Dear City Planning Commission Members and Mr. Lenart,

Last Wednesday, March 10, in an email addressed to the CPC, I expressed concern about the lack of enforcement specification in the proposed ADU amendment and asked that this be addressed before sending the ordinance to Council. I am disappointed and frustrated that the ADU Staff report attached to Tuesday's agenda mentions NOTHING about enforcement and fails to address the following questions:

- 1. What is the enforcement plan?
- 2. Has a complaint form been identified?
- 3. Will a case number be assigned to each complaint?
- 4. Will neighbors of ADU applicants be informed in advance of the intent to build an ADU
- 5. Will a description of each complaint and its outcome be published? If so, where?
- 6. Has the staffing needed to enforce the ordinance been considered?

Also, I view the absence of resident limit on Functional Families to be a huge loophole. It appears possible from the wording of this that different Functional Families can occupy the primary residence AND the ADU. Is that correct? Note that functional families are an exception to the number limit of occupants and that there does not appear a number limit for Functional families. If that is the case, then that needs to be clearly communicated to the PC and public before approving this amendment.
