Washtenaw County delegation to the Michigan Legislature, the Governor of the State of Michigan, the Director of the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and Congressman John D Dingell.
