I write to represent the collective support of members of the Sierra Club Huron Valley Group to join in with the concerns raised by the Washtenaw Audubon Society regarding the long-standing roosting site provided by the large industrial chimney that stands in the city-owned property located at 415 W. Washington Street. You have received information from the Washtenaw Audubon Society. The attached fact sheet indicates that chimney swifts are near-threatened and diminishing in numbers across the United States. The chimney structure under discussion provides a roosting site for the birds, and protection for them as they make their long migration flights.

We acknowledge the city's concern with the cost to rehabilitate and maintain most of the structures at 415 W. Washington that generated the impetus to request a Notice to Proceed with demolition. The chimney is a separate and solid structure. We recommend that it receive special, specific, and ongoing historic district protection regardless of ownership, in order to continue to function as a unique urban wildlife support structure. That is, we ask you to exempt the chimney from the request for a Notice to Proceed with demolition of structures located at 415 W. Washington St.

Retaining the chimney would:

- -Provide a remnant of the 1907 building, that can be a landmark and memorial to the industrial past of the location,
- -Likely would require limited maintenance, depending on the outcome of an assessment of the chimney structure,
- -Contribute a classic structural element to the proposed Treeline greenway and the immediate neighborhood,
- -Attract tourists, birders, students of all ages, researchers, neighbors and other residents and visitors to Ann Arbor and the immediate area interested in viewing the spectacle of chimney swift movement during the roosting phase, with attendant benefits for local businesses,
- -Provide an educational element for students, researchers neighbors, and visitors, regarding the life cycle of the chimney swift, bird migration, benefits of the birds' insect diet that benefits humans, and appreciation of the opportunity to observe wildlife in an urban setting.

In addition, retaining historic protection for the chimney is consistent with the purpose of the Historic District Commission, per Ann Arbor City Code Chapter 103 Historic Preservation Section 8.406, which states that the purpose of this chapter is to:

- 1) Safeguard the heritage of the city by preserving historic districts which reflect elements of the city's history, architecture, archaeology, engineering, or culture;
- 2) Stabilize and improve property values in the districts and the surrounding areas;
- Foster civic beauty;
- 4) Strengthen the local economy; and
- 5) Promote the use of historic districts for the education, pleasure and welfare of the citizens of the city and of the State of Michigan.

Acting to retain the chimney at 415 W. Washington supports each of the above statements of purpose for Historic Preservation. We will be happy to discuss each of the statements with respect to our request.

Members of the Sierra Club Huron Valley Group, in conjunction with the Washtenaw Audubon Society request that the Historic District Commission and the City of Ann Arbor act to specifically designate the brick and mortar chimney present at 415 W. Washington Street as a historic protected structure to be retained for the purpose of its value to support the life cycle of a threatened bird species. We further request that the chimney be evaluated as to the integrity of its structure, and that the historic protection requested be applicable regardless of ownership of the property of 415 W. Washington St.

We ask the members of the Historic District Commission to join us in appreciation of the opportunity to live in harmony with the wildlife that pass through our urban landscape and to support the ongoing life cycle of the chimney swifts that use the chimney at 415 W. Washington. We look forward to working with you to identify next steps to support the protection of the chimney as a benefit to the humans and wildlife that populate our community.

Chimney Swift Fact Sheet

Chimney Swifts are in trouble!

- Chimney Swifts are adapted for life on a roughened vertical service—they are physically unable to perch like an average songbird on a horizontal surface.
- Historically, they roosted in big hollow trees, but when the big trees were cut down in the early 1900's, Chimney Swifts turned to chimneys as a substitute for trees.
- Now, as old chimneys are torn down, capped, or lined with metal, the swifts find fewer and fewer places to roost and raise their young.
- A changing climate disrupts migration routes and the birds' ability to find food, as does widespread pesticide use.
- Nationally, Chimney Swift numbers have fallen 72% in the last 50 years. They continue to decline at a rate of 2.5% of population annually.
- Chimney swifts are classified as Near Threatened in the United States, and an Endangered Species in Canada.

We need our Chimney Swifts!

- Chimney Swifts eat up to 1/3 of their body weight daily in insects.
- They carry no known transmissible diseases.
- When the swifts arrive in Ann Arbor in April from South America, breeding pairs find chimneys to raise their young (one nesting pair per chimney). See chimneyswifts.org for information on how to best prepare your home chimney for a nesting pair.
- It is illegal to harass, remove, or in any way disturb a nesting pair of Chimney Swifts under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.
- In late summer and fall, the swifts gather in large roost chimneys in preparation for migration back to South America. The natural spectacle of hundreds of Chimney Swifts spiraling into a chimney is enjoyed every year by many Ann Arborites.
- The large chimney at 415 W. Washington is heavily used by Ann Arbor's swifts. 1,400 Chimney Swifts were recently counted there (the highest population of swifts anywhere in the city)!

Subject: 415 W Washington site

The former City Yard site in the Old West Side has been a challenge to address. The existing structure has definite, enduring issues. We are aware of the many needs evidenced in the immediate area as well as visions for buildable space. On-going focus has been for parking and traffic control; a particular concern is for pedestrian and bicycler safety on Washington. Greenway/Treetops Trail proposals, flood way regulations and pleas to preserve chimney swifts roosts also factor us toward recommending a thoughtful resolution for a resource degrading as it exists.

Over the years, City Council has often sought to make the site more of a public resource to no avail. Three development plans joined the items listed above as possible uses after the property no longer served as a City Yard. Topography, contamination, size, easements and similar limitations defeated these earlier attempts to renovate. Efforts were trumped by the fact that the main building is essentially decaying from within. It may be time to look at what can be done instead (as was successfully carried out in sacrificing the tannery portion of what became Liberty Lofts).

The 415 W Washington property deserves attention before it becomes worse. The petition before the Historic District Commission may be the opportunity for fruitful discussion of the future of the building and of the site. We definitely want to husband our resources.

RE: Historic Structures at 415 W. Washington St.

I am writing to request that you delay action regarding the Notice to Proceed with demolition of the historic structures at 415 W. Washington St., for the purpose of addressing the status of the site's industrial chimney that provides a roosting site for nesting and migrating chimney swifts.

The chimney swifts are a near-threatened species, whose numbers are dwindling. The ongoing removal of chimneys that were built in the 19th and 20th centuries, that have provided shelter for these beneficial birds, contributes to a significant loss of these beneficial birds. They eat insects such as mosquitoes, termites, etc., that are considered pests to humans and structures. Their use of the chimney at 415 W. Washington is a benefit to us from their insect predation, as well as from the opportunity to live in harmony with a wildlife species in our urban environment.

The Treeline will soon be established in the city-owned area of 415 W. Washington, and the existence of the chimney and its chimney swifts can provide a unique focal point, a destination, a learning opportunity that will enhance the Treeline.

I understand that the buildings located in the Old West Side Historic District are covered by the protection of their historic status, and that your consideration of the Notice to Proceed is related to the cost to rehabilitate and maintain the buildings. Please consider that the chimney has not been studied adequately. It has value as the urban habitat for the chimney swifts. I suggest that your considerations include the value of retaining historic protection of the chimney, specifically, in perpetuity, to serve as a physical marker of the historic activity and structures, as well as to serve as a shelter for chimney swifts that are facing ongoing threats to their existence.

Please postpone your decision on the Notice to Proceed, and review more information on the chimney and it's purpose in the City of Ann Arbor.
