The City's Plan Ignores Facts: The proposed Comprehensive Plan ignores expert projections and data entirely, and is woefully deficient as both an American Planning Association sustainable city planning document and in meeting Michigan legal requirements.

The City's Plan Burdens Vulnerable Residents: Public works staff warn of billions in unfunded infrastructure costs. The resulting tax and utility hikes would force out fixed-income seniors, low-wage workers—the very people this plan claims to help.

The City's Plan Ignores Science: Only 2% participated in a poll the City admits "was not designed to be statistically representative." No safeguards against gaming. Students, newer residents, and low-income voices are missing. No mailed notices when planning began. The City's evidence for reshaping every neighborhood? 270 anonymous people saying they'd like to live here.

♣ The City's Plan Is To Sell the Golf Courses & Nature Areas: The Plan's second draft omits 484 acres of public parkland from its inventory. These deliberate exclusions based on manipulated data could clear a path for removing Charter protections and opening parks to development.
