I am writing once again to oppose the 2525 Ann Arbor Saline parcel proposed development however, I would like to propose development alternatives for that parcel within our $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ mile already overly developed neighborhood zone. They are listed below and I urge some consideration:

- 1. Reject the residential design and build housing that is smaller in size and height, more affordable, and falls within the city's comprehensive plan to advance their 3 goals. The developer's proposal does not advance these 3 goals
- 2. The City of Ann Arbor either purchase this parcel from the developer or swap this parcel with the city so that the developer can build a new residential area somewhere else beyond this small congested area.
- 3. The city can encourage the developer/owner of this parcel to move this development to Pittsfield Township, across the bridge on Ann Arbor Saline in the out-lot in front of Target and near their proudly touted Centerra Pointe apartment in Pittsfield Township (which is not affordable).
- 4. Lastly, the City of Ann Arbor to purchase or swap this parcel with the Developer and create an extension of Cranbrook Park. It could be used as a beautiful first City of Ann Arbor pavilion park to serve as a major entry to the City of Ann Arbor when

entering from 194. There could be signage similar to the newly installed Hollywood-style Detroit sign installed ahead of the NFL draft
