## Safety Notes

**Every action, every day, be safe!** Stay safe and comfortable when temperatures soar. The National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration and the National Weather Service are providing a <a href="heat-awareness fact sheet">heat</a> (PDF) to explain heat-related terms, dangers and warning signs. This resource also notes appropriate first aid guidelines to administer in addition to calling for help when needed. Be sure to note the following precautions from NOAA and NWS to be safe whether at work, home or play.

- Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of water. If you wait until you feel thirsty, dehydration may already be setting in.
- Identify a cool place nearby to seek refuge from the heat when needed; and know the symptoms to watch out for of heat-related illnesses.
- Avoid over exertion, particularly during the hottest hours of the day, 11 a.m.-6 p.m. Be sure to check out the NOAA/NWS fact sheet (PDF) for many more tips and details.

#### **Success Stories**

The World Economic Forum (WEF) has selected the partnership among the City of Ann Arbor, the City of Detroit, the City of Windsor, the University of Michigan and private sector partners Ford and Deloitte to participate in the WEF's SIMSystem: Designing Seamless Integrated Mobility Project pilot. The pilot seeks to merge technology and transportation systems to provide enhanced mobility address the region.

The Forum received 13 applications representing 10 different countries. The applicant pool was diverse, competitive and demonstrative of the impressive range of mobility advancements occurring across the world. On 10 May, the SIMSystem Working Group convened in New York to evaluate the applications and narrowed down the pool of 13 applications to four finalists. By majority vote, the Working Group selected Michigan-Canada as the top applicant and also elected to partner with only one geography in this initial pilot year. The SIMSystem Steering Committee approved the Working Group's recommendation on May 24. Team members will participate in a kick-off meeting on June 19 in Detroit.

## Council Priorities/Initiatives

The Advisory Task Force on Community Policing is continuing to meet and seek community input on the formation of a Community Policing Commission, per the recommendation of the **Independent Review of Ann Arbor Police Department Community Engagement Practices**. Task Force meetings are posted on Legistar. Past Task Force meetings are available via replay CTN On Demand.

List of Roads for Reconstruction, Resurfacing and Preventative Maintenance for 2018. The City of Ann Arbor has released the tentative list of roads to be part of 2018's reconstruction, resurfacing and preventive maintenance program. This year's construction season will see a complete reconstruction of North Fifth Avenue and Detroit Street in Kerrytown, in collaboration with the Downtown Development Authority, as well as resurfacing of 24 segments of road throughout the city. In addition, stretches of 44 major streets and local roads will have preventative maintenance performed, which takes only a few days to complete but will help extend their useable life and improve traveling conditions. ## WIP (Work in Progress)

The **Downtown Development Authority (DDA)** Board met on June 6<sup>th</sup> and passed the following resolutions:

- Recommended support for the renewal of the AAATA transit millage.
- Established a project budget of \$645,000 for parking structure repairs and a contract with Meridian Restoration in the amount of \$537,460 for summer repairs.
- Authorized a year-end management fee of \$50,000 for Republic Parking System for 2017.

The **DDA** concluded its open houses and workshops on its *People Friendly Streets* program and the projects for First, Ashley, and William Streets on June 7<sup>th</sup>.

The *Washtenaw County Regional Equity Leadership Group* met on June 4<sup>th</sup> to review its 2018 Work Plan and discussion the At-Risk Affordable Housing throughout the County. The property most at-risk in Ann Arbor is the Courthouse Square building, which has the potential to go market rate with the resulting loss of 116 affordable units for seniors.
