Barton Drive Resurfacing and Water Main Replacement Project

The City of Ann Arbor has begun work on the <u>2020 Barton Drive Resurfacing and Water Main Replacement Project</u> from the M-14 on/off ramp to Pontiac Trail. The project planning and design process includes consideration for a complete street including bike lanes, sidewalk system connections (i.e., sidewalk gap-filling), crosswalks, and intersection reconfiguration.

A public meeting was held on September 19, 2019, and online feedback was collected September and October 2019. The <u>meeting presentation</u> and is available and engagement summary (including in-person and online feedback) will be posted to <u>www.a2gov.org/BartonDrive</u> are now available for review.

The Commission will be asked to take action on a resolution for the possible removal of on-street parking along Barton Drive to accommodate bike lanes. A similar resolution was made for Pauline Blvd in January 2018 and can be reviewed as an example.
