Ordinances – Second Readings – (1)

• A Public Hearing and an Ordinance to Amend Chapter 55 (Zoning), Rezoning of 0.5 Acre from TWP (Township District) to R1B (Single-Family District), Wilson-Barry Property, 614 Riverview Drive, (CPC Recommendation: Approval - 9 Yeas and 0 Nays) (ORD-22-05). This ordinance will zone this parcel R1B (Single-Family

Residential District), now that the property has been officially annexed into the City.

Ordinances – First readings (3)

- An Ordinance to Amend Section 2:63 of Chapter 29 (Water Rates) of Title II of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor. This ordinance increases water fees for upcoming operating and capital needs consistent with the City's Cost of Service Study, Capital Improvement Plan, and Water Asset Management Plan.
- An Ordinance to Amend Section 2:69 of Chapter 29 (Stormwater Rates) of Title II of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor. This ordinance increases stormwater feeds for upcoming operating and capital needs consistent with the City's Stormwater Utility Rate Study, Capital Improvement Plan, and Stormwater Asset Management Plan.
- An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 112 (Non-Discrimination), Sections 9:150, 9:151, 9:156, and 9:159, Title IX of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor To Update Definitions of Gender Expression, Gender Identity, and Sexual Orientation; Reorder Definitions; Add Definition of Religion to Include Prohibition Against Religious-Based Hair and Head Coverings Discrimination; and To Remove Requirement that Complaint be Filed within 180 Days

The Human Rights Commission recommends the following updates to the Non-Discrimination Ordinance:

- Adding definition of "Religion" to clarify that the ordinance protects against religious-based hairstyle discrimination, including religious head coverings.
- Changing some of the definitions (Gender Identity, Gender Expression, Sexual Orientation) to match the definitions in the more-recently passed Conversion Therapy Ban ordinance.
- Removing the requirement that complainants file their complaint with the HRC within 180 days.
- Re-ordering references to the list of protected categories to make "ethnicity" listed in alphabetical order.
- Switching the order of how complaints are resolved to have informal mediation take place first to match the current practice.

Other

Lower Town Area Mobility Study. The purpose of the Lower Town Study was to understand how the effects of growth impact the movement of people through the central northeast part of Ann Arbor known as Lower Town. The study identifies ways to support the ease and safety of all travelers, including pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, and those in personal and commercial

vehicles in the face of increasing congestion. The study and all appendices are now complete and available for download on the project website: <u>www.a2gov.org/lowertown</u>

Ann Arbor Seeks Input for Parks and Recreation Open Space Plan. The City of Ann Arbor Parks and Recreation Open Space Plan process is now underway. An online survey is gathering community feedback to help identify goals, needs and priorities for Ann Arbor Parks & Recreation for the next five years. The survey will close June 5, 2022.

Application Process Open for New Class C Liquor License. The City of Ann Arbor Council Liquor License Review Committee is accepting applications for new Class C liquor licenses. There are eight licenses available in the city following the release of 2020 Census data, which shows Ann Arbor's population grew to 123,851 from approximately 119,000 residents. Applications will be accepted until 5 p.m. Friday, April 22, 2022, and must be submitted to the Ann Arbor City Clerk's Office, 301 E. Huron St., Ann Arbor, Michigan 48104. A \$150 non-refundable processing fee is due with the application. A one-time \$600 fee will be assessed by the city from those selected to receive a new license. Additional fees may also be due to the State Liquor Control Commission once the license is obtained.

The review committee will consider all applications submitted by the deadline with particular interest in applicants who intend to enhance the community with the uniqueness of their business and by diversifying the city's offerings. The committee also requests applicants to provide information on their commitment and actions related to the city's A2ZERO initiative to achieve a just transition to community-wide carbon neutrality by 2030 (www.a2gov.org/a2zero).

Ann Arbor Shares List of Road, Sidewalk, Utility & Resurfacing Projects Planned for 2022. City of Ann Arbor released its list of road and sidewalk projects scheduled for construction in 2022. This year's resurfacing/reconstruction projects will involve 3.6 miles of major roads and 7.5 miles of local streets. This year's capital preventive maintenance program will involve 16.5 miles of major roads and 8.6 miles of local streets. All projects are listed online at www.a2gov.org/roadconstruction. Projects and schedules are subject to change. Construction may result in road and/or lane closures, so travelers are advised to sign up for email or text alerts at www.a2gov.org/roads.

2022 Construction Projects

Annual Street Resurfacing Project

This suite of projects encompasses the majority of the City's street resurfacing activities and includes some asphalt path resurfacing. Local resurfacing work in 2022 will occur primarily in the area bounded by Miller, Maple, Jackson, and Huron. Resurfacing of various segments of asphalt paths is also included. The complete list of streets included in the 2022 program is posted on the <u>project website</u>.

Scio Church Road (Maple to Seventh)

The project includes watermain and stormwater work, resurfacing, installation of bike lanes, new sidewalk, and crosswalks. More information is available on the project <u>website</u>. Some delays in the plan review process with MDOT have been experienced, which has now caused the start of construction activities to move to summer of 2022.

Platt Road

This is a Federal aid project the consists of the resurfacing of Earhart Road between Geddes and Greenhills Drive. The project scope includes resurfacing, watermain replacement work and pedestrian improvements. Final plans have been submitted to MDOT for review. Construction is scheduled for summer 2022.

Earhart Road

This is a Federal aid project the consists of the resurfacing of Earhart Road between Geddes and Greenhills Drive. The project scope includes resurfacing and the addition of bike lanes. This project has been delayed due to requirements related to the Federal funding but is anticipated to be constructed in the summer/fall of 2022.

Projects Currently in Design/Planning

E. Medical Center Drive Bridge

On March 7, 2022, City Council approved an amendment to DLZ's contract to design and provide a construction cost estimate for the east-west pathway under the E. Medical Center Drive bridge.



Other Updates and Information

Streetlight Implementation

New streetlights were installed on Baylis (near 3264/3265 Baylis), on Stone School (Eisenhower to I-94), at S. Main/Hoover, at S. Main/Davis, at Barton/Chandler, at Barton/Long Shore, at Barton/Northside, and at S. State/Michigan Union. 310 streetlight outages have been addressed to date by DTE in 2022. Additionally, work continues on streetlight maintenance which paints, replaces, or performs other preventive maintenance work on existing City-owned streetlights to ensure operability.

American Rescue Plan Act Funding

City Council approved the projects which will receive federal COVID relief funds through the program known as the "American Rescue Plan Act" (ARPA). Included in this slate of projects is \$2M for Vision Zero Plan Implementation. More information is available on the <u>ARPA project website</u>
