Dear Planning Commission,

On May 19, 2026 you declined to approve the Greenhills school expansion. I understand this may be coming up for another vote/review this month.

I have since learned that the current enrollment is not 595 as I had be told but was instead 719 (2025-2026) with a higher number expected next year. I have also learned that Greenhills has not registered their enrollment with the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) since 2024. This means Greenhills has not met the legal requirements for reporting since 2024 and are thus not recognized as a nonpublic school in Michigan.

It should be noted that while the "take over" of Greenhills Drive during the school year significantly impacts the safety and access to 174 households and many more individuals, MANY of the students attending Greenhills are from outside of Ann Arbor.

Greenhills Drive parking needs to be eliminated or seriously reduced for the safely of Earhart Village residents. Just recently, during Greenhills School graduation, cars parked in front of no parking signs and fire hydrants. Greenhills cars parked in our private parking areas and when confronted at least one person made a rude comment to the resident. This shows little common courtesy or regard for the safely of the community.

I would like to understand what agency or department oversees the enrollment/capacity of a building for educational purposes. I cannot imagine there is no oversight. Perhaps in the area of zoning there are controls on building capacity and impact on neighbors.

It seems Greenhills has the ability and land behind the building to create parking. That requirement should be added to this site improvement plan prior to any approval.

It should be noted that if at some point the Planning Commission approves a version of the Greenhills expansion it still needs to go the MDE for review and approval.

I would d urge you to pause this expansion until such time that the impact on the neighborhood can be drastically reduced.
