Ordinances – First readings (1)

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 55 (Zoning), Rezoning of 0.5 Acre from TWP (Township District) to R1B (Single-Family District), Wilson-Barry Property, 614 Riverview Drive, (CPC Recommendation: Approval - 9 Yeas and 0 Nays). This ordinance will zone this parcel R1B (Single-Family Residential District), now that the property has been officially annexed into the City.

Other

City Council to Consider American Rescue Plan Act Funding Resolution on April 4. City Council will consider the city staff-proposed <u>Resolution to Direct the Allocation of ARPA Funding</u> at its meeting on Monday, April 4.

On March 11, 2021 President Biden signed the <u>American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)</u>, <u>which</u> provides financial support to local governments to recover from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. In January and February, city staff gathered public feedback to determine how to allocate the one-time \$24.1 million in ARPA funds the city is receiving. To help facilitate conversations, city staff developed a list of potential projects that:

- Met ARPA funding criteria;
- Would impact an important public policy priority of City Council;
- Provide an opportunity for the city to pursue new or transformative initiatives;
- Could help free up funds from other sources to accelerate investment in other critical city programs or infrastructure.

Because there are more potential projects than available funding, the city reached out to the public to find out which projects they would like to see advanced using ARPA funding. City Council will take community input into consideration to make the final decision about what projects receive ARPA funds at its April 4 meeting. City Council was provided a memo on Nov. 4, 2021 to help explain why specific projects were being considered with the public's input taken into consideration.

New Services Added to Online Permitting System. The City of Ann Arbor launched the second phase of the EnerGov permitting software it debuted in 2021. Beginning on March 18, the system manages the resources and processes for:

- Building and trade permitting.
- Right of way permits.
- Plan submittal and review.
- Land management.
- Record retention.

Ann Arbor Shares List of Road, Sidewalk, Utility & Resurfacing Projects Planned for 2022. City of Ann Arbor released its list of road and sidewalk projects scheduled for construction in 2022. This year's resurfacing/reconstruction projects will involve 3.6 miles of major roads and 7.5 miles of local streets. This year's capital preventive maintenance program will involve 16.5 miles of major roads and 8.6 miles of local streets. All projects are listed online at www.a2gov.org/roadconstruction. Projects and schedules are subject to change. Construction may result in road and/or lane closures, so travelers are advised to sign up for email or text alerts at www.a2gov.org/roads.

2021 Water Quality Report. The 2021 Water Quality Report is now available on the city's website at www.a2gov.org/waterreport. It will be promoted via city communication channels and directly to water customers in quarterly billing statements.

March Events with NAP. City of Ann Arbor Natural Area Preservation (NAP) works to protect and restore Ann Arbor's natural areas and to foster an environmental ethic among its citizens. This involves conducting plant and animal inventories, ecological monitoring, and stewardship projects in Ann Arbor's parks. These tasks are performed by both staff and volunteers. Ann Arbor Natural Area Preservation is sharing its March calendar of events, which includes a salamander, frog, and toad survey kickoff, volunteer workdays, a winter nature walk and more. LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Derrick and Carrie have transitioned one of their vehicles to electric and, in the process, upgraded their electrical system so that they can transition their second vehicle to electric in the near future. When they realized they needed to replace the roof on their house, the Millers decided to seize the opportunity to install solar. Working through the City's Solarize program with their solar installer, Homeland, the Millers deployed a solar system to power the majority of their electrical needs with clean energy from the sun. And, because resilience is important to the Millers, they also installed a battery storage system to ensure they have power even with the grid goes down.

The Millers are always happy to share their ongoing sustainability journey with friends and neighbors, including through Derrick's service on the Ann Arbor Public School's Sustainability Advisory Committee. Thank you for the work you are doing for A2, Carrie and Derrick!

10,000 Trees Initiative

So far, the 10,000 Trees Initiative has distributed 1,860 trees! We plan to hold two FreeTree Giveaways in 2022 - one in late April, and the second in October. Aging in Place Efficiently

Our AIP pilot project – offering energy efficiency improvements and home safety installs to support older, income-qualified adults wishing to age-in-place – has been completed in six homes, with 11 additional homes in progress! We are looking to scale the model up in conjunction with Washtenaw County to help ensure that the investments in AIP homes help to stabilize housing stock and support inter-generational home retention. Meanwhile, we are collecting feedback from participants, vendors, and partner agencies; compiling participant data for evaluation; and actively seeking additional financial support. COLLABORATOR SPOTLIGHT

This month, OSI is spotlighting A²ZERO Collaborator Adapt: Community Supported Ecology, which exists to sustain and promote the connections between people and the land that supports us, through community co-creation of native plant and perennial food landscapes.

"Through crowdfunding, education, and volunteer effort, we aim to build a community network that supports this work on small parcels of privately- and publicly-owned land where there might otherwise not be the resources to do so," says founder William Kirst. "We believe that it is a fundamental right of each person to be able to experience the truly positive, life-affirming power of ecological restoration. Since our inception in the autumn of 2019, we have provided micro-meadow installations, garden kits, consultation, and invasive species control to over 230 individuals and groups, all free of charge. Originally intending to stay fairly close to our neighborhood near A2STEAM, we have now created chapters in 10 cities in Michigan and one each in Illinois and Pennsylvania. Good ideas take on a life of their own! We hope you will join us as a volunteer, recipient of our services or as a supporter so that we can transform our landscape and culture one person and one yard at a time."

OSI PROGRAM UPDATES

Air Quality Monitoring

The City will soon be installing two AQMesh air quality monitors - one at the Kerrytown Farmer's Market, and another at the Bryant Community Center; we hope to install additional air quality monitors at other locations City-wide. These monitors will measure pollutants such as particulate matter (PM), carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, ozone, and nitrous oxides. Ann Arbor Reduce, Reuse, Return (A2R3)

US-made; USDA-approved; microwave-, freezer-, and dishwasher-safe reusable containers are available for select takeout orders at Zingerman's Next Door Café, Ginger Deli, and El Harissa Market Café. Containers can be returned to participating businesses to be cleaned and used for future takeout orders, reducing single-use container waste and supporting Ann Arbor's circular economy. City Fleet

We are procuring two electric refuse trucks for the City Fleet, partially funded with over \$600,000 in Federal and State grants. Commercial and Multifamily Energy and Water Benchmarking

Last year, City Council passed an energy and water benchmarking ordinance. To support implementation, OSI is working to procure benchmarking software to provide data collection and organization, as well as customized help desk functionality. We are also coordinating with the 2030 District, five UM SEAS students, and five volunteers (including A²ZERO Ambassadors) to provide support for the program. Electrification of Vehicles

The City's Planning Department, with help from the Transportation Electrification subcommittee of the Energy Commission, is considering improvements to the EV Readiness Ordinance, which will be submitted to the Ordinance Review Committee. Additionally, four DC fast chargers were installed at City Hall this winter, and the DDA has signed a ChargePoint agreement to deploy 80 charging ports across DDA parking garages. We are also assisting multi-unit dwellings interested in EV charging by connecting them with incentives, contractors, and other resources. Energy Concierge

With help from the Energy Concierge Service subcommittee of the Energy Commission, OSI has evaluated the pros and cons of multiple energy concierge service business models, interviewed vendors that provide energy concierge platform development and energy advisory services, and developed a draft work plan. OSI is currently

working with the City's IT office to develop an energy concierge service website, based on this work plan. The energy concierge service will provide consolidated and organized educational information on energy efficiency improvement, electrification, and renewable energy options. We are also working with A²ZERO Ambassadors to provide workshops where homeowners can share experiences on home energy upgrades. Home Electrification and Heat Pumps

The Electrification Contractor Badging program just launched! Created in partnership with Michigan Saves, the program assists residents in finding qualified professionals (e.g., HVAC technicians, plumbers, energy auditors, electricians, and solar contractors) who can assist them with home electrification efforts. Contractors are completing the training now, and badged contractors can be found on the Michigan Saves locator tool (https://michigansaves.org/find-a-contractor/) by searching "Electrification." Additionally, OSI staff are participating in an RMI cohort of cities and front-line organizations across the country working on electrification campaigns, with targeted goals around program design and implementation. City staff have developed a pathway to Home Energy Rating Disclosure implementation based on best practices from RMI. Municipal Energy Use

The City is working with two firms to design over 4MW of solar energy systems for various municipal sites - including City Hall, the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plants, the airport, and various Parks sites. Funding for this project could come, in part, from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Additionally, the City is conducting energy audits of various municipal sites, to understand energy consumption and make improvements where needed. In addition, the City is working on the final details related to the proposed 20MW landfill solar project. It is expected this project will be presented to Council in May for consideration. Neighborhood-Scale Climate Action - Bryant

The City continues to collaborate with the Community Action Network, the residents of the Bryant neighborhood, Elevate, and other collaborators to make Bryant the first fully decarbonized existing

neighborhood in America. OSI is delighted to share that the project team recently won a Solar Moonshot grant to support two households with deploying solar, as well as a continuation grant from the McKnight Foundation to continue and deepen our engagement work in Bryant. The City and partners are currently working on a U.S. Department of Energy grant to help provide deep weatherization support for up to 30 households in the neighborhood. Proposed Municipal Sustainable Energy Utility

In January, Ann Arbor City Council voted to move forward with additional design work related to the proposed Ann Arbor municipal Sustainable Energy Utility (SEU). This includes starting to register public interest in the utility, designing potential governance and staffing structures, conducting a rate analysis, and studying the technical and economic elements of deploying micro- and nano-grids as part of the SEU. The 2-year old Solarize program has now achieved 2.6 MW of new solar in our region, representing well over 350 installations, over \$1 million saved in upfront costs, and well over \$13 million saved in energy costs over the 25-year warrantied life-span of solar panels! The program is also introducing a whole segment of the population to the topics of electrification and energy efficiency and is deepening our residents' connection to their energy usage and production. The Great Lakes Renewable Energy Association (GLREA) is now assisting folks

2022 Construction Projects

Annual Street Resurfacing Project

This suite of projects encompasses the majority of the City's street resurfacing activities and includes some asphalt path resurfacing. The complete list of streets included in the 2022 program is posted on the <u>project website</u>. Local resurfacing work in 2022 will occur primarily in the area bounded by Miller, Maple, Jackson, and Huron. Resurfacing of various segments of asphalt paths is also included. Specific locations will be reported once finalized.

South Main Street Reconfiguration Pilot (Packard to Stadium)

South Main Street from Packard to Stadium was reconfigured from a four-lane cross section (2 vehicle lanes in each direction) to a three-lane cross section (1 vehicle lane in each direction, a center turn lane, and protected bike lanes) as part of the 2021 Healthy Streets Program. Staff launched a survey in February 2022 to solicit feedback on the reconfiguration which will help inform if the reconfiguration will be made permanent or if the road will be restored to the previous configuration. The survey will remain open until March 21, 2022 and is accessible from the <u>project website</u>

Projects Currently in Design/Planning

E. Medical Center Drive Bridge

On March 7, 2022, City Council approved an amendment to DLZ's contract to design and provide a construction cost estimate for the east-west pathway under the E. Medical Center Drive bridge.

Other Updates and Information

Lower Town Mobility Study:

The Lower Town Mobility Study has been finalized and was shared with the Transportation Commission at their March 16, 2022 meeting. It has also been posted to the <u>project website</u>.

Streetlight Implementation

No crosswalks have been upgraded with positive contrast lighting (DTE) to date in 2022 but there are 24 requests in queue with DTE. 170 streetlight outages have been addressed to date by DTE in 2022. Additionally, work continues on streetlight maintenance which paints, replaces, or performs other preventive maintenance work on existing City-owned streetlights to ensure operability. A resolution related to reliability of DTE streetlights was tabled indefinitely by City Council on March 7, 2022. Lastly, quarterly reports about extended streetlight outages will begin sometime after April per Council resolution R-22-016.

Traffic Calming Program Submittals

The Traffic Calming Team is beginning work on the engagement phase for the next projects in the queue, with the intent to work on three of them concurrently. The next projects in queue are, in order:

- Longman-N. Fairview (Dexter to Jackson) City Council approved the project on March 7, 2022. Construction is expected to occur in the summer/fall of 2022.
- Northside Ave (Barton to Pontiac Trail) City Council approved the project on March 7, 2022. Construction is expected to occur in the summer/fall of 2022.

American Rescue Plan Funding Recommendation

The City is the recipient of \$24.2 million in federal COVID relief funds through the program known as the "American Rescue Plan Act" (ARPA). Staff shared a recommendation for City Council's consideration in early March (http://a2gov.legistar.com/LegislationDetail.aspx?ID=5470325&GUID=D37A98C1-2974-4716-B10F-FB4F767DEDFA&Options=&Search=). The recommendation includes \$2M for Vision Zero Plan Implementation. City Council may make a final determination on the use of these funds in April. 2022 Bike Map Update

The City of Ann Arbor & Washtenaw County Bike Map has been updated. The updated map is currently available on the <u>City's bike website</u>. Print copies will be available later this spring.
