Ann Arbor SPARK Metrics - JOBS

SPARK acts as project manager for both the communities it supports and the companies it serves. Our project management efforts can be fairly simple, such as conducting data analysis that a company may use in its business planning, or as complex as full project management for significant company expansions.

This would include everything from:

- Connecting them to proper resources
- Working with the site selection community to help determine a location for a project
- Fully managing the tax incentive paperwork and the process it may require
- Creating communication plans
- Traveling to company locations outside of the state
- Making presentations to key public and private decision makers
- Talent recruitment efforts



When companies apply for local or state incentives, they fill out applications that require both job creation and investment estimates. SPARK considers these projects a success after they are publicly announced, or when the proper approval process has taken place for the incentive sought by the company. SPARK's jobs and investments numbers are based on these project announcements provided by the companies. SPARK monitors actual job creation and those results are shown in this report. SPARK supports a company directly or it supports the consultants the company utilizes during its expansion. Whatever role SPARK might play, we capture jobs and investments for projects where we have played an active role in helping a company decide to move forward.

SPARK celebrates all projects that may have an impact on our region. We do not count jobs and investments where SPARK was not directly involved.

Growth calls are a core economic development strategy that involve proactively outreaching and engaging with the existing employer base in our region to determine where they face opportunities and challenges. Growth calls recognize that businesses are dynamic entities that involve constant change. These calls allow SPARK to:

- gather information about local businesses that can be aggregated to reveal trends,
- determine valuable resources that could assist in the company's development,
- identify growth projects that require assistance, and
- serve as an ombudsman between businesses and government.

SPARK conducts hundreds of targeted growth calls each year that result in numerous referrals to resources, services and opportunities of which companies are often unaware. The most common referrals involve accessing talent, access to capital or business development/sales opportunities. Proactive outreach helps companies address challenges before they become problems, supports their continued growth and helps them see that this region is invested in their success.




2021 Washtenaw County Economic Outlook: Highlights and Key Takeaways

Gabriel M. Ehrlich and Donald R. Grimes from the <u>Research Seminar in Quantitative Economics</u> (RSQE) at the University of Michigan presented the Washtenaw County economic forecast during an online webinar organized by the Washtenaw Economic Club — an event that Ann Arbor SPARK is proud to sponsor. The webinar occurred on **March 25, 2021.**

Ann Arbor SPARK's Director of Research Alex West, who moderated the webinar, provided this high-level summary of the Washtenaw County Forecast.

Washtenaw County's economy has recovered substantial ground from the losses it suffered at the beginning of the COVID-19 recession, but there is more work to be done. The existing gaps (geographic, socioeconomic, and racial) present in unemployment, wages, industries, and educational attainment groups have been exacerbated by the recession. Certain industry categories are forecasted to make a full recovery, with some industries (like information and transportation and warehousing) having actually added jobs in 2020. Other industry categories are forecasted to make incomplete recoveries, with some failing to reach their 2019 levels in two years (especially some subsets of retail and manufacturing). According to RSQE, progress against the pandemic will allow economic activity to return largely to normal by late summer/early fall.



This forecast relies on solid economic growth at the national level. Unprecedented federal fiscal support insulated the national economy from a more severe contraction. The largest risk continues to be the pandemic. An improved public health situation plus an aggressive economic policy response (in the form of federal funding) results in an optimistic outlook.

2020 highlighted pre-existing gaps in a big way. One group gains while another group loses. The differences in the pandemic recession are between contact-heavy jobs vs. jobs that can be done remotely. Unfortunately, this bifurcation comprises low-wage jobs vs. high-wage jobs and renters vs. homeowners. The experience of the pandemic and the accompanying recession (and now recovery) is felt very differently by workers in those disparate groups.

Demand for talent is high, and getting higher, in the Ann Arbor region. Ann Arbor SPARK to Manage Statewide Michigan Internship Program

The Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) will partner with Ann Arbor SPARK to launch the Michigan STEM Forward internship program on a statewide level. SPARK has run the program on a local level through the Ann Arbor/Ypsilanti SmartZone with a decade of positive results.

In scaling the program up, MEDC will work in partnership with SPARK to place 425-450 STEM students currently attending Michigan colleges annually into STEM-focused internships throughout Michigan. With the support of a \$1.5 million grant approved today by the MSF Board, SPARK will contribute to 50 percent of the interns' pay, and participating companies will pay the remaining 50 percent. SPARK will track the employment status of the interns for at least 12 months to measure their retention in Michigan as well as those remaining in those knowledge positions.

"Ann Arbor SPARK is thrilled to leverage our decade of experience running our own Ann Arborbased internship program and take the opportunity to administer the Michigan STEM Forward program on behalf of the state. We have a solid track record of delivering results that help both businesses and job seekers: Of the students that participated in our internship program over the last five years, 84 percent of them accepted jobs in Michigan upon graduation," said Bill Mayer, Ann Arbor SPARK's vice president of entrepreneurial services. "It's vital that we not only attract talent to Michigan, but retain young jobseekers post-graduation as a strategy to extend the pipeline of workers available to growing companies."

COVID-19 Response


Since March 16, 2020, the Ann Arbor Region (along with the rest of the world) has experienced an unprecedented shift in our economy due to COVID-19 and the orders to restrict activity due to this pandemic. Ann Arbor SPARK has shifted its activity and focus in the short-term to address the economic effects of this pandemic.



The response in the past year has involved:

- SPARK published a <u>COVID-19 resource page</u> as an initial response to provide businesses with access to available resources.
- In May, SPARK launched the <u>Business Recovery Center</u> as a more long-term solution. The Business Recovery Center serves as a single destination for organizations looking for expert advice and information on how to adapt to today's business climate and allows site visitors to view a full ranges of resources, register for upcoming online events, view pre-recorded webinars and read profiles about regional businesses withstanding the pandemic.
- Washtenaw Small Business Emergency Relief Fund The WSBERF was created to address the financial hardship due to the COVID-19 crisis. The fund provides working capital grants of up to \$5,000 to qualifying small businesses, made possible by a \$1 million gift from The Song Foundation and additional contributions from: Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation, Washtenaw County, Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation, Bank of Ann Arbor, Pittsfield Charter Township, Chemical Bank, New Economy Initiative, and a GoFundMe Campaign. Ann Arbor SPARK, in partnership with Office of Community & Economic Development of Washtenaw County, Entrepreneurship Center at Washtenaw Community College and the Song Foundation quickly set up a review process and over a 10-day period reviewed over 1,500 grant submissions and dispersed over \$1.3 million in 500+ grants.
- Michigan Small Business Relief Program Ann Arbor SPARK led a regional effort to receive and disburse \$900,000 for the six-county Greater Ann Arbor Region from the State of Michigan. The state provided \$327,000 for companies in Washtenaw County and \$168,000 for companies in Livingston County. SPARK convened a review committee of SPARK staff, representatives from WCC's Entrepreneurship Center, staff from the Washtenaw County Office of Community and Economic Development, and advisory review from the Small Business Development Center to ensure eligibility and availability of funds. In total, the state funds provided 66 grants to businesses in Washtenaw County.
- SPARK will continue to monitor federal, state, local, nonprofit, and private resources and communicate opportunities to the community, including those through the <u>Federal Economic</u> <u>Development Administration</u>, foundations and other partnership opportunities.

As part of its partnership with MxD, the nation's digital manufacturing institute, ADI embarked on a research and development project with The Dow Chemical Company and the University of Michigan's Barton Research Group to demonstrate advanced manufacturing concepts in an industrial open automation computing framework. This project is now featured on MxD's future factory floor in Chicago, IL.

Ford Motor Company Makes Significant Mobility Investments in the Ann Arbor Region. Another major investment by Ford in the future of robotics is the new Ford Motor Company Robotics Building located on the University of Michigan's north campus in Ann Arbor. Part of the university's College of Engineering, the 134,000-square-foot, four-story complex has an entire floor dedicated to Ford's first robotics and mobility research lab on a university campus, as well as 100 Ford researchers and engineers.

In November 2020, LynxDx opened a drive-through COVID testing site in partnership with 2\42 Community Church and the Washtenaw County Health Department.

<u>Updated 2020 Benchmarking Report Compares Ann Arbor Region to Other U.S. Tech Hubs.</u> Ann Arbor SPARK recently released the third iteration of its <u>Benchmarking the Ann Arbor Region</u> report. The purpose of the report is to compare Ann Arbor to regions that are competitive to our region in attracting growing industry companies and in-demand knowledge workers, including Boulder, Colo., Silicon Valley, and Austin, Texas. The report provides clear, unbiased data and a regional analysis for a series of eight metrics:

- University R&D
- Population Movement
- Share of Remote Jobs (new for 2020)
- Venture Capital Activity
- Housing Affordability
- Percent in Poverty and ALICE (replacing Income Inequality from previous reports)
- Driving Industry Employment
- Labor Market

"There's value in using impartial data to compare our region to similar communities across the country," said Paul Krutko, Ann Arbor SPARK CEO and president. "It provides an objective assessment of the region's success, confirms Ann Arbor's status as a magnet for innovation and talent, and identifies opportunities for improvement."
