# The Ann Arbor Central Park and Civic Center Initiating the Commons 2021

On November 6, 2018, 26,746 Ann Arbor Citizens voted 53.11% to 46.89% to pass Proposal A.

"The City-owned public land bounded by Fifth Ave., William, Division, and Liberty Streets be retained in public ownership, in perpetuity, and developed as an

urban central park and civic center commons to be known as "Center of the City."

#### **The Community Commons Timeline**

2009: The vision for the Commons began at the Labor Day Democratic Party picnic at the Black Elks and was inspired by a 2008 Commons publication by Peter Linebaugh titled "The Magna Carta Manifesto, Liberties and Commons for All" Univ. of California Press."

2010: The Community Commons Organizing Committee (A2C2) was formed.

2011: The Library Green Conservancy 501c3 was formed for a park on the Library Lot.

2012: An "Imagine a Park" open program was held with exhibits and citizen engagement.

2018: Proposition A was passed calling for an Urban Park and Civic Center.

2019: The City Council appointed a Center of the City Task Force.

2020: In February, the City Task Force made its recommendations and the Community Commons Initiating Committee was formed. In October, 2020, the Council of the Commons was formed whose membership was determined by City Council.

2021: The Garden Committee, known as The Green Team, was formed as a group within the Initiating Committee and created this community garden. Four initiating events (see descriptions later) were held on the Commons.



## The Community Garden Project and The Green Team

On March 12, 2021, a garden committee (The Green Team) began weekly meetings to plan for a community garden on a plot of land (N3) on the Commons. Planning by Odile Hugonot and Alan Haber, Chad Manfreda, Bonnie Pearce, Rita Mitchell, & Joet Reoma included plants selection, plot preparation, weeding, Jiason with

**City Administrator Tom Crawford and DDA Interim Director Maura Thomsen** (securing wood chips). The Garden Site Map was suggested by Joet Reoma, **Project Grow Community Gardens Board Member, an MSU-Extension** Master Gardener, and a member of the **Washtenaw Master Gardeners** Association. The Green Team added flowers and helped to maintain area C2.



Dr. Missy Stultz, Sustainability and Innovations Manager for the City of Ann Arbor, has agreed to work with us to incorporate features in our gardens that support sustainability.

#### What's Next for the Gardens?



Joet Reoma and Chad Monfreda are helping us plan for next year. We are considering dividing the large plot into several smaller plots with a sun powered fountain in the middle. We are considering expanding into other plots on the Commons site with volunteers consulting with and learning from local Master Gardeners.

We believe that the garden plots on the Commons will offer educational opportunities for local gardeners to include winterization strategies such as:

- 1. Cleaning the garden
- 2. Enhancing the garden soil with compost & mulch
- 3. Composting garden waste
- 4. Using cover crops
- 5. Preparing the garden for Spring cultivation.

Finally, with the help of Dr. Missy Stultz, we intend to add features that support sustainability and educate the public.

# What's Next for Activating the Commons?





In the City Charter, the Center of the City includes Liberty Plaza and the Kempf House. These two sites will be included in future planning for activating the Commons.

Outreach to local organizations will increase in event planning for 2022.

WiFi, Flexible seating, public toilet and storage space in the parking structure are high on the agenda for 2022.

Make no mistake, building the Commons in Ann Arbor is a once in a lifetime opportunity with its large, flat open areas and central locations. It will require partnerships with City Government, DDA, local business, non-profits and all of Ann Arbor. We can do this! Join in!
