PROJECT PROPOSAL

In 1964, Elizabeth R. Dean bequeathed \$2 million to the City of Ann Arbor "to be held in trust in perpetuity, to repair, maintain and plant trees on city property." The trust is managed by the Elizabeth Dean Fund Committee which accepts proposals for special tree planting and maintenance projects to enhance Ann Arbor's urban and community forest.

PROJECT EVALUATION & SELECTION CRITERIA

Projects must provide for open and equal access to all citizens, thereby deriving benefits to the entire community. The Dean Fund Committee has identified the following priority areas where it would like to focus its funding towards.

- Neighborhood streets
- Proposals submitted by neighborhood organizations.
- Major Streets, particularly those that have had significant loss of trees
- · Neighborhood parks
- Historic neighborhoods
- Public Housing Sites
- Community Centers

1. **Describe the project**. We propose to pilot the Miyawaki method of dense tree planting by creating pocket forests of native species in two or more phases at Buhr Park. It's important to our goals to start a pilot in 2024, to make the most of the significant community enthusiasm for this project. We have support from a multitude of volunteers, plant donors, and local native plant nurseries. The first phase would consist of a pocket forest of 2,700 square feet in the northwest area of Buhr Park. If all goes as planned, additional areas could be planted in the following seasons.

We have chosen our preferred location based on several factors. It will receive full sun, and is just south of six existing apple trees. These trees are in poor condition and we anticipate the pocket forest will help to protect them. This location would also benefit park maintenance staff by consolidating mowing obstacles, as well as reducing mowed area.

This Project mission sits comfortably within the separate missions of Wild Ones, Citizens' Climate Lobby, and the Buhr Park Children's Wet Meadow Project, which are:

 Wild Ones promotes native landscapes in home and community through education, advocacy, and collaborative action. Citizens' Climate Lobby seeks to empower everyday people to work together on climate policies towards a livable world. Buhr Park Children's Wet Meadow Project has, for 27 years, prioritized education and engagement with community and school age children in planting and maintaining wet meadows, a food forest, a perennial garden, and a hickory and spruce tree grove in Buhr Park.
