## SAFETY NOTES

### Safety Update *Local Measles Case*

On March 11, 2026, the Washtenaw County Health Department announced a case of measles was identified locally in an unvaccinated adult. A second suspect case was later identified. Measles can be highly contagious and spreads through the air. Individuals who have been vaccinated are considered immune, but unvaccinated individuals who are exposed to the virus are likely to become ill. The Health Department has [published](#) locations where exposure to these individuals was possible.

According to the Health Department, the measles vaccine is highly effective and very safe. A single dose of measles vaccine is about 93% effective at preventing measles, while two doses are about 97% effective. It is also effective if used within 72 hours of measles exposure to prevent illness. The Health Department has urged people to protect themselves and their families with MMR vaccination if they haven't already.

We received an enthusiastic response from the community and in a matter of hours, the secure drop-off receptacles were filled with electronics to be refurbished or recycled. - **Celebrating HERD Day!** March 12, 2026, marked the 2-year anniversary of Ann Arbor's Home Energy Rating Disclosure (HERD) ordinance. Since its creation in 2024, the HERD ordinance has provided over

1,000 Ann Arbor Homes with a free Home Energy Score. The HERD Ordinance helps homebuyers understand their potential energy usage by requiring sellers to obtain a Home Energy Score Report before listing their home for sale, and to publish the information in the home’s public listing. This report provides information on a home’s projected energy use so prospective buyers can consider the full cost of home ownership in their decision making.

## OTHER

**Stay Informed as Ann Arbor Plans for Busy Road Construction Season.** Ann Arbor’s 2026 construction season will be one of the busiest in recent memory. A convergence of long-planned capital improvements, major utility upgrades, transportation investments, and private development will result in a significant volume of work concentrated in and around the downtown core this spring, summer and fall. Downtown Ann Arbor will remain open for business, special events will proceed and parking structures will be accessible.

The 2026 construction schedule is being finalized. In the coming weeks, more detailed timelines and traffic impact information will be shared to help residents, visitors, employers and employees plan accordingly.

**Ann Arbor City Council approved \$20 million for road repairs and utility improvements this year.** The Ann Arbor City Council on March 2 approved roughly \$21.6 million for road, utility and mobility projects across Ann Arbor that will largely be completed in 2026 between April and November. **Ann Arbor SEU Invites Residents to Express Interest in Local Renewal Energy.** Ann Arbor’s Sustainable Energy Utility is soliciting expressions of interest from residents and businesses as the city plans to hook its first customers up to clean, renewable energy later this year.

To encourage people to sign up, the city has released a brief, animated video produced by Ann Arbor’s Kohlitz Animation and Production that provides an overview of the Sustainable Energy Utility.

**Ann Arbor Launches Community Engagement on Possible Decommissioning of Outdoor Warning Siren System.** The City of Ann Arbor is inviting community members to share feedback on the possible decommissioning of the city’s outdoor warning siren system.

Ann Arbor is considering retiring its 22 outdoor warning sirens because newer emergency alert technologies provide clearer, more detailed instructions to residents during emergencies.

From March through October, Ann Arbor’s sirens are tested at 1 p.m. on the second Tuesday of each month with a one-minute wail. The sirens are an outdoor warning system only and are not intended to be heard indoors. When activated, they serve as an attention-getting tool and instruct residents to “go in and tune in” to other information sources for details. In the past five years, the sirens have been activated twice — both in July 2023 — to alert people to severe weather, including during the Ann Arbor Art Fair. The current system is aging and requires ongoing investment. The city expects to spend approximately \$60,000 annually over the next three years on repairs, followed by roughly \$17,000 per year in maintenance costs.
