I appreciate your support for the deer cull. I know those on the other side are getting loud about it - just want to let you know I think you're on the right side, and the side of the majority. I intend to get as loud as necessary to ensure the city goes ahead with the cull.

I know I don't need to convert you, so feel free to skip the rest of this message, but I've put down more thoughts on this subject below.

John Lloyd

I love animals and have been a supporter of the Humane Society, National Wildlife Federation, World Wildlife Fund for years, but the status quo is neither good for deer, good for the environment, or good for the people of Ann Arbor.

Last winter we woke most mornings to find 3 deer in our yard at 1029 Spring St. It was difficult to get them to leave - I could approach to within 15 feet without their being deterred, and as the largest of the 3 glared at me. They primarily grazed on yew shrubs at the back of our property. These bushes range from about twenty to forty feet high and run for about forty feet across the back property line, creating a very effective privacy hedge that's about fifteen feet deep. These shrubs were there and

mature twenty years ago when we moved into our house - I think they must be at least 30 years old. The deer did a great deal of damage to the bushes up to about six feet high, turning a beautiful hedge into an eyesore. I don't know whether the plants will survive and recover from this damage or not. If we have to replace them, it will be a huge and expensive project, and it would take decades to achieve the same effect. In fact, I don't know how we could achieve the same effect with plants that would not just be eaten again.

The deer did not come back as frequently in the summer. We had some damage to hostas, tulips and other plants, but it was not as severe. However, I expect that will change as the deer population continues to grow and eliminates other sources of food.

I realize some people don't think it's justifiable to kill deer even if they cause thousands of dollars of damage to people's landscapes, but it is also not good for the ecology of the area to have an out of control deer population. "If deer populations reach extreme levels, they virtually eliminate the regeneration of many plant species that are essential to the functional biodiversity of living landscapes." (page 33 *The Living Landscape*, Rick Darke and Doug Tallamy, Timber Press, 2014). Deer in this area are doing damage to parks like Bird Hills and Bluffs and it will get worse.

I also question whether it's in the deer's best interest allow the status quo to continue. In a more natural ecosystem, deer would have predators who would not only kill deer, but also keep them from lingering too long in the same location. Deaths by predator are a more traumatic experience than deaths by sharpshooters. If the population is left to grow uncontrolled, it will not be too long before they have eliminated the plants they eat within the city, and will have no place else to turn, and many will starve.

Then there are issues like automobile safety and lyme disease.

Non-lethal methods are not cost-effective when used alone.

I share the views of the group Washtenaw Citizens for Ecological Balance (www.wc4eb.org) and recommend you visit their web site.

Whereas, Section 257.662 of the State of Michigan Motor Vehicle Code (MVC) requires, "A bicycle...being operated on a roadway between 1/2 hour after sunset and 1/2 hour before sunrise shall be equipped with a lamp on the front which shall emit a white light visible from a distance of at least 500 feet to the front and with a red reflector on the rear which shall be visible from all distances from 100 feet to 600 feet to the rear when directly in front of lawful lower beams of head lamps on a motor vehicle. A lamp emitting a red light visible from a distance of 500 feet to the rear may be used in addition to the red reflector.";

Whereas, It is in the interest of all transportation users to increase cyclists' visibility;

Whereas, On December 3, 2015, the getDowntown Program, in partnership with the Ann Arbor DDA, established a program providing bike lights and reflective gear to downtown employees; <u>and</u>

Whereas, The getDowntown Program has received a number of requests for these materials from Ann Arbor residents who are not employed in the downtown; and

Whereas, By partnering with the getDowntown Program, the City of Ann Arbor hopes to encourage additional partnerships to promote cycling safety and to provide safety equipment and educational material, especially for those who cannot afford such equipment; and

Whereas, For mid-year expenditure increases, Council typically identifies a source of offsetting revenue or reduced expenditure; and

Whereas, The General Fund Community Events fund process was completed earlier this fiscal year with \$1,000.00 remaining unspent, and there are no pending applications for this use.

RESOLVED, That the Ann Arbor City Council directs staff to reduce the Community Events budgeted funds by \$1,000.00 and re-allocate \$1,000.00 from the Alternative Transportation Education Budget these monies to the General Fund Public Services Administration area to establish and fund a Bike Light Giveaway Program for the residents of Ann Arbor.

RULE 3 ☐ Time and place of Council Meetings
Council shall establish a calendar of the time and place of regular meetings of Ann Arbor City
Council by the third regular Council meeting after the general election.

Regular meetings of the Ann Arbor City Council shall be held on the first and third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m., in the Council Chamber at City Hall, with exceptions as defined below:

- When the first or third Monday is a major holiday, in which case the meeting shall be held the next secular day (Tuesday), or a later day that same week as set by Council.
- When the first or third Monday precedes an election day, in which case it will be held on Thursday of that week.
- When Council Chambers at City Hall are unavailable due to construction or other reasons, Council Meetings shall be re-located to another suitable location.
- For the purpose of this rule, major holiday shall be defined as:
 - o any civic holiday observed by the City of Ann Arbor, or
 - any major religious holiday observed by more than 2.5% of Ann Arbor residents (as reported on City-Data.com or other appropriate survey) and that precludes civic participation from adherents.
- Council shall also avoid scheduling work sessions on major holidays and, when possible, avoid scheduling special sessions on major holidays.
- For the 2016 calendar year, the religious holidays recognized for rescheduling shall include:
 - The first and second nights of Passover
 - The evening before and the first night of Eid al-Fitr (as determined by the Figh Council of North America and reported on moonsighting.com)
 - The the evening of the first night of Rosh Hashanah, the first 2 days of Rosh Hashanah, and the evening following the second day*,
 - The evening of Yom Kippur, the day of Yom Kippur, and the evening following the day of Yom Kippur

Council may, by majority vote, adjust the schedule of regular meeting times and places to accommodate special elections, construction, or other external contingencies that were unanticipated when the calendar was initially set.

STOP PUTTING THE SAFETY OF ANN ARBOR FAMILIES AT RISK!!!

Dear Mayor Taylor and City Council Members,

STOP PUTTING THE SAFETY OF ANN ARBOR FAMILIES AT **RISK!!!**

Every resident of Ann Arbor has a legal right to protect their safety. The City is putting the safety of Ann Arbor families at risk by scheduling the January, 2016 slaughter of deer in public parks close to residential homes. The governing law in Michigan is clear that no one may shoot or kill a deer within 450 feet of an occupied residence (the statutory "safety zone") without the written permission of the owner or occupant of that residence. The purpose of this law is to protect Ann Arbor families, and to provide general safety for the public at-large.

The City is planning to use the ineffective method of slaughtering 100 deer in public parks, less than 450 feet from residents' homes, to control the deer population. The City chose to approve the biased recommendations of its primary "consultant", the Washtenaw Citizens for Ecological Balance (more accurately the "Citizens for Slaughter") to cull the deer in Ann Arbor. This organization is a self-anointed group of non-experts who want to slaughter deer to protect landscaping. The founders of Citizens for Slaughter were originally members of Wild Ones, a group which promoted natural landscapes. Unfortunately, the City chose to ignore the expert advice of the Humane Society to use recognized and effective non-lethal methods to control the deer population in Ann Arbor. Members of the Citizens for Slaughter admit that the City Council's approved culling of 100 deer in the City's public parks will have to be within 450 feet of occupied residences to be effective. This will be a clear violation of Ann Arbor residents' statutory right not to have sharpshooters shoot and kill deer within their 450 foot "safety zone". The

City has not publically acknowledged that the statutory "safety zone" rule applies to the City's planned 2016 winter deer cull.

The City and Citizens for Slaughter members believe that if the 450 foot safety zone rule limits the City's deer culling in the public parks, there will not be enough locations for the culling to be successful. The City Council's decision to proceed with the slaughter of 100 deer is based on the false premise perpetrated by the DNR that the 450 foot safety zone law does not apply to permitted deer culls. THE CITY COUNCIL MUST REVERSE ITS DECISION TO CULL 100 DEER AND MUST RECONSIDER ITS DECISION NOT TO USE NON-LETHAL METHODS TO CONTROL THE DEER POPULATION IN ANN ARBOR. There is no difference under state law, requiring a 450 foot "safety zone" for home owners, whether the deer is shot and killed pursuant to an approved DNR deer nuisance permit or by a hunter during the hunting season. However, the DNR has taken the improper position that the 450 foot safety zone requirement only applies to hunters during the hunting season and not to DNR permitted deer culls; its position is patently false and not supported by the law. On April 18, 2015, the City received a copy of a legal opinion on this issue from Bruce Laidlaw, the former city attorney for Ann Arbor from 1976 to 1991. His legal opinion was that deer may only be shot if the sharpshooters are more than 450 feet from occupied dwellings unless the City has the written permission from the owner or occupant. The City was put on notice from its own former well respected city attorney that while the law authorizes the DNR to issue permits to kill deer causing nuisances, the law provides for no safety zone exceptions.

Therefore, the City may not violate the residents' statutory right which requires the City to obtain written permission from every single resident who resides within 450 feet of the City's planned deer slaughter in the public parks.
