Dear City Council Members:

I spoke earlier this evening to advocate for City Council maintaining Ann Arbor's commitment to and support for public art through the Percent for Art program.

It is likely that, by now, you have cast your vote (my apologies for leaving early, additional art advocacy work to be done). However I wanted to bring something else to your attention.

During the public hearing a gentleman stood up to speak. He began to present poetry--performance poetry--relating to issues of housing and homelessness. Mayor Hieftje reminded him that his commentary at this time needed to relate specifically to the Percent for Art proposal, which I understand and makes sense for the proceedings. However, the fact that his intended remarks were poetry--publicly presented art--should not be lost or forgotten.

The public art program should not be limited to art that sits stationary in plazas and in front of buildings. These items absolutely have their place, and should be supported, encouraged, and continued. Being able to walk throughout the city and experience visual art makes our town a safer and more enjoyable place to visit and live.

That said, the City should also champion public art initiatives that include education, performance, and art experiences. Art making promotes skill building, community engagement, and even just good clean (or appropriately messy) fun. The idea of a percent for art program that supports internships, apprenticeships, and network building amongst community members, businesses, and local organizations is brilliant, and addresses several of the issues that opponents of public art perpetually hold up. A dynamic Percent for Art program is entirely capable of: community buy-in through community engagement in all aspects of the process, creating safe public spaces (perhaps through beautiful and creative lighting), and providing employment and job training to local community members.

Whatever vote has already been cast, I sincerely hope that you can see public art as something that adds to and creates value for our town, and something that requires the City's support. A dynamic, engaging, educational, and expressive public art program is an asset, and an indicator of forward-thinking leaders.

Jane,

Nice job at the council meeting tonight. You're quickly establishing yourself as the steward of the taxpayer's funds on the council. I am a huge fan of the greenbelt. I spend quite a bit of time in Boulder, and you can really see the beneficial effects of the greenbelt there. The difference (aside from the fact that the Boulder greenbelt is supported by the city sales tax), though, is that Boulder was proactive -- first establishing the greenbelt in the late-1960s, before the urban sprawl from Denver really developed. A2 is reactive, playing catchup. which is still better than not doing anything, but is a totally different model. I was very intrigued by what you said about the possibility of presenting the option to the voters at some time to repurpose funds in the greenbelt reserve -- sounds like we still have a lot of money there that could be better used somewhere else.

Can I get a copy of the investment policy discussed in item DS-1? Thanks.
