Subject: As you consider the Capital Bid

Please remove the "Narrowing of the Wallingford/Harding Intersection" from the Capital Bid.

Why?

1.) Council has said they want a "collaborative model of public engagement" There was no effective public engagement on this project.

2.) I wrote to the project engineer about my concerns for this intersection. I received the answer, "the decision to reconfigure this intersection is final". I take that as unwillingness to engage with anyone with an opposing viewpoint. This does not sound like a collaborative attitude.

3.) The Wallingford/Harding intersection poses no safety hazard.. There is no record of an accident in 10 years.

4.) "Traffic Calming" is not necessary. No data shows that traffic is speeding here, or that pedestrians have difficulty crossing.

5.) Narrowing pavement will make this intersection less safe. Forcing cars, bicycles and pedestrians into a smaller space creates the probability of more accidents.

Now, if you want to do something that does need your attention, please FIX ANN ARBOR'S POTHOLES. They are a safety hazard.
