Thank you for all of your hard work so far. I hope that you can see through the misplaced nostalgia for 1950s suburbia and the fearmongering and disinformation of the "Make Ann Arbor Great Again" faction. Please continue to expeditiously work on fixing our broken zoning laws so that we can live up to our reputation as a truly progressive city.

To highlight one example among many: why are attached row houses on individual parcels not legal to build anywhere in the city? (Ashley Mews and similar are only allowed as condo developments on huge parcels in R3/R4.) Compare to a detached house surrounded by a sea of monoculture lawn, which is legal pretty much everywhere. Similar height and floor area, but one of them takes up 180 times as much land (5 acres vs 1200 sq ft):

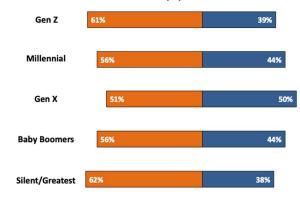

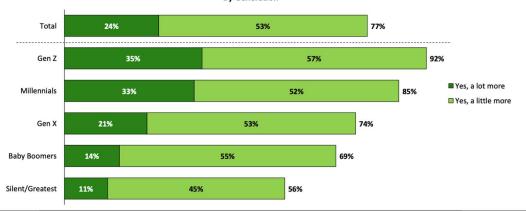

Willingness to Spend More to Live Within Walking Distance to Parks, Shops, and Restaurants By Generation

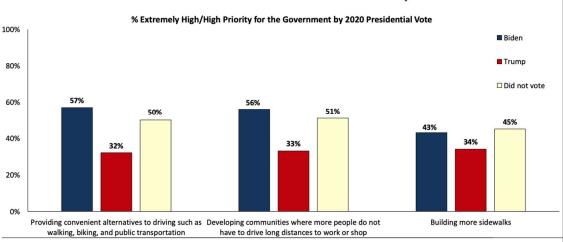

Trump Voters Are Least Likely to Support Walkable Communities and Alternative Transportation



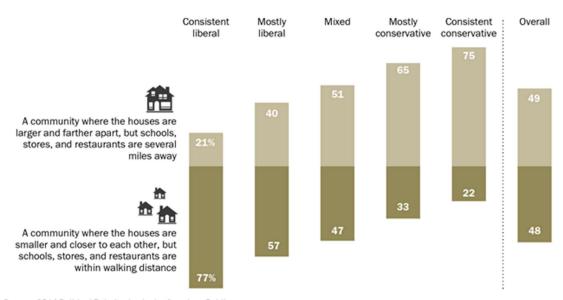

Would you prefer to live in a community where...

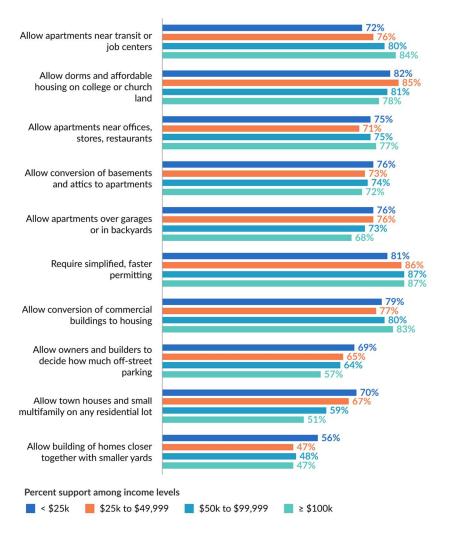
