

Q1 Should the City of Ann Arbor allow permanent wall signs in single and two-family zoning districts? Note: The content of the sign message would not be regulated.


Q2 If wall signs are allowed in the single and two-family zoning districts, what is the size limit? (1 X 1) (1X2) (2 X 2) (other: specify)


