Dear Public Official;



On behalf of the University of Michigan (U-M), I am writing to invite you and your local-government colleagues to at upcoming conference at the university called "Urban-Rural Connections: Sustainability in a Volatile World" on Wednesday, May 13, 2009 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

As you know, Michigan municipalities are increasingly struggling with shrinking budgets and tax revenues—all while still trying to balance planning and development goals within different jurisdictions. In such a volatile climate, it may be easy to overlook environmental-sustainability principles and practices. The university is offering this collaborative conference to help reduce the possibility of that happening.

In addition to presentations and panel discussions, the "Urban-Rural Connections" Sustainability Conference will feature case-study "brainstorming" sessions, with small groups involving <u>public officials</u>, urban and regional planners, research professors, public citizens, and others.

Essentially, it will be a facilitated forum, through which stakeholders can collectively **frame key environmental sustainability challenges for the Great Lakes Region—then strategize on how to best address them.**

I know it's not easy to take a day out of the office. With that in mind, I am enclosing an informational flier and agenda of activities—so you can get a feel what you'll be doing and learning at this full-day event. This Sustainability Conference is being organized and hosted by several U-M units, including the Graham Environmental Sustainability Institute, the Taubman College of Architecture and Urban Planning, and the Office of Government Relations. Several external organizations are also helping to make the event possible. These include the Michigan Association of Counties, the Michigan Association of Planning, the Michigan Municipal League, and Washtenaw County.

The "Urban-Rural Connections" Conference will be held at U-M's Rackham Building at 910 East Washington Street in Ann Arbor, MI. For your convenience, if you register by **May 1, 2009**, we will mail you a parking voucher, so you can park in a parking structure less than one block from the meeting facility.

The conference registration fee is \$25 for non-profit organizations and municipalities (half the price of the business registration fee of \$50). This includes a Continental breakfast, a full lunch, light refreshments throughout the day, and parking when you register by May 1, 2009.
