SAFETY NOTES

Safety Update *Things are Heating Up!*

Memorial Day has passed, marking the unofficial start of summer and bringing with it summer like heat. Heat-related illnesses can develop quickly, especially during periods of high humidity and prolonged exposure to the sun. One of the most important measures used to assess heat risk is the heat index. The heat index combines the actual air temperature with relative humidity to determine how hot it feels to the human body. When humidity is high, sweat evaporates more slowly, making it harder for the body to cool itself. For example, an air temperature of 90°F with high humidity can feel like 100°F or more, increasing the risk of heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

To reduce the risk of heat-related injury or illness, follow these simple precautions:

- Drink plenty of water throughout the day, even if you don't feel thirsty.
- Wear lightweight, loose-fitting, and light-colored clothing.
- Limit your exposure by performing physically demanding work or exercise during the cooler hours of morning and evening.
- Never leave children, older adults, or pets in parked vehicles.
- Check on neighbors, friends, and family members who may be more vulnerable to heat.
- Be able to recognize the [signs and symptoms](#) of heat stress, heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

The CDC's [Heat Risk](#) website allows you to enter your zip code to get today's heat risk rating, along with helpful tips. It is a great resource to enjoy the outdoors and stay safe.
