But I take your point that we have not established a minimum number of on-site units. This is tricky because I think the public favors literal on-site units particularly given the location.

Yes and no.

Yes, the more units that developed in the market rate phase, the greater the number must be affordable. 20% of the units are required if of a total of 100 total units (20 of which affordable) or 300 total units (60 of which affordable).

Yes, together the two phases must yield 100 units. But no, there is no minimum amount that must be provided on site, as the number in the affordable phase could vary.

Yes, the total development could yield up to 145 units or more. There is no cap on the number of affordable units, only a floor.

Does this help? Let me know if you'd like to discuss further.

Dear Mr. Lenart:

Double-checking to be sure I've got this, and grateful if you have a moment to verify/correct:

- The terms of the PUD are structured so that the more market rate units the developer wants to provide, they must also provide a greater number of affordable units.
  - Together the two towers *must* yield no fewer than 100 units--90 units on site, with 10 provided either on-site or by payment in lieu.
  - They may yield up to 145 affordable units.


# **Temporary Traffic Control Plan:**

Commissioners! Yes, we are meeting on Wednesday and have an interesting meeting – unfortunately in Council Chambers as we met in February. And with new name cards! This month's guest will be Lisa Jackson, chair of the Independent Citizens Police Oversight Commission (ICPOC) who will talk to us, first about unarmed response, a subject she and her commission have been doing a lot of research about and, especially, will have a lot of information about what is working for other communities and what she is beginning to conclude about Ann Arbor's needs. Remember that last year, City Council passed a resolution asking for movement in either establishing a City program for unarmed response or explaining why that wouldn't work here – and they got an indication that at least some unarmed response practices will be installed – but it wasn't clear what. Second, we will vote on a resolution requiring the continued collection of traffic stop data by the AAPD and asking that that data be made available to the public. We are supporting ICPOC's special interests here, but as we discussed in the past, traffic stop bias is also a human rights issue. Next, we will look at a few changes we are hoping to make to the Non-Discrimination Ordinance (NDO) and will talk a little about the idea of posting it at least for landlords and perhaps, employers. Finally, we will do a quick scan to see what is happening to the other things going on through the HRC. One of these, our work on the police policies and practices around Trespass (and especially the reading of Trespass) – something that is now a joint effort with ICPOC. A memo is going on to AAPD Chief Michael Cox and Ann Arbor City Attorney Stephen Postema explaining the changes we would like to discuss and calling for a meeting in which to discuss them. A copy of the memo (and the key to reading it and the written police policy for enforcing Trespass) are attached (but will probably not be discussed in the meeting. Please let me know, as always, if you will not be able to attend this meeting. Hope to see you all! Leslie

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 112 (Non-Discrimination), Sections 9:150, 9:151, 9:156, and 9:159, Title IX of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor To Update Definitions of Gender Expression, Gender Identity, and Sexual Orientation; Reorder Definitions; Add Definition of Religion to Include Prohibition Against Religious-Based Hair and Head Coverings Discrimination; and To Remove Requirement that Complaint be Filed within 180 Days.

The City of Ann Arbor Ordains:

Section 1. That Sections 9:150, 9:151, 9:156, and 9:159 of Chapter 112 of Title IX of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor be amended to read as follows:

# 9:150. Intent.

It is the intent of the city that no individual be denied equal protection of the laws; nor shall any individual be denied the enjoyment of his or her civil or political rights or be discriminated against because of actual or perceived age, arrest record, color, disability, educational association, ethnicity, familial status, family responsibilities, gender expression, gender identity, genetic information, height, HIV status, marital status, national origin, political beliefs, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, source of income, veteran status, victim of domestic violence or stalking, or weight.

# 9:151. Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following words and phrases have the following meanings:

- (1) Age. Chronological age.
- (2) Arrest record. Information indicating that an individual has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detention, held for investigation, arrested, charged with, indicted or tried for any felony, misdemeanor, or other offense by any law enforcement or military authority.
- (3) Bona fide occupational qualification. An otherwise protected characteristic which is reasonably necessary to the normal performance of the particular position in a particular business or enterprise.
- (4) *Contractor*. As defined in Title I, Section 1:312(5) of this Code.
- (5) Disability. A determinable physical or mental characteristic of an individual, which may result from disease, injury, congenital condition of birth, or functional disorder, if the characteristic:
  - (a) for purposes of employment, substantially limits 1 or more of the major life activities of that individual and is unrelated to the individual's ability to perform the duties of a particular job or position or substantially limits 1 or more major life activities of that individual

and is unrelated to the individual's qualifications for employment or promotion;

- (b) for purposes of public accommodations, is unrelated to the individual's ability to utilize and benefit from a place of public accommodation or public service;
- (c) for purposes of housing, substantially limits 1 or more of that individual's major life activities and is unrelated to the individual's ability to acquire, rent or maintain property.

Discrimination based on actual or perceived disability includes discrimination because of the use by an individual of adaptive devices or aids.

Disability does not include a determinable physical or mental characteristic caused by the current illegal use of a controlled substance by that individual. It also does not include a determinable physical or mental characteristic caused by the current use of alcoholic liquor by that individual, if that physical or mental characteristic negatively impacts that individual's ability to perform the duties of his or her job.

(6) Discriminate. To make a decision, offer to make a decision or refrain from making a decision based in whole or in part on an individual's or his or her relatives' or associates' actual or perceived age, arrest record, color, disability, educational association, ethnicity, familial status, family responsibilities, gender expression, gender identity, genetic information, height, HIV status, marital status, national origin, political beliefs, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, source of income, veteran status, victim of domestic violence or stalking, or weight.

Discrimination includes the use of facially neutral practices that have an adverse impact on members of a protected class (See 9:156 of this chapter).

Discrimination also includes harassment based upon any protected class, including, but not limited to sexual harassment.

- (7) Educational association. The fact of being enrolled or not enrolled at any educational institution.
- (8) Ethnicity. A heritage which is socially distinguishable from other groups that has developed its own subculture which can include nationality, religion and language.
- (9) *Employer.* A person or agent of that person, who, for compensation, employs 3 or more individuals.

- (10) Familial status. One or more children under the age of 18 residing with a parent or other individual having, or in the process of securing, legal custody of the child or children; or 1 or more children under the age of 18 residing with the designee of the parent or other individual having or securing custody, with the written permission of the parent or other individual.
- (11) Family responsibilities. Being a provider of care and/or support, or being perceived to be a provider of care and/or support for a family member.
- (12) Gender expression. An individual's actual or perceived gender-related appearance, expression, or behavior, regardless of the individual's assigned sex at birth.
- (13) Gender identity. An individual's internal sense of their own sex and a defining component of sex. Sex includes, but is not limited to, an individual's gender, gender identity, and gender expression.
- (14) Genetic information. Information about an individual's genetic tests and the genetic tests of an individual's family members (e.g., family medical history), and the manifestation of a disease or disorder in family members of such individual. A genetic test is an analysis of DNA, RNA, chromosomes, proteins, or metabolites that detects genotypes, mutations or chromosomal changes.
- (15) Harassment. A form of discrimination in which conduct is based upon an individual's membership in a protected class which:
  - (a) Unreasonably interferes with that individual's work, or ability to utilize and benefit from a place of public accommodation or public service, or ability to obtain or maintain housing; and/or
  - (b) Creates a hostile environment at work, at a place of public accommodation or public service, or where that individual lives.
- (16) *HIV status*. The state of blood sero-positivity or sero-negativity with respect to the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), including, but not limited to, diagnoses of acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS).
- (17) Housing facility. Any dwelling unit or facility in which it is intended individuals regularly will sleep and keep personal belongings including, but not limited to, a house, apartment, rooming house, housing cooperative, homeless shelter, hotel, motel, tourist home, retirement home or nursing home.
- (18) *Individual.* A human being, as distinguished from a person, as defined under this Code.
- (19) *Marital status*. The state of being married, unmarried, divorced or widowed.

- (20) *Minority*. An individual who is Asian, Black or African American, Hispanic or Latino, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, Native American, or Alaskan native.
- (21) *Perceived*. Refers to the perception of the person who acts and not to the perception of the individual for or against whom the action is taken.
- (22) Person. As defined in Title I, Section 1.8 of this Code.
- (23) Place of public accommodation. An educational, governmental, health, day care, entertainment, cultural, recreational, refreshment, transportation, financial institution, accommodation, business or other facility of any kind, whose goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages or accommodations are extended, offered, sold or otherwise made available to the public, or which receives financial support through the solicitation of the general public or through governmental subsidy of any kind.
- (24) Political beliefs. One's opinion, whether or not manifested in speech or association, concerning the social, economic, and governmental structure of society and its institutions. This chapter shall cover all political beliefs, the consideration of which is not preempted by state, federal or local law. With regard to employment, an individual's political beliefs that interfere or threaten to interfere with his or her job performance are specifically excluded from this protection.
- (25) Race. Inclusive of traits historically associated with race, including, but not limited to, hair texture and protective hairstyles. For purposes of this definition, "protective hairstyles" includes, but is not limited to, such hairstyles as braids, locks, twists, and headwraps.
- (26) Religion. Includes, but is not limited to, hairstyles and the use of head coverings associated with an individual's religious beliefs, observance, or practice, unless they cannot reasonably be accommodated because of bona fide health, safety, or security concerns.
- (27) Sex. Includes, but is not limited to, an individual's gender, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, childbirth, and medical conditions related to pregnancy or childbirth. An individual's sex shall be defined by that individual's gender identity; and use and/or occupancy of, access to and/or participation in sex-segregated facilities and/or entities shall be granted on that basis. Such sex-segregated facilities and/or entities include, but are not limited to, dwellings, housing, public accommodations, lavatories, locker rooms, instructional programs, athletic events and athletic teams.
- (28) Sexual harassment. A type of sex discrimination. Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct or communication of a sexual nature when:

- (a) Submission to such conduct or communication is made a term or condition either explicitly or implicitly to obtain employment, public accommodations or housing.
- (b) Submission to or rejection of such conduct or communication by an individual is used as a factor in decisions affecting such individual's employment, public accommodations or housing.
- (c) Such conduct or communication has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with an individual's employment, public accommodations or housing, or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive employment, public accommodations, or housing environment.
- (29) Sexual orientation. An individual's emotional, romantic, and/or sexual attractions, or the absence thereof, to people including but not limited to actual or perceived homosexuality, heterosexuality, pansexuality, or bisexuality. Sexual orientation also means an individual's sense of identity based on those attractions, related behaviors, and membership in a community of others who share those attractions.
- (30) Source of income. Any lawful source of money paid directly to an individual or family or indirectly on behalf of an individual or family, including, but not limited to:
  - (a) Money derived from any lawful profession or occupation.
  - (b) Money derived from any contract, agreement, loan, or settlement; from any court order, such as court-ordered child support or alimony; from any gift or bequest; or from any annuity or life insurance policy.
  - (c) Money derived from any benefit or subsidy program, including, but not limited to, any housing assistance, such as Housing Choice Vouchers, Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) Vouchers, or any other form of housing assistance payment or credit whether or not paid or attributed directly to a landlord; public assistance; emergency rental assistance; veterans benefit; Social Security or other retirement program; supplemental security income; or other program administered by any federal, state, or local agency or nonprofit entity. Any monthly housing assistance administered by any federal, state, or local agency or nonprofit entity shall be treated as income in the amount of 3× the value of that monthly rental assistance.
- (31) Veteran status. Having served in any unit of the United States Armed Forces or their reserve components, including the National Guard and the Coast Guard.

(32) Victim of domestic violence or stalking. An individual who is a victim of domestic violence as defined in MCL § 400.1501 or a victim of stalking as defined in MCL § 750.411h and § 750.411i.

# 9:156. Discriminatory effects.

No person shall adopt, enforce or employ any policy or requirement which has the effect of creating unequal opportunities according to actual or perceived age, arrest record, color, disability, educational association, ethnicity, familial status, family responsibilities, gender expression, gender identity, genetic information, height, HIV status, marital status, national origin, political beliefs, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, source of income, veteran status, victim of domestic violence or stalking, or weight for an individual to obtain housing, employment or public accommodation, except for a bona fide business necessity. Such a necessity does not arise due to a mere inconvenience or because of suspected objection to such a person by neighbors, customers or other persons.

# 9:159. Complaint procedure.

- (1) A complaint about a violation of this chapter should be made to the Ann Arbor Human Rights Commission. The complaint may be submitted in person, by telephone, by mail, or electronically.
- (2) Upon receipt, the Human Rights Commission will review the complaint, provide notice of the complaint to the City Attorney's Office, communicate with the complainant, and take appropriate action with respect to the matter, including, but not limited to:
  - (a) Mediating the matter between the involved parties;
  - (b) Referring the complainant to other local, state or federal entities for investigation and remedy;
  - (c) Referring the complaint to the City Attorney for further investigation and action pursuant to this chapter;
  - (d) Dismissing the complaint, after review with the City Attorney, if the allegations do not constitute a violation of this chapter.
- (3) With respect to complaints filed by current city employees, the Human Rights Commission will refer such employees to any applicable processes contained in collective bargaining agreements and/or the City Human Resources Policies and Procedures. If a current employee has exhausted any such processes, he/she may file a complaint with the Human Rights Commission in accordance with subparagraphs (1) through (3) of this section.

- (4) The Human Rights Commission will take action on the complaint within 90 days of receipt of the complaint. If additional time is necessary, the Human Rights Commission will notify the complainant of the need for additional time. All communications with the complainant regarding actions taken or additional time necessary will be in writing, with a copy to the City Attorney.
- (5) The City Attorney will notify the Human Rights Commission in writing of actions taken by the City Attorney's Office on complaints referred to that office by the Human Rights Commission.
- (6) All complaints received by the Human Rights Commission and responses from the Human Rights Commission will be retained by the City of Ann Arbor for at least 3 years.
- (7) The Human Rights Commission will provide an annual report to City Council regarding the complaints received and actions taken.
- (8) No individual shall provide false information to any authorized individual investigating a complaint regarding a violation of this chapter.
- (9) For an investigation, the City Attorney may request a person to produce books, papers, records or other documents which may be relevant to a violation or alleged violation of this chapter. If said person does not comply with such request, the City Attorney may apply to Washtenaw County Circuit Court for an order requiring production of said materials.

Section 2: In the event any court of competent jurisdiction shall hold any provision of this Ordinance invalid or unenforceable, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision thereof.

Section 3: This Ordinance shall take effect ten days after passage and publication.

**Re:** Recommendations for Changes to the City's Trespass Notice and Policy

and Procedural Order 041-026 on Trespassing

Before the Independent Community Police Oversight Commission (ICPOC) was created, the Human Rights Commission (HRC) was made aware of the need for some changes to the reading of Trespass in Ann Arbor. After discussions with previous AAPD leaders, and in consultation with Deputy City Attorney Arianne Slay, a few of those changes were made. Information was added to the Trespass Notice about how to appeal the Notice and how to contact the HRC if the Notice was issued for impermissibly discriminatory reasons, for example. But we all knew more changes were needed.

With the creation of ICPOC, a team of its commissioners joined the HRC commissioners in reviewing the AAPD's Trespass Policy (Procedural Order 041-026 on Trespassing) and the Trespass Notice that is used when someone is "read trespass." The team identified a number of ways in which each of these could be further improved. Our recommendations are briefly described below.

Most of our recommendations for revising the Trespass Notice are aimed at making it more accurate and comprehensible, but some of them also involve reconsidering policy. For example, we are particularly concerned about the length of time a person who is read trespass is banned from a property without regard to input from the property owner, the character of the triggering incident, or the impact that a full one-year ban from the property might have on the alleged trespasser.

We also have a number of questions about the current Policy and Procedural Order 041-026 on Trespassing. Most of these arise from what appears to be a lack of detail and clarity about how officers should respond to requests for

the issuance of Trespass Notices that might lead to misunderstanding and/or unfair consequences for the receiver.

Below, we have summarized the questions and suggested changes we would like to discuss with you. We hope to schedule a meeting for that discussion soon.

# **Trespass Notice**

Below are the questions about and suggested changes to the Trespass Notice itself. To help you navigate the recommendations below, a Key (i.e., a copy of the Trespass Notice annotated to highlight the issues discussed) is attached to this memo.

- Allow property owners to determine the length of time that the person being trespassed must stay away from their property. Currently, everyone who is read trespass, regardless of the circumstances or wishes of the property owner, is banned from returning for a full year. (See, in the attached Key, the underlined phrase in Section C.) One year is the maximum amount of time allowed under the law and is unnecessarily long in many cases. Instead, property owners should be permitted either to write on the Trespass Notice the amount of time they wish the person to stay away (up to a year) or choose from a series of options: 24 hours, one week, one month, three months, six months, or one year, for example. (Also note that the circled word in that same line, the word "immediately," is misspelled.)
- Ensure that the automatic one-year ban does not apply to quasi-public places like Blake Transit Center and the Ann Arbor District Libraries, except where it can be shown to be necessary. Consider limiting the reentry ban to 24 hours wherever possible, as is the case for public parks.

- Both the length of the ban and consequences of returning to the property before the expiration of the ban are important and yet are printed in a very tiny, difficult-to-read font. (Look again at the last text printed in Section C of the Key.) These messages should be much easier to see on the Trespass Notice than they are now. Rather than trying to squeeze all necessary information (in tiny print) onto the onepage Notice, an additional page should be added. preparing the Notice should be required to provide information on the second page as well as the first so that the second page is not overlooked. The second page could, for example, contain clear information about how to appeal the issuance of the Notice and the name and contact information of the property owner or agent to whom to appeal. In some cases, the person requesting the issuance of the Trespass Notice is not the same person who would decide whether to allow the person back on to the property and request that the Notice be rescinded. A link to online information about Trespass could also be included on the form.
- The last line of text in Section C now reads: This notice is hereby given by the Ann Arbor Police authority as an agent granted by the above described property owner or occupant. That statement is unclear and misleading and we think it should be changed. Not only can the term "agent" not be granted, but it is questionable whether "agency" is an accurate way of describing the relationship of the responding officer with most private property owners? (We understand that there are some properties where the police are indeed the contractual agents of the property owners.) This is especially confusing since the agent of the property owner (of a property where the police are not the contractually appointed agents) may also be the person requesting the officer to read trespass.
- Currently, the circled portion of Section F directs the officer to give the "offender" the pink copy of the Trespass Notice. The pink copy of the Notice, however, removes all the information entered into Section E (i.e., the property owner's, agent's, or occupant's name, position, and

contact information). That information, along with the email address of the property owner/agent/occupant, is necessary for any appeal and should be shared with the trespassed person. The appeal process is described in very small print in Section F and assumes this information is indeed available to the "offender."

- In Section D, consider adding to the Notice a list of typical legal reasons for reading trespass (from which police officers can choose), along with enough space for further explanation. This could help AAPD keep useful data, educate offenders, and make a fair appeal possible.
- The trespassed person's race and/or ethnicity should be specified (in Section A). Again, this change will better enable the collection of data on who is trespassed and for what reasons.
- The term "ethnicity" should be added to the list of protected classes under Ann Arbor's Non-Discrimination Ordinance (see Section B). Ethnicity was recently added to that list.
- On the Trespass Notice, the term "Reportee" in Sections E and F should be replaced with a term like "reporter," "requester," or "authorizer" (meaning the person who has requested the issuance of the Trespass Notice). The term should be changed on the two places it appears on the form: "Reportee Information" and "Yellow-Reportee." In addition, in Section E, rather than being asked for their position, the person requesting the Trespass Notice should be asked whether they are the owner, agent, or occupant of the property, so that it is clear to both the police and the trespassed person by what authority they have requested the issuance of the Notice.
- On the final line of the Notice, in Section F, the phrase "in violation with" should be changed to "in violation of."

# Policy and Procedural Order 041-026, Trespassing

Section II, Policy: The list of classes protected from discrimination by the City's Non-Discrimination Ordinance is incomplete and should be corrected. Those missing include "age," "arrest record," "color," "ethnicity," "familial status," "gender expression," "sex," and "religion." "Familial responsibilities" should read "family responsibilities." As on the Trespass Notice, an asterisk may be placed next to "arrest record" with the explanation that "prior arrests at the property where this Trespass Notice was issued may be considered."

# Section III, Procedures

- Officers should be required to ensure that the person requesting the issuance of the Trespass Notice is an owner, agent or occupant of the property and indeed authorized to make that request.
- Why do the procedures (in the first sentence of Section III) state that the "owner, co-owner, occupant, agent or servant of the owner or occupant" may request the reading of trespass when the law refers only to the "owner or occupant or the agent of the owner or occupant"? Might "servant" here be mistakenly interpreted by officers to refer to any employee of the property owner, whether authorized or not to ask for someone's removal from the property?
- These procedures seem to indicate that officers must "read trespass" if requested to do so. May officers choose not to? And if so, when? Should the procedures offer more guidance on how officers should use what if any discretion they have in these cases? And what sort of training is and/or should accompany this?

- Officers should be affirmatively instructed in the procedures to refrain from reading trespass if there is clear evidence that the request is being made at a public accommodation solely for impermissible discriminatory reasons.
- Section III F (3): Does this mean that if a property owner, agent, or occupant tells police that the trespassed person returned to the property, the police may "submit for a trespass charge as a warrant request" even if they themselves did not see the person on the property and verify his identity? What if the property owner, agent, or occupant mistakes one person for another? The HRC has received multiple complaints from people who suffered unfair treatment of other kinds from business owners based on mistaken identity. Unless the officers verify, with information other than just the property owner's statement, that the person who returned to the property is in fact the person who had been read trespass, the procedures should require that no action be taken.
- Section III J: Where the AAPD is contractually authorized by particular property owners to decide who to allow on the property and who not and when to read trespass, what if any guidelines must the officers follow? They should be included in the procedures. And should there be some educational information given to property owners who assign the AAPD as their agent about what police can and cannot use as reasons to read trespass and about the property owners' responsibilities in the event of an appeal?
- Procedures for rescinding a Trespass Notice at the property owner/agent/occupant's request (per the appeals process stated on the Trespass Notice) should be added. It is important

to ensure that such rescissions are properly handled by the police so that there is no confusion over which Trespass Notices are still in effect and which are not.

- Additional procedures regarding notification of parents and/or guardians in cases where minors are read trespass should be added.
- Should officers be instructed to point out the appeal option on the Notice when giving the alleged offender the pink copy of the Notice? If the Notice contains clear, visible information about the appeal process and the person to whom to appeal, this would be less necessary.
- Section III E (6) and (7): When if at all would bond money be taken by the City in these cases?
- The procedures will need to be changed where appropriate to reflect changes made to the Trespass Notice.

# **Other Related Questions**

- What can the AAPD do to ensure that better data is kept, and accessible to ICPOC and the public, about the issuance of Trespass Notices?
- Might there be a useful role for the Dispute Resolution Center (mediation) in resolving disputes between the parties in these matters?
- Are additional policies needed to enable an appeal, especially in cases where AAPD officers act as agents for the owner?

We appreciate your taking the time to consider our suggestions and questions and look forward to discussing them with you.

# I. Purpose

The purpose of this order is to outline the procedures for handling trespassers.

# II. Policy

It is the policy of the Ann Arbor Police Department to respond to complaints involving trespassing and handle those persons believed to be trespassing in a manner consistent with the law and all civil rights afforded them. A trespass may not be based on the subject's race, disability, educational association, familial responsibilities, gender identity, genetic information, height, HIV status, marital status, national origin, political beliefs, sexual orientation, source of income, veteran status, victim of domestic violence or stalking status or weight as outlined in the Ann Arbor City Code, Chapter 112; Section 9:1565.

#### III. Procedures

In situations where an unauthorized, unwanted individual or group of individuals are present on a property they do not own, lease or rent, against the wishes of the owner, co-owner, occupant, agent or servant of the owner or occupant, and are still present or in the area on the arrival of patrol officers, the following will be done:

- A. The responding officer(s) will determine the circumstances of the call and take appropriate action regarding any criminal acts.
- B. The officer will consult with the caller to determine if they desire the subject(s) to immediately leave, want them read trespass (Informational Trespass), or if the person(s) has been previously trespassed and is currently committing Criminal Trespass.
- C. If the subject(s) do not have an active Trespass in effect at the location, at the request of the property owner/agent, the officer will complete and serve the Trespass Notice form (PC-1152) to the offender(s).
  - 1. The service of a trespass notice is legally in effect for one year from the date of service unless the agent / business owner etc... rescinds the Trespass.
  - 2. The officer will serve the offender with the pink copy of the Trespass Notice form.
    - a. The officer shall then instruct the offender to leave immediately and inform the offender that failure to do so will result in immediate arrest.
    - b. If the offender refuses their copy of the form, the officer will note the refusal on the Trespass Notice form (use check box if available) and in the case report.
    - c. The notice has a Resource Guide printed on the back of the Offender's copy with contact information for available community assistance and resources. When issuing, officers shall bring the guide to the attention of the offender.
  - 3. Give the yellow copy of the trespass form to the person authorizing/requesting the trespass.

- 4. Submit the original (white copy) to AAPD Records.
  - a. Records will upload the form to the AAPD Trespass List in the Shared Documents section of the Department's internal website within one business day so that it may be viewed by Metro Dispatch and AAPD personnel.
  - b. Records will attach the form to the associated report after the report is written.
- D. If the offender refuses to leave after being issued a Trespass Notice or being verbally instructed to leave, he/she will be arrested and removed from the property.
  - 1. Officers will transport the suspect to police security for identification, booking and bonding. Fingerprinting is not required for a Trespass charge
- E. Effective 2-17-19, Trespass cases will normally be charged under Ann Arbor City Ordinance 9:69 (30 Day Misdemeanor) by the Ann Arbor City Attorney's Office.
  - 1. The case may be charged via a Code Citation issued to the offender or by a warrant request. A Code Citation may be issued to the offender on scene or at AAPD Headquarters.
  - 2. If the case involves an additional MI State law charge, the entire case will be submitted as a Warrant Request to the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.
    - a. Example: Subject committed an MDOP and was trespassing, both would be charged under MI State law through the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.
    - b. State law trespass cannot be charged via citation.
  - 3. If the trespassing is part of a case assigned to a detective, the detective will submit the entire case to the appropriate prosecuting office.
  - 4. If charging via a City Code Violation, set an appearance date 10 business days out, during the court's walk in arraignment hours.
    - a. Example: 0900 on 2-8-19 (a Friday).
    - b. If a warrant is being requested, advise the offender that the court will notify them when to appear for arraignment.
      - If the subject does not have a mailing address, they may later contact the 15<sup>th</sup>
        District Court to determine if a warrant has been issued and when they are to
        appear for arraignment.
  - 5. Fingerprints are not required for a trespass City Ordinance or State Law charge.

- 6. If bond money is taken, issue an Interim Bond Receipt in addition to a citation.
- 7. If released on a personal recognizance bond do not issue a Bond Receipt.
- F. If a suspect was served trespass at a location, leaves, then returns to the same location at a later time (or date):
  - Responding officers must ensure the suspect had been served with a trespass notice, verbally apprised of the trespass statute or ordered to leave and not return by an officer.
  - 2. If the offender was observed by officers on the property, they may be arrested. If officers have a reasonable belief that the offender will depart the area and if safe to do so, they may release him/her at the scene after obtaining sufficient information to complete the case report and issue a City Ordinance Code Violation citation.
  - 3. If the offender was not located by officers on the property or in the area, submit for a trespass charge as a warrant request.
  - 4. For Briarwood Mall trespassers see section H. below.
- G. Officers will generate a new case report in CLEAR for Informational Trespass or Criminal Trespass Incidents.
  - If a person is served Trespass in conjunction with another complaint (i.e. Retail Fraud where the store wants the suspect served), the information will be included in the original report. A separate report is not needed.
    - a. Add the charge of 'Trespass Info Only' in the report in addition to the criminal charge (i.e. Retail Fraud 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree, Trespass Info Only).
  - 2. A new Criminal Trespass incident cannot be reported under the original Informational Trespass report unless it occurs contemporaneous with the prior incident.
    - a. Refer to the original case report number/notice to in the report narrative.
    - b. Prior case numbers may be obtained from CLEAR, the owner/agent, or from the AAPD "Trespass List" on the A2 Central SharePoint site.
  - 3. Classify Informational Trespass as Charge Code 'L3515 Trespass Info Only –AA'.
  - 4. Classify all Criminal Trespass with Charge Code '5707 Trespass (Other)'.
- H. Briarwood Mall Procedures
  - 1. Follow the procedures below in situations where an officer is dispatched to Briarwood Mall reference a suspect who has been read trespass by Briarwood Security:

- a. If a suspect is served trespass at Briarwood Mall, leaves then returns to Briarwood Mall at a later time (or date), he/she may be arrested for trespass.
- b. Officer will make contact with Briarwood Security to ensure the suspect had been properly served with their (Briarwood) Trespass Notice.
- c. Officer will acquire a copy of Briarwood Security's original trespass report at the scene.
- d. If the Officer is confident the subject will leave the property and not return they may issue a City Ordinance Code Violation and release the subject at the scene. If the Officer is not confident the subject will leave and not return, they will transport suspect to police security for identification and booking. After the booking process is complete the subject will be issued a City Code Violation and released when safe to do so
- 1. Officer will generate an original report on CLEAR for Criminal Trespass and attach the Briarwood Security's original Trespass Report.
- 2. If the trespasser departed prior to the officer arrival, officers will complete a case report and request a warrant.

# I. City Parks

1. Per City Ordinance 3:5, a police officer, Community Services Area Administrator, Public Services Administrator (or designee) may bar for up to 24 hours any person who, while in a park, violates park regulations, other ordinances or laws, or engages in activity which unreasonably interferes with the peaceful use of parks or neighboring property by others.

If the subject fails to leave, or returns within 24 hours, they may be arrested and/or issued a misdemeanor code violation for *Person excluded from Park*.

2. An order excluding a person for more than 24 hours must be approved by the Community Services Area Administrator, Public Services Administrator or designee.

### J. Authorized Agent Status

- AAPD maintains a list of properties that have signed an 'Authorized Agent' form giving AAPD Officers authority to act as an agent of the property owner for Trespassing issues.
- 2. Signed Authorized Agent forms will be placed in the Authorized Agent bin by the AAPD Front Desk.
- 3. The Police Service Specialist (PSS) assigned to the Front Desk will check the Authorized Agent Bin daily.

### ..Memorandum

Attached for your approval is a resolution to award a construction contract to Bailey Excavating, Inc. (Bailey), in the amount of \$1,360,502.72), for the Third & Mosley Water Main and Resurfacing Project.

## **Project Description**

The existing water mains along Third and Mosley Streets between Main Street and Madison Street are in poor condition and undersized, and thus are in need of replacement. This project will replace the existing water main with approximately 1,710 feet of new water main. The condition of the street surfaces are also in poor condition, and therefore also included in this project is the resurfacing of the streets, replacement of some curb and gutter, and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant sidewalk ramps. The construction of the project is scheduled to begin in April of 2022 and to be completed in July 2022.

Plans and specifications were advertised through BidNet (ITB No. 4702). Five bids were received and opened on January 13, 2022. It is advisable and in the best interest of the City to award the contract to Bailey who's bid was in the amount of \$1,360,502.72 which is 18% below the Engineer's Estimate.

Bailey submitted all required Responsible Contractor Criteria, Non-Discrimination, Prevailing Wage, Living Wage, and Conflict of Interest Disclosure forms; and complies with the requirements of the City's Responsible Bidder, Non-Discrimination, and Living Wage ordinances.

<u>Budget/Fiscal Impact</u>: The current Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) includes funding for the Third & Mosley Water Main and Resurfacing Project (UT-WS-16-05). Total project costs are estimated to be \$1,725,000.00 with an estimated spending split of 75% Water Supply System funding and 25% Street, Bridge, and Sidewalk funding. Funding for the project is included in the approved capital budgets of the Water Supply System and the Street, Bridge, and Sidewalk Millage Funds.



## What is your EMR or Experience Modification Rating?



Every owner and contractor is familiar with the insurance coverage and certificates needed for a <u>construction project</u>. In construction, coverage and policies can take many forms, such as builder's risk insurance which protects the named insured from certain named perils while the building is being constructed (e.g. fire, lightning, vandalism) or general liability insurance which protects against bodily injuries or property damage. Perhaps the most well known, however, is workers' compensation insurance, which provides wage replacement and medical benefits to employees injured on the job.

Workers' compensation is a no-fault system, meaning benefits are provided without needing to determine who was at fault in the situation. It was designed to protect both workers and employees and streamline the benefits process so an injured worker can receive wage or medical benefits while recovering from an injury.

## What is an EMR?

An EMR or <u>experience modification rating</u> (also called a MOD rating or factor) is used to price workers' compensation insurance premiums. Think of it like your credit score or car driving history, where third parties consider your history as an indication of future risk. In construction, insurance companies use an organization's EMR to gauge the past cost of injuries and future chances of risk.

The average EMR, or the point at which your company is said to be no more or no less risky than another, is 1.0. If your EMR dips below 1.0, your company is considered safer than most, which translates to lower premiums. For contractors, an EMR score can be critical, as some owners have EMR standards or pre-qualification processes for their projects and will only work with contractors with an EMR below 1.0 or some other "safe" threshold. On the other hand, if your EMR climbs above 1.0, your company is considered riskier than most, and you may be prevented from bidding on projects or have difficulty securing skilled labor. An EMR of 1.2, for example, can mean that your insurance premiums could be up to 20% higher than a company with an EMR of 1.0, and that 20% difference must be passed on to clients in the form of increase bid prices.

## **Determining your EMR**

Some other modifiers that can affect your EMR include the size of your payroll, which can translate to a higher EMR for smaller contractors simply because of the size of their workforce.

## **Boosting Your EMR**

Contractors have options for improving (i.e. reducing) their EMR and reducing their premiums, starting with effective safety training, risk and hazard identification, and on-going safety discussions. No injuries equals no claims. The rise of safety technologies is also helping contractors stay ahead of the curve by providing standard, digital information on incidents on a jobsite.

Here are some things to keep in mind:

- Meet with workers regularly to discuss jobsite safety. It's essential that your organization does not get complacent when it comes to safety. A near-miss, for example, does not mean that your organization has effective safety practices that prevented an incident from occurring but rather that you were lucky. Each close call is an opportunity to take stock, gather your project crews, and develop more tailored safety programs. Implement stretch-and-flex "huddles" on the jobsite each morning and use that time as an opportunity to reinforce key safety messages and practices.
- Adopting safety technologies at the jobsite. Solutions like Spot-r were designed with safety and risk management in mind. By notifying designated personnel to safety incidents as they occur, contractors can <u>improve injury response time</u> and reduce the risk of compounding injuries. In addition, the <u>Spot-r EvacTag</u> helps reduce evacuation drill time by up to 72% with a 100-decibel, flashing light alarm that overcomes language barriers. By strengthening existing evacuation procedures, contractors can minimize the risks and potential claims that can arise in an emergency situation.
- Develop return-to-work programs that help workers recover and return to the jobsite. A return-to-work program allows injured, sick, or disabled workers to return to their jobs as soon as they are released by their physicians. These programs are company- and job-specific, and they often entail modification of a worker's original job duties to keep him or her working until he or she can return to the original job. When employees can return to their original wages more quickly, they no longer rely on their disability payments. 



#### What is your EMR or Experience Modification Rating?

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

#### Mr Dohoney,

It sounds as if an adjustment to the Supplemental Regulations to obligate 100 affordable units on site would involve a set of potential tradeoffs and a set of potential benefits. I'd be grateful for staff's evaluation of those potential tradeoffs and benefits, including staff's view as to whether such a change would increase, have no impact, or reduce the likelihood of a developer moving this project to completion.

I guess what I really want to know is, from Staff's perspective and based upon its professional judgment, is such an obligation wise or unwise if the goal is to increase the aggregate supply of affordable housing in Ann Arbor? Does this assessment change if the goal is to increase the supply of affordable housing on the site, even if it is at the expense of additional supply elsewhere in Ann Arbor?
