1. Tom Partridge - Elect Mark Schauer Governor. Improved access to public transportation needed. (F-1)

Tom Partridge, City resident, urged Council and the public to vote for Mark Schauer for Governor, stating the need for improved access to public transportation and other progressive policies.

2. Kamal Aggour - Boycott Israel

Kamal Aggour, 2331 Sandalwood, spoke about the bombings in Gaza and urged a boycott of Israel. He noted that historic maps of the region include Palestine, not Israel.

3. Mahmoud Habeel - Boycott Israel

Mahmoud Habeel, Ypsilanti Township resident, urged a boycott of Israel.

4. Mohammad Aggour - Boycott Israel

Mohammad Aggour, 2331 Sandalwood, spoke about Gaza. He urged a boycott of Israel and for Ann Arbor to become a leader. He stated women and children are dying.

5. Ayah Nimer - Boycott Israel

Ayah Nimer, Ann Arbor resident, spoke on behalf of the Palestinian people. She stated the occupation of Palestine has gone on for too long and the answer is to boycott Israel.

6. Mustafa Aggour - Boycott Israel

Mustafa Aggour, 2331 Sandalwood, spoke about the children being killed in Gaza. He urged Council to boycott Israel.

7. Aleddin Arukaff - Boycott Israel

Aleddin Arukaff, 2990 Canyon Ct., spoke about the massacres in Palestine. He stated this is a war. He urged Council to act by boycotting Israel.

8. Mozghan Savabieasfahani - Boycott Israel

Mozghan Savabieasfahani, Ann Arbor resident, urged Council to boycott Israel. She asked for a public hearing on the issue.

9. Blaine Coleman - Boycott Israel

Blaine Coleman, 1501 Ardmoor, stated 1800 Palestinians have died since he has demanded a public hearing. He urged Council to address the issue.

RECESS

Mayor Hieftje declared at a recess at 7:41 p.m. and reconvened the meeting at 7:54 p.m.

10. Jennifer Lewis - Zoning

Jennifer Lewis, 1304 Cambridge, requested that the composition of the ZBA reflect the neighborhoods that most often have issues before them, such as those in the 48104 zip code.

CC COMMUNICATIONS FROM COUNCIL

COUNCILMEMBER EATON

Councilmember Eaton stated that Councilmember Anglin sends his regrets as he is out of town.

COUNCILMEMBER LUMM

Councilmember Lumm thanked all of the current councilmembers who were running for Mayor and Council seats on Tuesday. She stated all involved ran classy campaigns.

COUNCILMEMBER BRIERE

Councilmember Briere noted that some of the public speakers spoke about moments in history, including the holocaust, which were factually incorrect.

COUNCILMEMBER KAILASAPATHY

Councilmember Kailasapathy addressed the public speakers' comments regarding a boycott of Israel. Councilmember Kailasapathy spoke about her own experiences as a refugee and stated she does not condone violence. Councilmember Kailasapathy stated all life is important and that individual councilmembers do care.

COUNCILMEMBER WARPEHOSKI

Councilmember Warpehoski stated he has received some feedback from residents regarding the Chicken Ordinance and whether the "neighbor waiver" is still necessary. He asked other councilmembers to provide feedback to him.

Councilmember Warpehoski stated he is also working with staff and Councilmember Lumm regarding his Greenway resolution. He stated changes may be considered for the FY16 budget and master plan. Councilmember Warpehoski stated MDOT is hosting a meeting on August 14 at the Northfield Township Hall regarding the widening of US23. The meeting is from 4pm to 6:30 pm.

Councilmember Warpehoski stated, in response to the public speakers' call for a boycott of Israel, that local government does not have the power to boycott a foreign nation or to set foreign policy. He stated there was a Supreme Court decision on this issue. (Councilmember Petersen replied that individual councilmembers could take a personal pledge of support, such as a one week boycott, if desired.)

MAYOR HIEFTJE

Mayor Hieftje stated those in attendance speaking out against Israel may not want the image that tonight's meeting conveyed of their group and their message. He also noted that the Ann Arbor City Council cannot stop the conflict in the Middle East.
