#### **Success Stories**

**Success.** Thank you to staff throughout the organization who have worked and continue to work tirelessly, and those who have gone above and beyond during the COVID-19 pandemic. The City extends appreciation to the Ann Arbor community for their patience; cooperation with mask wearing and distancing; increased handwashing; support of local businesses; and for getting/planning to get vaccinated all in a united effort to bring the pandemic to an end.

City of Ann Arbor Recognized for Environmental Leadership. The City of Ann Arbor is being recognized for environmental leadership by the statewide Michigan Green Communities

program. As part of the 2021 Michigan Green Communities (MGC) Challenge, 44 participating local governments were awarded gold, silver or bronze seals of achievement reflecting community leadership in areas such as energy efficiency, climate adaptation and resilience, recycling, environmental justice, and more. Ten communities received bronze certification, 12 received silver certification, and 22 received gold certification.

The City of Ann Arbor achieved gold status for exemplary action in multiple categories, including climate resilience and adaptation, renewable energy, energy efficiency, responsible materials management and clean mobility.

As one of the 22 Michigan communities to receive gold certification, the City of Ann Arbor celebrates many successes implementing the A2ZERO Climate Plan for a just transition to community-wide carbon neutrality. From conducting energy audits and preparing to install solar and storage on municipal buildings to coordinating the installation of over 80 new public EV chargers, the city has been improving public facilities. Community programs like quadrupling solar installations through Solarize, expanding composting to a year-round service, providing thousands of free trees, and training over 50 community members to become neighborhood ambassadors make A2ZERO part of Ann Arbor.

The MGC program is open to all local governments in Michigan, at no cost. MGC is a sustainability networking, benchmarking and technical assistance program. It guides and supports communities in adapting to a changing climate, protecting infrastructure, improving the quality of life for residents, and creating a more environmentally and economically sustainable future for the state of Michigan.

MGC is supported by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy; the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services; the Michigan Economic Development Corporation; the Michigan Association of Counties; the Michigan Municipal League; and the Michigan Townships Association. • A<sup>2</sup>ZERO Solarize Program Reaches New Milestone for Residential Solar. The City of Ann Arbor Solarize program is celebrating a major milestone, surpassing 3 megawatts (MW) of new solar in the local community. Approximately 430 area homes have adopted solar energy through the two-year-old program; and participation has saved residents \$1.3 million in the upfront cost of solar installation. Overall, residents are collectively expected to save nearly \$12 million over the 25-year warrantied lifetime of the systems. Solarize

- Status of the overall plan update
- Risk assessment findings
- Hazard risk reduction project ideas

By completing this plan, the city not only increases its resilience to hazards, but also maintains eligibility for state and federal hazard mitigation funding. This plan is required to be updated every five years.

Ann Arbor Shares List of Road, Sidewalk, Utility & Resurfacing Projects Planned for 2022. City of Ann Arbor released its list of road and sidewalk projects scheduled for construction in 2022. This year's resurfacing/reconstruction projects will involve 3.6 miles of major roads and 7.5 miles of local streets. This year's capital preventive maintenance program will involve 16.5 miles of major roads and 8.6 miles of local streets. City of Ann Arbor Natural Area Preservation (NAP) works to protect and restore Ann Arbor's natural areas and to foster an environmental ethic among its community. This involves conducting plant and animal inventories, ecological monitoring and stewardship projects in Ann Arbor parks. These tasks are performed by both staff and volunteers.
