Dear Planning Commission,

I was just looking at the artist's rendering of the proposed new development at 228 Packard and E Madison. Some of the recent developments in the neighborhood look pretty attractive. The block that is proposed, though, doesn't show any balconies.

Building new residential developments without the hugely popular, attractive, healthy and useful inclusion of balconies is unheard of in many parts of the world. They immediately signal that the lives of the residents are considered, rather than just a "how-many-can-we-squish-in-here" mentality. They make the building look more open to the neighborhood, without any reduction in security, and in turn make the residents feel more like part of the neighborhood.

I sincerely hope that you will consider urgently updating your planning regulations to require balconies for urban developments of this kind, *without excluding accommodation intended for students or nurses* (who are not second class citizens).

Additionally, mature trees should be independently assessed for retention, and in certain cases relocation, including taking into account our increasingly threatened urban wildlife - birds, insects and other species, rather than lazily destroying them all to replace with uniform and suboptimal saplings.
