PARK MANAGER'S REPORT, SEPTEMBER 17TH, 2019

PARK PLANNING

Gallup Universal Access Playground:

Parks Planning coordinated with the Washtenaw County Water Resources Commissioner's Office on a redesign of the rain garden at the Gallup Universal Access playground. Work is scheduled for this fall.

Farmer's Market:

Working with the Office of Sustainability on analyzing the potential to increase solar energy production at the Ann Arbor Farmer's Market.

Veterans Park Flagpole Memorial:

The flagpole was installed and the remaining site work is underway. A dedication ceremony is scheduled for Sunday, September 29th.

Other Miscellaneous Work:

- Ann Arbor Parks partnered with Pickleball advocates on a pilot project by installing temporary tape to delineate pickleball courts within the existing tennis courts at Veterans Memorial Park. The Westgate branch of the Ann Arbor library has Pickleball nets available for checkout.
- The Elizabeth Dean Fund Committee approved funding for a street tree planting in Veterans Memorial Park along Maple Road. The work is likely to occur in spring, 2020.
- Parks Planning coordinated with the Washtenaw County Water Resources Commissioner's
 Office on a donation from the Arbor Day Alliance for planting within Dolph Nature Area.

NATURAL AREA PRESERVATION

- NAP hosted an intern from Rudolf Steiner High School for 10 days. NAP also hosted 2 interns
 from the Doris Duke Conservation Scholars Program. This is part of a two-summer program for
 undergraduates who are traditionally underrepresented in the conservation field and are
 interested in careers in the sector.
- NAP attended or hosted 7 events to educate the public about the importance of native plants, our work, and recruit volunteers. We talked with over 277 members of the public at these events.
- NAP hosted 18 workdays with 122 volunteers which included these highlights:
 - A celebration of National Trails Day, National Get Outdoors Day, and National Pollinator Week

- High School Students from Community High partnered with Elementary School Students from Ann Arbor Open to work on the historic Three Fires Native American Trail in West Park
- o 13 weekly workdays with the YMCA's Youth Volunteer Corps with 160 total volunteers
- Tina Stephens, NAP's Volunteer and Outreach Coordinator, attended S-212, a week-long
 Wildland Fire Chainsaw Training at Fort Custer. Tina also did two radio interviews. One about
 NAP's summer events and one about NAP's efforts to protect pollinators in the city, including
 our National Pollinator week workdays and the "Monarchs in the Rough" program at the Golf
 Courses.
- Thanks to a cool spring, NAP was able to control spring invasive species well into July, which is roughly 2-3 weeks longer than normal. In all, 5,420 pounds of invasive species were composted from June August.
- Throughout the summer, NAP monitored 11 different rare plant species of concern, in 16 different parks. These are re-located from earlier records by NAP botanists. A few species could not be relocated; some remain unchanged in size; and a few populations have grown significantly. This is meaningful information as it helps to inform future restoration efforts.
- In June, NAP Stewardship Specialist, Michael Hahn meet with the Oakland County and Lake St. Clair County CISMA (Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas) coordinators to discuss our burn program, our management approach and ways to collaborate in the future.
- On July 10th, Stewardship Specialist, Michael Hahn along with colleagues from the Washtenaw Stiltgrass Working Group hosted a public meeting at the Scio Township Hall. The focus of the meeting was to educate people about Japanese stiltgrass and the negative effects it will have on the surrounding ecosystem if action is not taken to slow its spread now. Stiltgrass was first found in Washtenaw County, in 2016. We are currently aware of populations of Stiltgrass in the Botsford Preserve, which is protected with a conservation easement that NAP helps to manage and in other City owned land along the Huron River.
- Vernal pool levels remained high into July, and NAP took advantage of the depth to do some live-trapping for elusive salamanders (water levels are often too shallow for our traps by this date). We were able to find salamander larvae at several ponds, with one special find: a tiger salamander larva at Oakwoods Nature Area. Tiger salamanders are extremely rare in the city, and not often observed even where we know they occur. Lots of salamander larvae were also found in the city's new Buttonbush Nature Area.
- Turtle nesting season was very long and active this year. Thanks to reports from volunteers and
 residents, NAP was able to locate and protect over a dozen turtle nests, at 8 different sites.
 Several had to be relocated for safety. This is the largest number NAP has been able to find in
 one season. Some nests have now hatched out, others will hatch in the next few weeks. Some
 painted turtle hatchlings may not emerge until next spring.
- From August 16-18th, NAP coordinated a Swift Nights Out event, in association with the Washtenaw Audubon Society. Over a dozen volunteers participated, and they counted over 2,500 chimney swifts roosting in old chimneys at 5 locations in Ann Arbor. These birds are facing

steep population declines due to loss of habitat, and they now roost almost exclusively in manmade structures.

- In September, NAP led a public bird walk at Mary Beth Doyle Park. 26 people attended, and they
 observed sandpipers, egrets, cormorants, and a common nighthawk, which is a species of
 special concern in Michigan. A black-crowned night-heron, which is another species of special
 concern in Michigan, was observed at Mary Beth Doyle Park in August.
- David Borneman, NAP Manager, was elected as Chair of the Michigan Prescribed Fire Council, a
 position he previously held about 15 years ago. As such, he coordinates and facilitates meetings
 of the MPFC, including their upcoming annual conference.

PARK OPERATIONS

Park Operations coordinated numerous recreation facility improvements, including:

- Installed new siding and paint on the exterior of Bryant Community Center
- Installed new sand boxes at Cranbrook and Garden Homes parks. They are both located adjacent to the existing play structures.
- Installed Sail-type sun shades at Veteran's Memorial Park Pool.
- New fencing and storage buildings at Fuller Park pool.
- Coordinated sand filter change at Fuller pool.
- Coordinated roof replacement of Leslie House at Leslie Science and Nature Center.
- Repairs to Veteran's Memorial Ice Rink player's benches and bleachers.
- Painted Mack Pool Locker rooms and replaced entrance doors.
- Installed a variable speed control on the water slide pump at Fuller, reducing amperage that will result in a power savings when operating the slide.

Playground Safety:

The second and third rounds of safety inspections have taken place. Three of the current inspectors renewed their Certified Playground Safety Inspector training. One more renewal will take place in the spring. The training is good for three years.

The tree care contract with Davey Trees is in full swing. Parks that have had work done so far include:

Park Mowing:

The grass has started to slow down and we are currently on schedule for the 14-day mowing cycle. We are getting ready for leaf cleanup, which mostly entails mulching the leaves on the grass to return some of the nutrients to the soil. We are also preparing for snow removal by making sure all of the paths in the parks have enough clearance for the plows and machinery to pass without damage.

Canoe Liveries

- Summer camps filled up quickly and we had over 500 children attend one of our popular river camps this year.
 - The Gallup location offered eleven weeks of river camps for grades 2nd-5th
 - The Argo location offered 9 weeks of river camps for grades 6th-9th.
 - The river campers experience perfect summer days as we kayak, canoe, paddleboat, raft, tube, stand-up paddleboard, fish and play in our wonderful river parks.
 - O The children, and parents, love river camp as said in one of the survey responses "My campers favorite experience was all the various activities on the river. He says it's the best day camp experience he's been to and wants to go again next summer!"
- We also had 117 children ages 2-7 years attend one of the month long River Kid classes where little ones and their caregiver explore the river world in a boat.
- Each summer one of our most popular programs is our Night Paddles held at the Gallup Livery. The boat rentals stay open late to venture out of a canoe or kayak under the full moon.
 - June and August we had over 200 people attend the night paddles
 - o The July date was cancelled due to a thunderstorm.
- Other fun and educational river programs are kayak and stand-up paddleboard instruction, a river class just for women and a learn to fish class just for kids.

Veterans Memorial Park

 The Vets Swim Team had 145 swimmers this year, which was the 3rd largest team in Vets history. We had a 5-0 dual meet record, making us WISC B-Division Champions for the 2nd time in team history. At Championships, we brought 109 swimmers, making us the 3rd largest team represented among the 18 team league at Championships. At Championships, we scored a total of 963 points. We ended up in 8th place overall and fell less than 50 points short of moving up to A Division. Combined, our men swimmers finished 4th overall with 707 points. The women finished 12th overall with 255 points.

GIVE 365

- Implemented a Waste station pilot program at Fuller with goal of reducing contamination and diverting landfill waste.

Mack & Fuller Pools

- Fuller Pool Day Camp had a total of 671 campers.
- The new camp sheds were extremely well received by campers, parents and the general public.
- Fuller has once again remained open for 2 additional weeks. Over 90 extended season passes were sold this year.
- At Mack a new sand filter, pumps and UV filter were installed over the summer. Pool tiles were also repaired. Staff are excited about the new equipment and the impact it will have on visitors.

Buhr Pool

- Over 300 dogs attended the annual Dog Swim.
- Buhr had more campers than ever before 517.

Huron Hills and Leslie Park Golf Courses

- The golf courses are continuing their participation in the Monarchs in the Rough program. In our local effort to reverse the decline of the Monarch population we have doubled the required one acre of milkweed seed at both courses. The program has worked well and there been a noticeable increase in the monarchs around the courses.
- On course improvements that have been successfully completed are re-sodding the tee on number 7 at LPGC, and the rebuilding of the bunker on number 9.
- Our new golf course superintendent Victor Morales-Rios, has settled in nicely to his new job.
 Golfers have been very complimentary about the conditions at both golf courses this year and reviews through the sites like Google, Yelp and Golf Advisor have all been top notch.
- Camps and instruction have ended for the season. Kevin Sercel and Chuck Brooks each did an outstanding job with our programs. Children's camps were running at an 85 -90 % capacity and the adult instruction classes received outstanding evaluations.
- The Men's and Senior's tournaments were as successful as in year's past, with 88 golfers competing in the Men's and 99 golfers in the Seniors. New to the schedule this year was the Match Play. Here after an elimination round, 16 golfers completed head to head. This new event is sure to be one of the more exciting events we will host in the years to come.
- FootGolf The family fun soccer ball golf that is played at Huron Hills is remaining steady over the last two years. In 2018 we had 568 people come out at play totaling \$5,424 in revenues. So far in 2019 we have had 600 rounds and \$5,700 in revenues. This fun alternative to golf will be evaluated year to year.

June Impact Report




Goat Talk & Walk Success




"While goats are beautifying our park, you can too!"







August wrapped up to be a great month for our volunteers to get involved in our parks system!


