Safety Notes

A2 Be Safe! Coronavirus (COVID-19) update. City of Ann Arbor Emergency Management personnel are in active collaboration with the Washtenaw County Health Department, local hospitals, the University of Michigan, and the American Red Cross for the coronavirus outbreak. It's important to note that the Washtenaw County Health Department is the lead agency as they have emergency operations plans to address infectious disease and pandemics.

The city will continue to monitor this rapidly evolving situation and coordinate closely with its local partners, including Washtenaw County Health Department, to determine if this closure date should be expanded. - Wash your hands often with soap and water or use hand sanitizer.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing.
- Avoid handshakes.
- Avoid contact with sick people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Ann Arbor resumed in-person services on June 8 at City Hall. Ann Arbor Larcom City Hall reopened to the public on Monday, June 8, however, customers are encouraged to make payments and conduct city service requests online as much as possible. In-person essential city services resumed with new safety protocols in place to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and protect city staff and the public. These protocols include:
- Customers are encouraged to make payments and conduct all city service requests online. If customers need to come to City Hall to make a payment, the city strongly encourages the use of credit card payments to minimize physical contact.
- Face coverings in public areas are required at all times. If a visitor does not have a face covering, then one will be provided at the guest services desk in the lobby.
- Visitors will be screened for symptoms and COVID exposure at the guest services desk.

- Physical distancing of 6 feet or more will be required. Floor markings and stanchions have been installed to direct traffic flow.
- Sneeze guards have been installed at customer service counters, and signage has been placed throughout the building to note safety protocols that should be followed.
- Cleaning and sanitization procedures have also been updated to provide more thorough and frequent cleaning of common areas and equipment.
- State of Michigan COVID-19 response has moved to Phase 4 of <u>MI Safe Smart Plan</u> (PDF). As of June 1, 2020 groups of 100 people or less may gather outdoors with physical distancing of 6 feet or more, and wearing face coverings when in enclosed places.

Enforcement

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Following the announcement of the governor's "Stay Home, Stay Safe" executive order, law enforcement agencies have received many questions related to how citizens can report a business or individual that is violating the order. Originally, the public was directed to the attorney general's office. However, due to the overwhelming response, local law enforcement agencies are asking residents to report complaints directly by contacting 9-1-1.

While all aspects of the executive order are to be followed and law enforcement will respond appropriately to reported violations, callers are being asked to report only those behaviors that pose a credible and serious risk to public safety and that may exacerbate community spread.

- Public safety leaders from each agency within Washtenaw County, including the Ann Arbor Police Department, have aligned response protocols to include the following: Upon calling 9-1-1, dispatch will relay the complaint to local police agency.
- Each agency will determine the severity of the violation and respond appropriately.
- Initial response will focus on education in order to gain compliance with the order.
- The intent is not to arrest, but enforcement action will be taken as deemed appropriate.

Public Hearings. There is (1) public hearings which are listed below.

• A public hearing and Resolution No. 4 - Confirming the Proposed Jackson Avenue Sidewalk Gap Project Special Assessment, District #61 (8 Votes Required).

Ordinances – Second Readings – none.

Ordinances – First Readings.

- An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 55 (Unified Development Code), Zoning of 4.5 Acres from PUD (Planned Unit Development) to C3 (Fringe Commercial district), MMG Plymouth Road Mixed Use Rezoning, 3611-3621 Plymouth Road, (CPC Recommendation: Approval - 9 Yeas and 0 Nays). Approval of this resolution will zone a 4.5 acre parcel from PUD (Bolgos Property Planned Unite Development district) to C3 (Fringe Commercial district) to allow the site to be redeveloped with a new hotel and renovated restaurant.
- An Ordinance to Amend Section 1:209 of Chapter 8 (Boards and Commissions) of Title I of the Code of the City of Ann Arbor. This amendment will revise the procedure for real estate transaction for the Ann Arbor Housing commission. If amended, the Council will continue to approve the Housing Commission's real estate transactions, but the Housing Commission or entities formed by the Housing Commission will be able to execute purchase agreements and have property deeded to them directly.

Other

AquaHawk Water Monitoring Portal. The new AquaHawk water monitoring portal will be promoted to the public beginning on Monday of next week. This free tool will allow water customers to view water consumption and set thresholds for personalized alerts via email, text or phone. This tool replaces the old water consumption site.

All that is required for customers to sign up is their account number and email address. Please direct people interested in taking advantage of this tool to visit <u>www.a2gov.org/aquahawk</u>.

Water Quality Matters. The June issue of <u>A2H2O: Quality Water Matters</u> includes important information from the Water Treatment Services and Public Works Managers regarding the importance of flushing pipes before reopening businesses or homes, capital project updates, and how Ann Arbor dams undergo regular safety inspection monitoring.

Ann Arbor Downtown Road Closures began Friday, June 12. Beginning at 2 p.m. Friday, June 12, various streets in downtown Ann Arbor closed to vehicle traffic to facilitate expanded patio services and shopping for restaurants, bars and retail businesses. The closures, per Ann Arbor City Council <u>resolution</u>, will last until 8 p.m. Sunday and will continue every weekend until August. 23, 2020.

Curbside Compost Collection Compost Facility Reopened for Drop-off and Sales on Saturday, June 6. Ann Arbor's compost facility, located at 4170 Platt Road, re-opened for residents on Saturday, June 6, 2020. Ann Arbor residents may deliver 1 cubic yard per household, per day of acceptable yard waste materials, at no charge, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m.–4 p.m. A valid city of Ann Arbor driver's license or a recent water bill is required for this free service.

Visitors to the facility should also be aware that construction will be taking place Monday– Thursday, each week, on the roadway adjacent to the facility. A temporary driveway will be put in place during work, and visitors are encouraged to utilize Friday and Saturday for drop-off or pickup.

Public Works is also pleased to announce that curbside compost service will resume, starting with the collection of bundled brush, on Monday, June 15 and paper bag yard waste collection on Monday, June 22. Brush and tree limbs, up to 6 inches in diameter, may be put out for collection if they are 4 feet or less in length, tied with natural twine, and the bundle must not be more than 18 inches in diameter. Ann Arbor 2020 Planned Road, Utility & Resurfacing Projects. The City of Ann Arbor planned for a significant 2020 construction season with nearly 10 miles of resurfacing/restoration projects, some with utility improvements included, as well as 9 miles of capital preventative maintenance work. Due to Michigan's response to the COVID-19 pandemic, a timetable for when these projects will begin and conclude is not yet available. All projects are listed online at www.a2gov.org/roadconstruction.

Construction work will cause road and lane closures, so travelers are advised to sign up for email or text alerts, at www.a2gov.org/roads.

County-Wide Road and Non-Motorized Millage Education Resources. This is the start of Washtenaw County Road Commission communication efforts to educate the public about the <u>current road and non-motorized millage</u> and what could be accomplished if the millage is renewed by voters on August 4. Resources discussed at the May 14th meeting include <u>meeting</u> <u>slides</u> and the <u>meeting recording</u>. A <u>presentation by the Washtenaw County Road Commission</u> is scheduled for the June 15th Council meeting and a <u>Resolution of Support</u> of the millage is included on the agenda.

2020 Construction Projects

Annual Street Resurfacing Project:

This suite of projects encompasses the majority of the City's street resurfacing activities, including several major and multiple local streets. Included in the 2020 program are Boardwalk (Eisenhower to north end), Granger (State to Packard), Geddes Ave (Church to Observatory), asphalt path resurfacing on Oakbrook and South Main Street, and a number of residential street resurfacing projects, which will be concentrated in the neighborhood around Dicken Elementary School. A full list of streets is posted on the website at: <u>a2gov.org/RoadConstruction</u>. Construction is currently active in the Dicken neighborhood, on Geddes Ave, and the Oakbrook path. Work is expected to continue into November.

Barton Drive (M-14 to Pontiac):

The scope includes street resurfacing, watermain improvements, new sidewalk construction, and intersection reconfiguration at the Chandler intersection. Also included in the project is the reconfiguration of the Barton/Starwick intersection, and the possible filling of sidewalk gaps at this location.

Staff is moving ahead with the proposal to install sidewalk on the north side of Barton Drive from Brede to Pontiac, and at the Barton/Starwick intersection. Resolution #4 to approve the final special assessment roll for both of these locations were approved by City Council at the May 4 Council meeting. Construction is currently underway and is expected to extend through August.

Ellsworth/Research Park Drive Intersection:

City and AAATA staff continue to address pedestrian crossing issues related to access to transit service and the location of bus stops along Ellsworth Rd. It has been determined that a signal is warranted at this location. The City and AAATA have executed an agreement. Construction is expected in the fall of 2020.

Jackson Avenue and Washtenaw Avenue Sidewalk Gap Project:

This project includes filling gaps in the sidewalk system on Jackson Avenue (south side) from Westover Avenue to Park Lake Avenue. Also included is the construction of a Non-motorized Path along the south side of Washtenaw Avenue (north of the service drive) from S. Huron Parkway to Pittsfield Boulevard.

Construction has begun on the Washtenaw segment of the project in the week of May 18. The cost of the Jackson Ave portion of the project will be specially assessed to the



adjacent property owners as it is first-time construction. Resolution #4 to approve the final special assessment roll went before Council on May 18 and was postponed to the June 15 meeting.

Other Sidewalk Gap Work

In addition to the sidewalk gap projects referenced above, the following additional locations are planned for 2020, to be done as part of other projects:

- Stimson (both sides) from State Street east part of Sidewalk Repair Program. Special Assessment Resolutions #2 & 3 are anticipated to go to City Council on July 6
- Boardwalk Drive (2875 & 2775), east side part of Resurfacing project. Special Assessment Resolution #2 & 3 are anticipated to go to City Council on July 6

Plymouth Road Capital Maintenance

This project consists of cold-milling and repaving of the asphalt surface from Murfin/Upland Roads to Nixon Road. Vehicular lanes will be reduced uniformly to 10 feet and a modified buffered bike lane will be introduced. The work is currently scheduled to start around the week of June 22.

Projects Currently in Design/Planning

Hollywood Drive (Maple to Allison):

This project consists of the first time paving of a gravel street, which was petitioned by residents in 2017 and subsequently included in the Capital Improvements Plan. The current scope of the project includes paving the street, installation of sidewalks, construction of curb and gutter where necessary, and stormwater improvements consistent with the City's Green Streets policy. This project was removed from the FY21 budget and has been postponed indefinitely.

Other Updates and Information

"Healthy Streets" - Transportation opportunities for social distancing

Staff has continued to advance the Healthy Streets initiative consistent with City Council Resolution R-20-158, "<u>Resolution to Promote Safe Social Distancing Outdoors in Ann</u> <u>Arbor</u>." Staff will advance 16 neighborhood slow street treatments in June based on streets that have significant pedestrian and/or bicycle traffic, provide logical connections to parks and recreation areas, have gaps in the sidewalk system, are important places where it is desirable to maintain social distancing, and/or have public support.

Based on a Transportation Commission suggestion, the threshold for consideration has been lowered – staff looked for multiple requests but not necessarily 30% support from the neighborhood (as originally identified in the May memo). Additionally, based on suggestions from City Council members, staff will place signs one week in advance of implementing the slow streets treatments in order to a) notify the neighborhood of the coming change; and b) allow for residents to voice concern. If objection is received from



more than 20% of affected neighbors, then the treatment will not be installed or be removed.

For non-residential streets, several different efforts are underway. First, City Council passed Resolution R-20-194, "Resolution to Approve Downtown Street Closures for Restaurant and Retail Use During the Time of Mandated Physical Distancing." This resolution was spearheaded by the downtown merchant associations and approved weekend closures on various downtown streets to allow them to be used for social distancing and outdoor dining. Second, City and DDA staff worked together on a series of other suggested lane reconfigurations. Those are expected to be presented to City Council on June 15, 2020. The City's "Healthy Streets" website (a2gov.org/HealthyStreets) and the DDA's People Friendly Streets website (peoplefriendlystreets.org/) will be kept up to date to reflect the latest updates on the Healthy Streets Initiative.

Office of Sustainability and Innovations Update:

City Council adopted the <u>A2Zero Carbon Neutrality Plan on June 1, 2020</u>. The effort is now transitioning to implementation and a meeting with implementation partners is scheduled for June 12, 2020. More information about the A2Zero Plan and upcoming events can be found on the project website: <u>a2zero.org</u>.

Streetlight Implementation:

27 new streetlights were installed so far in 2020. 583 streetlight outages have been addressed by DTE in 2020.

Traffic Calming Program Submittals:

Updates on recent Traffic Calming Program petitions are provided below:

• Fernwood (Lorraine to Packard): The second pubic meeting was held June 4, 2020 via Zoom. The preliminary plan was reviewed at that time. Modifications are being made as a result of input received before the final poll is sent to the project area later this month.
