




\* The most common reason for a funding request was an unexpected expense





\*\*Disbursements covered <u>94% of total past due rent owed by all applicants</u> (\$814,812/\$868,469).

\*\*96% of accepted applicants had <u>all</u> their past due rent covered by the City of Ann Arbor disbursement.
