Mayor Taylor:

Don't interfere with my freedom of speech! I am entitled to it under the Open Meetings Act.

For the first time in 18 years, a Mayor (you) has just censored the title of my public commentary talk to Ann Arbor City Council, which is scheduled for tonight, August 17, 2020.

The only free speech we are allowed at City Council is our public commentary.

The title of my talk tonight, as I read it to Mimi at the City Clerk's office, was this:

"Don't let IDF Eyer and her treasurer turn Ann Arbor City Council into an army for Israel."

Never has any Mayor dared -- until now -- to censor the title I have chosen for my own public commentary at Ann Arbor City Council.

Yet tonight the Mayor (if you are still in charge of the Agenda) has totally deleted any mention of Eyer and her treasurer (that's Joan Lowenstein) from the title of my speech.

The Mayor's censored Agenda for tonight is attached.

You'll notice the teeth have been pulled from my talk's title for tonight. It has been reduced to this title:

"Don't turn Ann Arbor City Council into an army for Israel"

I would ask "Who are you protecting?" Just how hell-bent are you on protecting IDF Eyer and Lowenstein from criticism?

There is no law, policy or process that on its own can achieve the full mitigation of harm potential in a community.

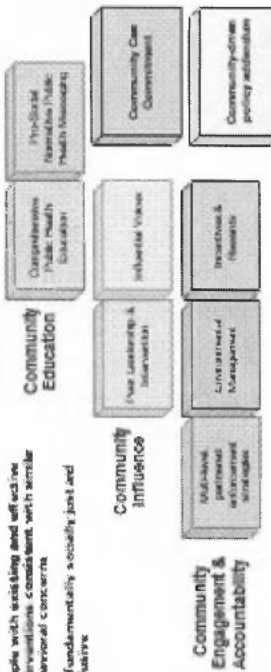
- However, the way we proceed will speak to what we value as a community. Therefore, to achieve the best possible outcomes which uphold our values of quality, dignity, diversity, equality, equity, inclusion, transparency, and safety, a well-being, social and public health informed approach should:
- Align with clearly articulated public health guidance
- Align with core values of the institution
- Couple with existing and well-timed interventions consistent with similar behavioral concerns
- Be fundamentally socially just and inclusive

Of the many considerations for a public health informed national health, community engagement and community commitment form dual foundational pillars of allocatable community health reduction in equity.

Core Pillars of an Accountable Community



Culture of Care Spectrum



Community Care Commitment
Wolverine Culture of Care: Creation of a shared, community-wide vision of public health informed expectations. Currently under development with student leadership (Student Government, Campus Climate Action Committee (CCAC), COVID Challenge partners, etc.). Utilized for all students and featured on high profile digital platforms and through other effective communication strategies (such as Campus Media and Blue Print Campaign) including high impact student groups.

Community-Driven Policy Addendum
University Readiness: Affirm necessary public health expectations and accountability measures in residential contracts through a COVID-specific, student-crafted addendum to meet the public health need.
CIC Campus: Initiate a streamlined community-wide process to review and determine a formalized addendum to the Statement of Student Rights and Responsibilities, creating public health expectations which align existing and adaptable accountability provisions with necessary, transparently implemented, and regularly updated institutional of restrictive community practices and leading activity per outcomes.

Peer Leadership & Intervention

Student-Centered Engagement: Ongoing engagement with core student leadership including Central Student Government, NASHBEN, Student Government, Student and Campus Climate Action Committee, and other student organizations. The COVID-19 response will utilize these organizations and student leaders to address the needs of the campus.

Influential Voices

Peer Educator Initiatives: Utilized upon existing social hygienic intervention training experiences. Student skills to safety interventions where the potential for harm may be high.

Comprehensive Public Health Education

Educational Mandates: Clearly communicated public health information related to the best available guidance from community, state and federal public health experts.

Multi-level, Partnered Enforcement Strategies

Enforcement Partnerships: Utilize existing relationships and partnerships to utilize a common set of best practices and procedures for enforcement. Address any accountability strategies for the purpose of effectively ensuring harm reduction.

Environmental Management

Behavioral Adaptation: Utilize existing checklists, signage, thoughtful furniture placement, community configurations (not for physical distancing).

Incentives & Rewards

Recognition: Although a public health response is timely sufficient, providing public recognition for personal and address-oriented behaviors and community accountability can serve to reduce the normalizing of behaviors essential for a safer community.

Pro-Social Normative Public Health Messaging

Multi-Level Messaging: Multi-pronged approach to public health messaging, delivered through pre-recorded communications, new student & graduate orientation, residence hall meetings and signage, F&S, chapel messages, student affairs meetings, student organization meetings, targeted emails, social media engagement and establish a student-led public health campaign.

Community & Campus Expert Working - Overview

To review and operationalize the Wolverine Culture of Care model, several groups of student leaders are being engaged in the development. Additionally, our expertise is being shared as an academic partner. The Office of the General Counsel will continue to provide legal advice and the University Counsel and Public Health Collaborative will also be engaged for comprehensive review.



Wolverine Culture of Care

To provide the best campus experience possible in the context of this historic threat to the health and well-being of all, we understand that consistently making careful and healthy choices to keep the entire community as safe as possible is a collective responsibility shared by students, faculty, staff and Ann Arbor residents.

As such, Wolverines are committed to caring for ourselves and to be respectful of our impact on the health of others, by carrying out the following:

- **MONITOR, SELF-ISOLATE & PARTICIPATE:**

Protect the community through vigilant self-monitoring for symptoms and self-isolate if/when symptoms do develop or you are in contact with an individual with symptoms. Avoid and/or minimize travel and the hosting of guests throughout the semester. Participate in testing, isolation/quarantine and contact tracing as suggested by health care providers and required by public health officials.

- **COVER, DISTANCE & OBSERVE GATHERING LIMITS:**

Wear face covering in public spaces, maintain 6 feet or more of personal distance and limit group gatherings as directed in accordance with prevailing public health directives and guidance.

- **WASH, CLEAN & FLU VACCINE:**

Engage in enhanced health-positive practices, including regular hand washing, keeping personal and shared spaces clean and getting the flu vaccine when available.

- **EDUCATE, INNOVATE & SPREAD AWARENESS:**

Educate self and others on health-positive fact-based information, innovate to achieve community well-being and spread awareness of disparate impacts and realities of COVID-19 in marginalized and vulnerable communities.

- **PROMOTE HOLISTIC WELL-BEING:**

Observe and integrate all dimensions of well-being important to a thriving community. Physical, emotional/mental, environmental, financial, occupational, social, intellectual and spiritual.

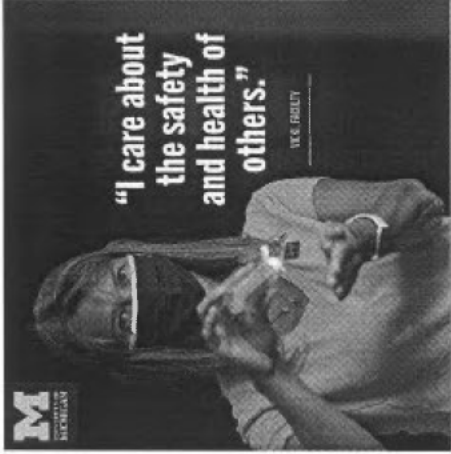



Accountability Measures Have Been



Augmented at the Group and Individual Levels:

1. **Group Accountability** - Recognized student organizations are held accountable via the Student Organization Advancement and Recognition (SOAR) process; a COVID-19 addition covering physical distancing, gathering sizes, out-of-area travel, contact tracing and wearing face coverings were added and communication with student organizations is underway.

Self-Governance actions taken by leaders within student groups, supported by campus administrators and advisors has been one of our most effective means of encouraging compliance with public health recommendations off-campus. Fraternity and Sorority Life has a long history of actively practicing self-governance; other high impact groups have been similarly engaged.

2. **Individual Accountability** - a time-limited addendum to the *The Statement of Student Rights and Responsibilities* (the Statement) was proposed and sponsored by CSG, reviewed and approved by SRAC, reviewed by OGC, modified by the VPSL with legal guidance, and finalized by President Schlissel.
3. **Students living in residence halls are also accountable to a COVID clause within their housing contracts.**

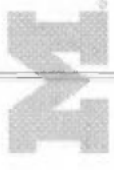

Joint Letters to Student Leaders (Deans/Associate Deans & DOS)

Wolverine Culture of Care - Ambassador Program

- **On Campus** - faculty, staff and students in existing roles designated as WCC Public Health Ambassadors after completing online training
- **Off-Campus** - existing roles and newly hired students, faculty/staff/community volunteers and community engagement officers performing neighborhood canvassing during key times



Michigan Ambassador Program Details:

Canvassing teams of 2-3 individuals (students, staff/faculty/other volunteers and Community Engagement officers from Division of Public Safety and Security (DPSS) and AAPD) will work from noon-midnight seven days/week initially and then Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays (noon-midnight) throughout the fall term.

These teams will travel across campus and through the near campus neighborhoods to serve as a visible presence and reminder to students and other community members of the need to follow public health guidance.

- Initial operations from August 20-30 will be seven days/week
- Labor Day weekend will be Thursday-Sunday evenings (9/3-6)
- Beginning 9/10 the regular Thursday, Friday, Saturday schedule will commence
- The program is scheduled to cease operations on 11/21 but may end sooner or be modified based on weather and/or other situational needs (*No need for extra Halloween coverage as it falls on a Saturday this year*)

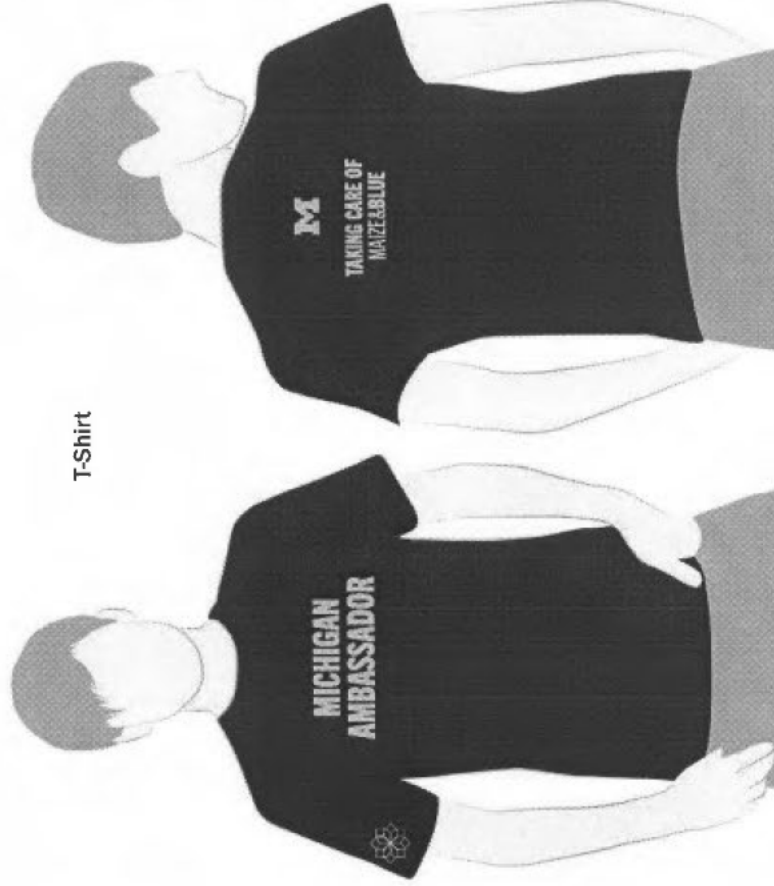

Student Opt-In to Address Registry:

As part of the required public health education COVID module rolled out to students this week (Staying Healthy in a Changing Environment for Students on Campus) students are being asked to voluntarily provide their name, current off-campus address and cell number in order to be contacted directly upon receipt of a complaint as an initial intervention not requiring a law enforcement response.

It is unknown at this time how many students may elect to supply this information for this purpose but is hoped it will be widely utilized and grow as students come to understand its utility.

COVID Concerns Reporting Line within U-M Emergency Operations Center:



A designated staff member within the U-M EOC will directly receive calls on the COVID Concerns Reporting Line to allow community-based public health concerns to be addressed via a system that has been designed to reduce the need for law enforcement as a first response.

This process will follow the same schedule for the Ambassador Program's operation. During hours when the Ambassador Program is not operating the reporting line will forward to the Division of Public Safety and Security (DPSS) dispatch center.

The staff member in the dispatch center will be able to check the Opt-In Voluntary Contact Information listings to determine if there is an individual to contact via text or phone instead of immediately dispatching law enforcement to address reported concerns. (Emergency calls will be appropriately re-directed to the Dispatch Center)

If no individual telephone number has been supplied and the address is not known to be affiliated with any specific U-M student group, the Ambassadors will visit the location in the hopes that their presence may encourage concerning behaviors to cease. Ambassadors will NOT directly confront large parties or situations where their personal safety could be at risk.

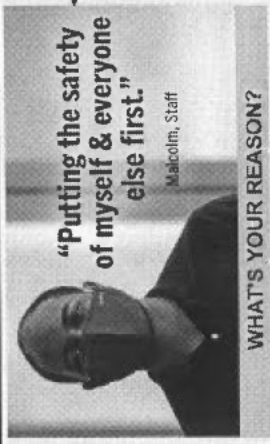
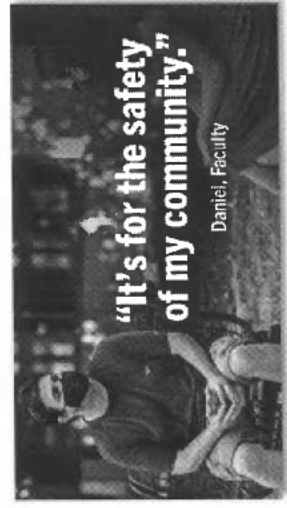
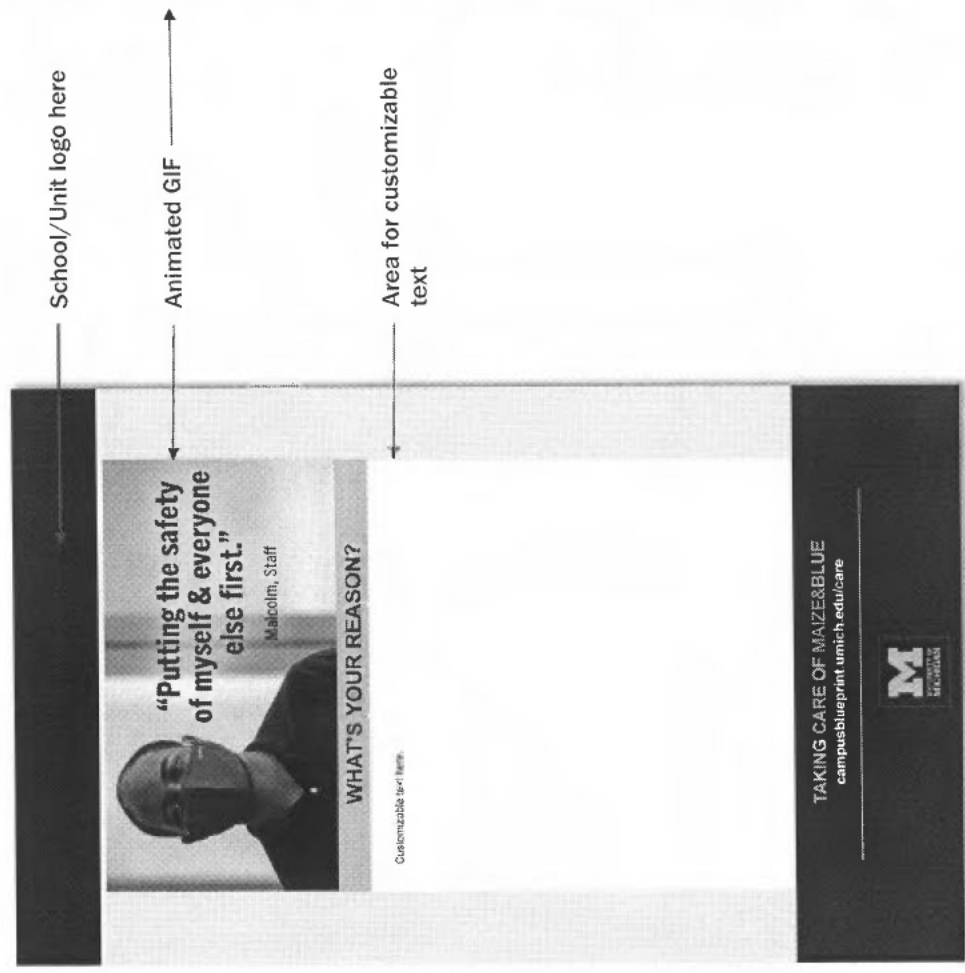

- **ORDINANCE 2144 (DOWNLOAD)–Temporary COVID-19 Mask Wearing and Gathering Limit Ordinance**

This ordinance, effective Tuesday, August 4, 2020, adopted in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and established measures to slow the rate of infection and limit public exposure to the virus. It remains in effect in the Borough of State College until the current pandemic Emergency Declarations are rescinded OR on January 31, 2021.

Wearing of Masks (Face Coverings) are REQUIRED when:

- Within six feet of another person who is not a household member.
- Waiting to enter and inside any building open to the public, such as but not limited to municipal/government buildings, grocery stores, pharmacies, retail stores, service establishments, and medical and dental treatment facilities.
- In places of employment where the individual would be in contact with the public, including preparing the packaging of food and/or beverage unless separated by a physical barrier between the employee and the public.
- On and waiting to board all transport/transit vehicles, such as but not limited to CATA bus, rideshare (like Uber/Lyft) and shuttle services.
- Coming into contact, both indoors and outdoors, with any person who is not the person's family or household member.

Exemptions to Wearing of Masks (Face Coverings)

Persons shall not be required to wear a mask under the following circumstances:

- Where a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability prevents wearing a face covering, provided the person provides documentation within 5 days from a licensed medical professional of the existence of diagnosis that prevents the wearing of a mask.

**This is not a violation of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) because the ordinance is not asking the person to disclose their specific diagnosis or medical reason, just the existence of a medical exemption.*

- Religious beliefs prevent them from wearing a face covering.
- Hearing impaired, or who are communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication.
- Wearing a face covering would create a risk to the person related to their work, as determined by local, state or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.
- Obtaining a service or treatment involving the nose or face or a medical procedure for which temporary removal of the face-covering is necessary to perform the service.

- Seated at a restaurant or other food or beverage service establishment, and all established Pennsylvania Department of Health requirements are followed.

Waiting Lines

- Lines shall be prohibited in the public right-of-way (ROW) waiting to enter any business location or other private property, except as follows:
- No more than 10 persons waiting in the ROW to enter an establishment.
- Persons waiting in line social distancing of no less than 6 feet and are required to wear a mask (face covering).
- Shall not wait in front of any other business or property other than the business or property that they are waiting to enter.
- Businesses are not responsible for the enforcement of individuals waiting to enter their businesses.

Limitations on Gathering Size

Gatherings of persons that are not from the same household shall be limited as follows:

- In all housing types in the Borough of State College, gatherings of more than 10 people both indoors and outdoors combined are prohibited.
- Gatherings at or in Borough of State College public parks and other municipal property of more than 25 people are prohibited.
- Gatherings in other private commercial property shall be restricted by the limitations established by the Pennsylvania Department of Health.
- The gathering size restrictions in the Ordinance shall apply for gatherings both indoors and outdoors on the property.
- When the number of household members exceeds the limitations set forth, no additional persons shall gather at this property, either indoors or outdoors.
- This shall not apply to private business locations, private offices, and events such as weddings, funerals, protest demonstrations, public and private schools and religious functions.

Enforcement

Law enforcement (police) and other public safety, health officers, ordinance enforcement officers, and emergency management personnel are charged with the enforcement of this ordinance.

Generally, enforcement will be first attempted using educational tactics or warnings prior to fines.

The fine for a person or business not in compliance with the measures outlined in the ordinance is subject to a \$300 fine.

Barron letter supports borough proposal to reduce COVID risks

August 03, 2020

I write to express support for the ordinance to reduce the risk of transmission of the COVID-19 virus within our community that you will consider on Aug. 4, 2020. Further, I urge you to pass the strongest ordinance possible to encourage and enforce face coverings, limit persons waiting in lines outside of businesses and limit gathering sizes in households and elsewhere. The combination of a strong ordinance, an active communications campaign that supports it and enforcement is the best way to promote the health and safety of our community. Penn State is incorporating many of these same limitations on our campuses. The University is requiring face coverings on campus, limiting the size of classes, requiring students and employees to honor physical distancing requirements, limiting travel opportunities and reconfiguring all spaces to limit density. We have worked with the Interfraternity Council to announce a moratorium on all socials. We have restricted visitors to on-campus housing, and asked local landlords to be diligent in monitoring activities at their rental properties. In addition, the University is holding classes on Labor Day to deter travel away from campus, and is transitioning to fully remote instruction after the Thanksgiving break. As members of this community, University leaders – including myself – value our ongoing partnership with the borough and other local municipalities, understanding that it is just such a partnership that will help us minimize risk and promote behaviors that help protect everyone.

If we are going to be successful in returning students to campus, returning employees to work and in safely bringing customers to businesses in our community, we must work together to not only encourage, but enforce, the best public health practices. I view the draft ordinance being considered by Borough Council to be a strong and appropriate step in the right direction to maintain consistent expectations on both sides of College Avenue. The health and well-being of everyone in our community is critically important as we move to re-

establish a sense of normalcy. I appreciate your consideration of this ordinance and again urge you to pass the strongest possible version of it as soon as possible. I see this as an important part of our partnership together to support the wellbeing of our communities.

State College Borough ordinance aligns health measures with University policies

New ordinance will enforce mask wearing, social distancing and gathering limits in the borough

August 05, 2020

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. – The State College Borough Council passed a temporary ordinance, supported by Penn State, on Tuesday, Aug. 4, that mandates mask wearing and social distancing in most instances and limits the size of gatherings in the borough, directly adjacent to the University Park campus.

“This is a strong ordinance and I’m very pleased that borough council has taken this solid stance in support of the health of the State College and Penn State community,” said Penn State President Eric J. Barron, who wrote a letter to the borough council backing the strongest possible version of the ordinance. “The safety provisions and enforcement in the borough ordinance align with the policies, procedures and enforcement mechanisms we are putting in place at Penn State. We must enforce simple public health measures to help prevent the transmission of coronavirus if we are to be successful in bringing our students, faculty and staff back to our campuses this fall.”

Largely in line with the directives of the Pennsylvania Department of Education and Gov. Tom Wolf’s guidance, the ordinance requires individuals to wear face masks, with some exceptions, in most public spaces and businesses that serve the public where social distancing of six feet is not possible. It limits gatherings to no more than 10 people in a residence and no more than 25 in State College parks and other borough properties. The new law also mandates social distancing while waiting in lines in the public right-of-way and limits the number of people waiting in lines to enter a business to 10 individuals.

Anyone who violates the ordinance is subject to a citation for a civil infraction and a fine of \$300.

“This is a great example of town and gown coming together for the greater good and well-being of our local community,” said Zack Moore, Penn State’s vice president for Government and Community Relations. “With this ordinance, safe behavior and preventative measures are now required both on and off the University Park campus. I strongly urge the local municipalities adjacent to all Penn State campuses to adopt similar laws in support of public health during this pandemic.”

Moore and his colleagues in Government and Community Relations are talking with other municipalities in the Centre Region, encouraging the adoption of similar ordinances that would enforce mask wearing, social distancing and gathering limitations.

The State College ordinance is effective immediately and currently runs through Jan. 31, 2021, or until the Centre Region Council of Governments and the state Department of Health rescind their emergency declarations, whichever comes earlier.

ORDINANCE 2144

A TEMPORARY EMERGENCY ORDINANCE OF THE
BOROUGH OF STATE COLLEGE, PENNSYLVANIA TO
REQUIRE THE WEARING OF FACE COVERINGS, SET
MAXIMUM GATHERING SIZE, AND OTHER REGULATIONS
TO REDUCE THE RISK OF TRANSMISSION OF THE COVID-19
VIRUS.

Legislative History

The Borough of State College is currently experiencing a pandemic as a result of the sharp and aggressive spread of the COVID-19 virus within the Borough. The state of Pennsylvania has declared that a State of Emergency exists which necessitates behavioral modifications and limitations as expressed herein. Given that, at present, the only method available to slow the rate of infection is to limit exposure. Since COVID-19 poses a risk of incapacitation and death to those who contract the disease, the measures described herein are an attempt to reduce infection rates, intended to minimize risk to the public health, reduce pressure on healthcare providers and pharmaceutical supplies by lowering the rate and risk of infection. Because the Federal Government, the State Government, the Centre County Government, and Centre Region Council of Governments (COG) have all issued State of Emergency orders and recommendations, the purpose of the within Ordinance is to clarify what is required going forward during the pandemic period.

In order to protect, preserve and promote the health, welfare, and safety for the residents, employees, and visitors to the Borough of State College, Council deems it is necessary and proper to adopt this temporary Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Council of the Borough of State College, Centre County, Pennsylvania as follows:

SECTION 1. Definitions.

“**Business**” includes all commercial, retail, wholesale, professional, and service establishments, whether for profit or not for profit, if members of the public, guests, clients, customers, and/or persons who are not family or household members may enter or otherwise come into contact with owners, operators, or employees.

“**Face Covering**” means a clean cloth, fabric, or other soft or permeable material, without holes, that covers both the mouth and nose, including, but not limited to surgical masks, respirators, face shields, handmade or homemade masks, bandanas, neck gaiters, scarves, or wraps made up on tightly woven fabric such as denim or cotton.

“**Household**” means all persons living in the same dwelling unit. It does not include the residents of separate dwelling units at the same location, such as may be the case at a residence hall, apartment complex, or other multi-unit residence.

“**In Contact**” means coming within six (6) feet or closer.

“Person or persons” includes all persons not exempted from wearing face coverings or masks in this ordinance. The terms include business employees, as well as customers, visitors, guests, clients and invitees.

“Public Places” includes publicly-owned property, but also includes business properties to which members of the public and/or customers, clients or guests are allowed or invited.

SECTION 2. Wearing of Face Coverings.

All persons in the Borough of State College shall be required to wear a Face Covering when within six feet of another person as set forth herein in Section 2, Paragraphs A through G. For the protection of employees and other customers and subject to the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, as amended (ADA), businesses must require their employees to wear face coverings at work when circumstances as described herein exist.

- A. Inside any building open to the public, such as, but not limited to, grocery stores, pharmacies, business locations, home improvement stores, retail stores, service establishments, and medical and dental treatment facilities.
- B. Inside all municipal and other governmental buildings.
- C. On all transport and transit vehicles, including, but not limited to, CATA bus, rideshare (such as Uber or Lyft) and shuttle vehicles.
- D. While waiting to enter any building open to the public, any municipal and other governmental building, or waiting to board any transport or transit vehicle, unless a distance of at least six feet is maintained from any person who is not that person’s family or household member, notwithstanding the prohibition of wait lines outside of municipal or other governmental offices, businesses, including hospitality establishments.
- E. When coming into contact with any person who is not that person’s family or household member, whether indoors or outdoors, including, but not limited to, contact during gatherings, curbside pickup, drive-thru and food truck purchases, deliveries, and service calls.
- F. While working in all jobs that entail coming into contact with any member of the public, including, but not limited to, all work involving the preparation or packaging of food and/or beverage unless separated by a physical barrier between the employee and the public.
- G. Parents or guardians are responsible for ensuring that minor children wear face coverings, unless such children are exempt as set forth herein.

SECTION 3. Wearing of Face Coverings, Exceptions.

- 1. Wearing of face coverings shall not be required under the following circumstances:

- A. Persons with a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability that prevents wearing a face covering, provided that said person provides documentation from a licensed medical professional of such medical, mental health, or disability preventing the wearing of a face covering. In the event that the person provides said documentation immediately, or within five days, the citation shall not be issued.
 - B. Persons whose religious beliefs prevent them from wearing a face covering.
 - C. Persons who are hearing impaired, or who are communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication.
 - D. Persons for whom wearing a face covering would create a risk to the person related to their work, as determined by local, state or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.
 - E. Persons who are obtaining a service or treatment involving the nose or face or a medical procedure for which temporary removal of the face-covering is necessary to perform the service.
 - F. Persons who are seated at a restaurant or other establishment that offers food or beverage service, and all requirements as established by the Pennsylvania Department of Health are followed.
2. The wearing of face coverings may be advisable, but is not required:
- A. In personal private vehicles and private homes.
 - B. In private business locations, or in individual private offices, at times when members of the public, clients, customers, guests, or other invitees are not present, as long as there is a distance of at least six feet maintained.
 - C. While participating in recreational physical activities, whether outdoor or indoor when involving 10 people or fewer.
 - D. While with family members and/or members of the same household.

SECTION 4. Waiting Lines.

Persons waiting in line to enter businesses are prohibited in a public right-of-way.

- A. Lines shall be prohibited in the public right-of-way waiting to enter any business locations or other private property, except as follows:
 - (1) No more than ten persons shall be allowed to wait outside of an establishment.
 - (2) Persons waiting to enter as set forth above shall maintain a physical distance of not less than six feet and shall wear a Face Covering.

- (3) Persons waiting to enter as set forth above shall not wait in front of any other business or property other than the business or property that they are waiting to enter.
- (4) Businesses shall be responsible to monitor those persons waiting to enter to assure that no more than ten persons are waiting for the prescribed time and all other regulations are followed as set forth herein.
- (5) If persons waiting do not respond to the business requests to disperse, wear face coverings, and maintain physical distance as set forth herein, the business shall notify the State College Police Department.

SECTION 5. Limitations on Gathering Size.

Gatherings of persons that are not from the same household shall be limited as follows:

- A. In all housing types, gatherings of more than ten persons shall be prohibited.
- B. Gatherings at or in Borough of State College public parks and other municipal property of more than 25 persons shall be prohibited.
- C. Gatherings in other private commercial property shall be restricted by the limitations established by the Pennsylvania Department of Health.
- D. The gathering size restrictions set forth in the Ordinance shall apply for gatherings both indoors and outdoors on the property.
- E. When the number of household members exceeds the limitations set forth in A. and B. herein, no additional persons shall gather at this property, either indoors or outdoors.
- F. The provisions of this section limiting size of gatherings shall not apply to private business locations, private offices, and events such as weddings, funerals, protest demonstrations, public and private schools and religious functions.

SECTION 6. Enforcement.

Law enforcement and other public safety, health officers, ordinance enforcement officers, and emergency management personnel charged with the enforcement of this ordinance.

- A. Any person found to have violated any mandatory provisions of Sections 2, 3, 4, or 5 of this Ordinance shall be found guilty of a civil infraction, punishable by a fine of \$300.
- B. The property owner(s) in the case of an owner-occupied property, or the tenants of a rental property where a violation of Section 5 of this Ordinance shall be found guilty of a civil infraction, punishable by a fine of \$300.

- C. Any business found not requiring their employees to comply with this Ordinance shall be found guilty of a civil infraction, punishable by a fine of \$300. Each day of a continuing violation of this Ordinance shall be considered a separate and distinct offense.
- D. In addition to these enforcement measures, repeated violations by a person or business are hereby declared to be a public nuisance, which may be abated by the Borough through all other legal means.

SECTION 7. Severability.


If any subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Ordinance or any application of it to any person, structure or circumstance is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, then such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of this Ordinance.

SECTION 8. Effective Date.




