• A Public Hearing to Consider the Establishment of an Industrial Development District at 3874, 3990, 3886, 3994, 3950, and 3958 Research Park Drive for Land Currently Owned by Sartorius BioAnalytical Instruments, Inc.

#### Ordinances - Second Readings (2)

• A Public Hearing and an Ordinance to Amend Sections 5.22.3 (Storm Water Management and Soil Erosion) and 5.29.6 (Site Plans) of Chapter 55 (Unified Development Code) of Title V of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor (ORD-21-37). The amendments revise the site plan approval thresholds, clarify required review process, reduce time or approval process improve usability and more effectively communicate types of projects and the corresponding process and/or authority requirements for the benefit of the residents, city officials and the development community. The amendments also update storm water requirements to ensure consistency of requirements for all projects residential or commercial and require storm water management for projects that no longer require site plan review and approval.

This is offered by the Planning Commission in response to Council Resolution R-20-260 which asked Planning Commission and the City Administrator to Evaluate Section 5.29.6 Site Plans of Chapter 55 - Unified Development Code and propose Amendments to Adjust Site Plan Authority Thresholds and Improve the Communication of Requirements.

• A Public Hearing and an Ordinance to Amend Chapter 14 (Purchasing, Contracting and Selling Procedure) of Title 1 of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor. On November 2, 2021, Ann Arbor voters approved Proposals A, C, and D, amending Charter Sections On November 2, 2021, Ann Arbor voters approved Proposals A, C, and D, amending Charter Sections 14.2 and 14.3. These Charter amendments authorize passage of a City ordinance to regulate emergency procurement and increase the limit for City Administrator purchasing, and also require the City to award contracts to the bidder that provides the best value to the City. This ordinance amends Chapter 14 of the City Code to implement these voter-authorized changes. The ordinance also includes technical amendments, including deletions of now-unnecessary definitions, revisions to address inconsistent language and terminology, removal of gendered language, and other clarifications.

#### Ordinances – First Readings (1).

- An Ordinance to Repeal and Replace Section 9:62 of Chapter 108 (Disorderly Conduct)
  of Chapter IX (Police Regulations) of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor. This ordinance
  will be reviewed for changes under the Criminal Ordinance Reform Project 2021-22.
  Proposed changes include:
- Adding the already existing penalty to the chapter for better understanding
- Altering pronouns to use gender neutral language
- Omitting some ordinance provisions that are more appropriate to be handled under state law and in compliance with the Crime Victim's Rights Act of 1985.

This ordinance, along with all other amended ordinances in the Reform Project are scheduled to go into effect on April 15<sup>th</sup>, 2022. This will afford time for the training of sworn and unsworn police department employees, the recalibration of our hand-held ticket devices, and coordination with our local court system in an efficient manner.

## Other

City Shares Drop-off Locations for Christmas Tree Disposal. The City of Ann Arbor will again provide drop-off locations for free disposal of Christmas trees, Monday, Dec. 13, 2021-Monday, Jan. 17, 2022, since trees are not collected curbside at residences. Monthly Winter Curbside Collection of Compost Begins Jan. 3. The City of Ann Arbor will begin offering monthly winter curbside compost cart collection on Jan. 3, 2022. The city plans to use this year's initial service, it's first winter composting collection program, to learn more about the challenges and benefits of winter compost collection. The monthly pickups will occur the first full week of each month, with curbside compost cart service taking place the weeks of Jan. 3, Feb. 7 and March 7, 2022. Residents will therefore have their compost cart serviced, once a month, on their regular curbside service day. Regular weekly compost pickups for 2021 have ended and will begin again early April 2022.

Only compost carts will be serviced during the winter months. Paper yard bags or bundled branches will not be collected. In addition, food scraps/waste, including meat and bones, are required to be in Biodegradable Products Institute (BPI) certified or paper grocery bags to keep material from freezing to the carts, which may make them unserviceable. It is recommended that excess liquid be drained to prevent bags from deteriorating.
